Ellen was born in West Virginia but had ties to the Eastern Shore. At age 15, she came to work at Fike Orchard in Skipton at the suggestion of her brother who knew the Fikes through church. While living here, she met Alvin Walbridge at a church social and the rest is history. Over the years, she supported her husband who started Walbridge Bros. with two of his brothers. Family is very important to her. She and her husband had five children, one boy, and four girls. She now has 10 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. Walbridge moved to The Dixon House in 2017 after living independently. When asked about the reason for longevity, she states that her brother lived until age 96 and she never drank or smoked. She was active in 4-H, loved to garden (she tends the flowers at The Dixon House), and enjoyed knitting, crocheting, and sewing. She also loves to bake, helping with the baking activities at The Dixon House, and lemon meringue pie is her specialty.

At her celebration at The Dixon House, Ellen received salutations from Governor Hogan and from the Eastern Shore Delegates. Pastor Bill Glass played her favorite hymns on the accordion. Mayor Robert Willey gave her a free parking card for the town of Easton. Sheriff Joe Gamble gave her a "Get Out of Jail Free" card, which gave her a laugh. She stated, "I will try and be good!"

Letter from the Director Linda Elben

Spring is here and Dixon House is ready for the change of seasons. Residents are enjoying having temperature control of their rooms with the third of four installments of new individual heating and cooling units in each resident's room. This project has been long-standing and we are excited to say that we are nearing the finish line!

One of our next projects is to fund a new bus for Dixon House. Most of our residents are still active, taking regular outings with our Activities Director Shelly LaRoque to local restaurants, concerts, museums and events and even afternoon outings to get ice cream. Unfortunately, our minivan is no longer able to handle the number of residents interested in our outings, is not handicapped accessible for those residents who need extra help, and its electric door no longer works. After a recent donation by a community member to take our residents out for a meal, we had to rent a bus to accommodate our residents. A new 14-passanger bus will cost \$69,000. While this vehicle would meet the needs of The Dixon House, it is not affordable for us at this time. We are seeking donors to help with this or a similar purchase. Call me if you are interested in donating to this worthwhile project. Also, new this spring, we will be working on increasing our licensure to accommodate 20 residents, which would enable us to use one of our available rooms for a couple. We often have requests for couples to move into Dixon House, so this would give us this additional option.

Finally, this is the year of 100! We have had two 100th Birthday celebrations. Ellen Walbridge celebrated her 100th birthday on February 26 and Helen Crow will turn 100 years old on April 30th. We so enjoy these milestone celebrations and have been fortunate to have family, friends and dignitaries gather to share in our most recent resident birthdays.

Stop by for a visit and enjoy our porch this spring – it really is the best place in town to relax and enjoy nature bursting forth with our flowers blooming and birds singing.

New Resident Nancy Clem

Nancy Clem of Easton joined The Dixon House in July after living independently. Nancy grew up in Silver Spring, MD and received a Home Economics degree from the University of Maryland. She moved to Easton and initially worked as a Home Economics teacher at Easton High School before starting her family. She was married to Richard Clem and the two had three boys, JD, Darrin, and Warren. While raising her children, she worked as a substitute teacher for Talbot County Public Schools and for Wright's Fabrics. In 1983, Nancy was asked to be the executive director of Channel Marker, where she worked until 1998. During this time, she also served three terms on the Talbot County Council, between 1982 and 1994, as one of the first women on the Council. Among her other civic activities were working with the Homemaker's Club in Talbot County and the Talbot County 4-H. She left an indelible mark on the community with her service.



Nancy remembers that her dad asked each of her siblings at dinner each night what they had done for someone else that day. She reflects, "I grew up thinking of other people."

When asked about her role in business and politics, she states, "We had a beautiful community. Women had very good thoughts and *Pictured is Nancy Clem* were putting forth the efforts to get things done. Women care about issues like mental health and education – issues I care about."

Nancy always wanted to go to The Dixon House when the time was right. She comments, "This is a place I knew. I wanted to be here as I aged and retired. It feels like home to me. We are a community that takes care of its people – Dixon House is part of that."

Dixon House Remembrances

The Dixon House mourns the passing of the following residents this fall and winter.



Hazel Porter Newnam (1918-2018)

She credited her long, healthy life (living to age 100!) to a good attitude, good friends and her Christian faith. Hazel had been at The Dixon House for the last three years, living alone before coming here. She was a native of Clairton, PA where she met William "Bill" Newnam. The two were married in 1940 and then Bill became a Marine and flew Corsairs in Japan as part of the U.S. peacekeeping efforts during World War II. The couple lived in Oxford in the late 1940s after the war ended. Bill purchased Maryland Airlines, a private charter business, where he continued his love of flying. He taught Hazel to fly when she was in her 50s. The couple ran Maryland Airlines until the 1990s and during this time Bill also managed Easton's Airport. After her husband died in May 1991, the Airport name was changed to Easton Airport/Newnam Field. She was a faithful member of The Oxford Methodist Church and, not only sang in the choir but led the MYF (Methodist Youth Fellowship) and served as a member of the WSCS (Women's Society of Christian Service). She also served a number of years as a volunteer for the Memorial Hospital Auxiliary. The couple had two daughters, Suzanne Towers (now deceased) and Debbie Kudner. Hazel also had four grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Her 100th Birthday Celebration at Dixon House in August was a testimony to her love of a good time.

George Jared Irwin (1924-2019)

George Jared Irwin lived at The Dixon House for the last four-and-one-half years where he enjoyed sitting on the front porch. George was a native of Hartford Township, Ohio. He served as a First Lieutenant in the Marine Corps during World War II. He was a graduate of Notre Dame with a B.S. degree in chemical engineering. He worked for the DuPont Company for 35 years during which he held technical and supervisory positions in New York, Indiana and Delaware. After his retirement, he worked full-time with Patterson Schwartz Realtors. He married Donna Wattengel, with whom he had three children. They eventually divorced, and she preceded him in death. George is survived by his three children: Robert Irwin, John Irwin, and Salila Shen and two grandsons. He loved playing badminton and tennis and skiing with his family. He is also survived by his devoted friend Nancy Whitten, her daughter Barbara Whitten Debnam, and two granddaughters. After retirement, George moved to Easton with Nancy and spent many happy years on the Chesapeake Bay and New England waters. He was a true gentleman and always had a smile and warm greeting for everyone.

James Franklin "Frankie" Milligan (1936-2019)

Frank Milligan had been at the Dixon House for eight months. He worked at the former Acme Cannery in Hurlock as a yard foreman for many years. He later worked as a school crossing guard in Hurlock. He was a proud member of the Hurlock Volunteer Fire Company for over 50 years and a member of Unity Washington United Methodist Church. He was preceded in death by three sisters: Eileen Jones, Virginia Stover, and Dortha McGuire, and a nephew, Richard "Dickie" Jones. He is survived by five nieces, three nephews, and several great-nieces and great-nephews. Mr. Frank enjoyed Dixon House outings, including going to get an iced coffee from McDonald's.

Staff Profile Deborah Stanford

Deborah Stanford of Cambridge has been working at The Dixon House for the last two years as a Housekeeper. She helps residents with their housekeeping and in the dining room or as she describes it, "I do whatever needs to be done."
