

Council Approves Study Of City Administration

The unanimous approval of a motion by Alderman Gordon J. Glencross, Monday evening, gave the green light to a proposed study of Dorval administrative operations, to be conducted by an outside firm of municipal administrative consultants.

The firm of Riddell, Stead, Graham and Hutchison are being engaged to conduct the survey which will take a period of three to four weeks at a fee not to exceed \$3,000.00.

Designed to assess existing administrative organization and procedures in the light of present-day and future requirements, the study will involve:

- An examination of the organization and function of all existing departments.
- A study of existing reporting and recording procedures affecting personnel, accounting and financial operations.
- An estimate of the level of savings or improvement in service which could be made available by the application of work study, management controls, improved procedures, etc.

In commenting on the proposed program, Council indicated that periodic studies of this nature are now accepted as standard procedure and by most business and industrial concerns; and where they have been applied to municipal administrative operations, substantial increases in efficiency, reduction of cost and routine workload have been experienced.

Speaking for the City's administration, City Manager Rene LeBlanc agreed that such a study would be of great assistance in assuring that the City's administrative and physical growth move forward together as efficiently and effectively as possible.

CITY ACCEPTS AERIAL LADDER

His review of the tests reported on Dorval's new aerial ladder completed, Police and Fire Commissioner Ald. John Macdonald moved official acceptance of the ladder at Monday night's council meeting.

His motion, seconded by Alderman E. Raymond, was unanimously approved by the Council, thus paving the way for release of the city's cheque to Pierre Thibault Limited for the controversial equipment which occupied the news columns so prominently prior to the recent civic election.

CURLING CLUB PLANNED

A proposal by Bernal Realities to operate a non-profit curling club in the old Elmridge Golf Club house was approved in principle by City Council on the recommendation of the City Planning Committee. It is expected that detailed plans will be submitted shortly. The club, according to the application, will be open to all Dorval residents on payment of a nominal membership fee.

RAGWEED CONTROL

Alderman E. Raymond and W.G. Milsom attended a meeting of the Beaconsfield Ragweed Control Committee last week at which various methods to resolve the highly unsatisfactory ragweed situation on the Lakeshore were dis-

cussed. It was felt spraying was the most effective way of combatting the problem and a further report is expected at the next Council meeting.

"Because ragweed pollen can be carried by air currents for distances up to two miles," said Alderman Milsom. "It is important that all adjoining municipalities on the Lakeshore work together if control measures are to be effective."

BUILDING PERMITS

Building permits totalling \$324,300 were approved Monday night by Council. This figure included a \$140,000 plant for Air Care Ltd. and a \$95,000 plant being erected by Jackson Development Corporation, both on 55th Avenue North.

A new industrial subdivision on 55th Avenue North was also approved by Council on the recommendation of the City Planning Committee.

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This spring the City of Dorval's Recreation and Parks Department under the direction of Mr. Roger Bastien decided to expand its recreational activities by initiating an arts program for children between the ages of six to fourteen.

Ten weeks of classes were planned to test the community's response to such a program. The residents gave their overwhelming approval and the department hired an assistant for Mrs. Todd. Unfortunately the registration had to be closed as the facilities were limited. Mr. Bastien, delighted with the initial results, plans to enlarge the classes

this fall into twenty lessons at a fee considerably less than this spring.

Come to the exhibition which will be held on Thursday, June 22nd, at the Dorval United Church Hall, Dawson and Cloverdale Avenues at eight o'clock in the evening.

DORVAL DAY RATES CHEERS

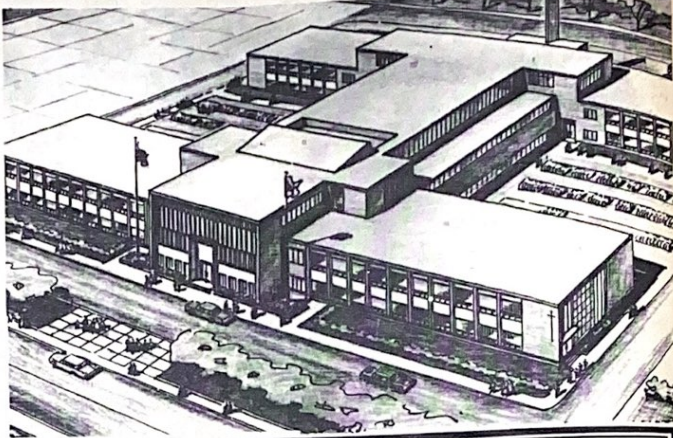

Local Service Clubs Help Needy Children To Attend Camp

It was announced today by the Lachine-Dorval YMCA that they have received donations from several local service clubs to help provide an opportunity for needy children to attend Day Camp Meadowbrook. Many parents with large families find it difficult to give their children a camping experience so the financial assistance provided by these camps is indeed appreciated. Last year 25 children attended Day Camp Meadowbrook and the Day Camp Committee of the Lachine-Dorval YMCA hopes to have an even larger number this year. Several organizations have already pledged funds and others have been approached to consider this as one of their club's projects.

