The power of clean clothes

Like most junior highs, Sullivan Middle School in Worcester, Massachusetts, sees more than enough bullying among its students. Kids ostracize classmates because of their physical appearance - and that leads to discipline issues and struggles in the classroom.

The principal and teachers at Sullivan discovered that one reason for such rejection is something most of us take for granted: clean clothes. Some students don't have the means to wash their clothes at home. So the principal managed to scrape together \$600 in the budget to buy a washer and a dryer. She saw it as a practical solution to a practical problem.

This past school year, a few mornings a week, kids discreetly brought their dirty clothing from home in a backpack to a room downstairs in the school. There a school staff member helped them sort lights and darks and showed them how to measure detergent. At lunch time, they put a load in the dryer. At the end of the day, they would fold and pack their now clean clothes to take home. The school laundry program enabled these six-through-eighth graders to learn independence and self-care - and that translated into more confidence in the classroom.

This fall, Sullivan's washer/dryer program will be put in place in four other urban schools in Worcester. The machines have been donated. The district also plans to provide free eye exams and glasses for the 26,000 students in the Worcester's system.

Worcester's school superintendent explains: "What's important is that we meet the needs of students. We want them to be able to come to school, to be fed, to have clean clothes, and be able to see the board.

"People don't understand the struggles students have in urban education. If they ever met these students and saw the difference this makes in their faces and hearts, they would be backing this."

The teachers at Sullivan see such small miracles every day. One morning, a teacher asked a student who was making use of the school's laundry program if it was going to be a great day. The student responded: "Yup. I got clean clothes. I look good. I smell good. It's going to be a great day."

We often read today's Gospel as Jesus' setting up his "official" Church, as establishing the "rock" of the institutional center of his mission to which he entrusts the "keys" of the kingdom of heaven. But the reality is that Christ has given every one of us a "key" to the kingdom: the means to "unlock" the presence of God in our world by our own efforts, however small and hidden, to realize God's love in our midst. Our "keys" may be patience and understanding, a talent or skill we possess - even washers and dryers can be the means for others to be embraced in the peace and mercy of God. Find your key and don't hesitate to use it to unlock a door or open a pathway enabling you and those you love and care about realize the kingdom of heaven here and now.

STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

In last week's Gospel, we heard the story of the Canaanite woman (a Gentile) who appealed to Jesus for help, and her prayer and plea were answered. Part of the message of that is that the Kingdom of God is open to and offered to all peoples. This week we hear Jesus say to St. Peter in the Gospel from Matthew, "I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven." An important part of the Vatican flag is two keys. Those keys, of course, represent the keys to the kingdom to which Jesus makes reference. Were you aware that one key is gold and the other silver. Interpretation is that the gold key represents spiritual power and the silver key represents worldly power.

We are also fond of images and more showing Saint Peter at the gates of Heaven deciding who is admitted and who is not. Nevertheless, the keys are reinforced in the Acts of the Apostles, and it is perhaps not that Peter opens the gates of Heaven, but Peter (and Paul as well) through his ministry and explanations make it clear that heaven

(the kingdom) is available to all, Jews and Gentiles.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (#1023) states, "Those who die in God's grace and friendship and are perfectly purified live forever with Christ. They are like God forever, for they 'see him as he is,' face to face." Pope Francis has spoken on this more than once. Recently, he stated, "The Lord has redeemed all of us, all of us with the Blood of Christ. However, we must meet one another doing good." Our call is clear.
