

The gardens around the Webster/Tay were weeded, pruned, last year's leaves and debris removed, and are now in a condition to warmly welcome visitors.

n amazing array of donations has descended upon our Society recently, with more promised in the near future. One item was actually stuck in our back door (see below) that was not only unexpected, but a treasure from a "best friend" of the Society (without whose assistance our presence in the Webster/Tay building would not have been possible).

As a reminder, the Society is now open every Saturday through Labor Day, 10 am to 2 pm. Only groups of four or less will be allowed to tour per docent, for safety and reasons of security.

The Society profusely thanks the following donors for adding incalculably to our collections: **Alex Ray** (without whose offer of a generous 100 year lease on our building, the Society would still be without a home), who dropped off at our back door a framed 25 x 30 portrait photograph of Daniel Webster, which came to him through the Crowley family, and is now hanging in the Webster kitchen; and **Joel and Sara Doherty**, for an archive of material related to the Griffin Hacksaw Mill, including an aerial photo of the mill (with no date, but possibly c. 1940), a 4 x 6 photo of the original mill, a framed 25 x 30 portrait photo of Parker C. Hancock (Joel's great grandfather, and brother-in-law and business partner of G. W. Griffin, and for whom the Parker C. Hancock School was named. The school was built in 1889 due to Parker's efforts, and suffered a destructive fire in 1974, forcing its demolition), several ledgers from the mill (William A. Doherty ran the mill for many years, and Joel himself worked there as well), a Griffin logo stamp, Griffin rug machine, coping saw and hacksaw blades in boxes, a loop end coping saw, an 8" hack saw, and three-ring binders with color photos of employees from the final years, Franklin postcards and photos, and news clippings. WOW.

Update on the Library's loan of Jonas B. Aiken journals and papers: Upon perusal of the July-September 1857 diary, several passages referred to Helen Shaw, a woman with whom Jonas spent time, and who sued him for breach of promise later that same year, and settled for a substantial sum of money (as evidenced by a legal document in the Society's archives)! And speaking of the library, Sandra Burney, now on the Society's board and also a Library Trustee, remembered that the Society was looking for a bike rack to welcome bicyclists from the Rail Trail. When the subject came up that the Library was removing their bike rack, Sandra volunteered a new home for it, and Rob Sargent contacted the Society. It now resides on our front lawn. Thank you Sandra, Rob, and the Library Trustees!



Additional update: After a second trip to the Spaulding Academy, a complete list of available archives has now been given to Sandy Marshall at Spaulding, so that a surviving relative may contact her about any records that might still exist from the NH Home for Orphans (absorbed by Spaulding Youth c. 1958). The files are in storage at Spaulding, in a locked space, kept in file cabinets and index card files. Although nothing was found regarding the first residents (1871 to about 1894), most records from past that time appeared to be intact. The Society retained a copy of the inventory, in order to facilitate the handling of future inquiries.
