

Just to jump right in, I am daily reading a small section of a pamphlet Is God Speaking to Me. I have asked myself so many times "how do I know if God is speaking to me?" This pocket book is a summary of Lysa Terkeurst's book of the same name and she attempts to explain how to discern God's voice and direction.

The author maintains that God communicates with us every day. He invites us to listen as he reveals Himself. He calls us to participate in His purposes. Or He simply whispers to us that He loves us. Now unlike the voices heard by those in the Bible, Terkeurst explains that when God speaks to her, it comes as a certain impression on her heart. She has learned to ask five questions to help her determine if what she has been hearing is from God or not.

1. Does what I am hearing line up with Scripture?

2. Is it consistent with God's character?

3. Is it being confirmed through messages I'm hearing at church or studying in my quiet time? 4. Is it beyond me? (Be honest, here. Many times, we think "I can't do that" when, in reality, I can!) 5. Would it please God?

These questions will take little time to answer but might help us listen more carefully.

So, what else have I been reading? I recently finished The Last Rose of Shanghai by Weina Dai Randel, a good read set in World War II. I did learn some history I did not know about Shanghai, the Nazis and the war. This Kindle read came free with a series of ten selections by Amazon, each book set in a different area of the world. This offer happens about once a year. It is worth taking advantage of.

I also read Sweetness of Water by Nathan Harris, the September book club selection. As I write this, we have not yet discussed the book but I can tell you now that Oprah and I do not like the same kinds of "reads". Sweetness is not the first of her choices I really have not liked. I hope someone at book club will prove to me the worth of the read.

I also read the Winter copy of AT Journeys. One article focused on South African youth visiting the US and were volunteered to work on the Appalachian Trail. One comment by their supervisor appealed to me: he explained the South African concept of "Ubuntu;" that is "I am because we are" or "a person is a person through other persons." Connect with others.

I end with the following reading from my morning meditation which has followed me for many days. "When people bare their souls to you, you are on holy ground. Your responsibility is to listen and to love. If you jump in with both feet – trying to fix the problem – you pollute the holy terrain...to function effectively on holy ground, you need the help of the Holy Spirit. Ask Him to think through you, listen through you, love through you...your main role is to direct the person toward [Jesus] and [His] bountiful resources." (September 2, Jesus Always) I never thought about the expression "baring one's soul" literally. If I look at it literally, I see how space becomes holy ground that I share with one of God's own. I must treat it with respect. The whole concept takes my breath away...Yikes, I am out of space. Bye...from Kathy.






ELCA FUND FOR LEADERS


