TIPS FOR FARMERS FRESH MARKET VENDORS: GETTING A LEGAL FOR MARKET SCALE

- 1. BEFORE YOU PURCHASE A SCALE, make sure it can be certified in Alaska. Look for the NTEP (National Type Evaluation Program) designation and a Certificate of Conformance by the National Conference on Weights and Measures (NCWM).
- 2. GET YOUR SCALE CALIBRATED. Scales imported from out-of-state typically weigh high (due to geographic differences in specific gravity) and need to be re-calibrated to weigh accurately. See the attached list of scale repair companies who provide this service. Peninsula Scale Co. (Tom VanVleet) in Soldotna is the closest. AVOID SURPRISES -- Whatever service provider you choose, be sure to discuss the fee beforehand.
- 3. REQUEST TO HAVE YOUR SCALE CERTIFIED Send an email to the Alaska Div. of Measurement Standards letting them know you have a scale you want certified. They'll let you know when they're making their annual trip to the area. In the meanwhile, you may want to use a method other than "direct sale by weight," e.g. by weight in prepackaged form or by count.