The day camp is held on the south shore of Ile Perrot on the 'Y's former resident campsite. A wide expanse of land with grassy slopes, playing fields and wooded

groves makes it an ideal site for a day camp. The waterfront on the St. Lawrence is sectioned off for beginners and advanced, with instructional and recreational swimming being a part of each day's program. A craft shop, large recreational ball, barn theatre as well as several small utility buildings and tents provide ample program space. Day Camp Meadowbrook promises campers six weeks of fun and frolic in the open air.

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BI-ETHNIC HIGH TO BE BLESSED IN OCTOBER

The opening of St. Thomas School, in Pointe Claire, in September 1960, marked a memorable date in the history of public education in Quebec province.

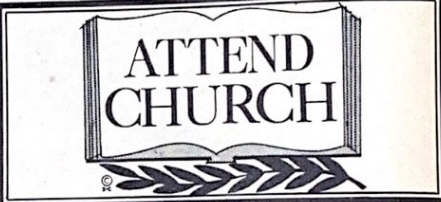
This is the largest catholic high school ever built by a school commission in this province. It provided forty-four regular and twelve special classrooms which can accommodate some 1,300 pupils.

Furthermore, this achievement is the only one of its kind in America since both French-speaking and English-speaking Catholic boys and girls are attending school in the same institution of learning.

St. Thomas High School, located on Ambassador Road, in Pointe Claire, in the very heart of a new residential section, consists of four wings linked together by a central building which contains four recreation halls, two cafeterias, a gymnasium and special classrooms. Each wing has its own student body, two wings for French-speaking and English-speaking girls, the remaining two for English-speaking and French-speaking boys.

With its chemistry and physics laboratories, libraries, music and home economics

IN FOCUS

It hardly seems possible that two months have passed since the first meeting of our new Council. This confirms the old adage that "when you're busy you just don't notice time going by", and this has certainly been the case with Council.

Not only is it necessary that we study and resolve the current affairs of our City and plan for the future, but it is also necessary that we review what has gone before and familiarize ourselves with the many responsibilities associated with municipal office.

We have endeavoured to assume our charges in a careful business-like manner for the best interests of the citizens as well as the City as a whole.

Let's take a look at some of the matters which have and are receiving our attention.

You'll be happy to know that our Fire equipment, and pumper and the aerial ladder have been approved and furthermore everything is being done to expedite a court decision insofar as Chief A. R. Noel is concerned.

A Fire Code will be completed shortly which among many advantages, will enable proper inspection and enforcement of safety, and sanitation procedures. Similar action is underway as regards a Police Code.

A Consulting Engineer has been retained to draw up plans and specifications to more than double the capacity of the Filtration Plant, providing us with the increased volume we so desperately need.

A list of anticipated capital expenditures for the next five years is being prepared by the City Manager, which will be acted upon by Council in order of necessity and importance.

High on this list will be a Sewage Treatment Plant. We are presently awaiting a final report from the Consulting Engineers on their preliminary survey and on receipt of same, the question should be resolved.

The Engineering Department have almost completed their plans for the reconstruction of Dorval Avenue and this project along with the Sources Road Underpass should become a reality no later than next year.

A firm of Municipal Consultants are being retained to survey the City's Administration and bring forth recommendations for increased efficiency and economy where applicable. Our financial situation is being reviewed by a Citizens' Committee in the light of recent publicity.

The completion of Surrey Gardens Park including levelling, seeding, completion of baseball diamond and installation of playground equipment, etc. should be completed shortly. Ballantyne Park is also being improved.

A group of professional and/or experienced Public Relations people have formed a Citizens' Committee to advise the City on matters pertaining to the maintenance of a favourable relationship in the field of good Public Relations, with all of the News Media, both within and outside our boundaries.

An Industrial Development Committee is being reactivated to review the climate of established businesses in Dorval as well as to determine our chances of attracting and keeping new industries.

The responsibilities of our Legal Advisor have been increased and broadened to include all legal matters which might be anticipated on a day to day basis insofar as our administration is concerned. Considerable monetary savings will be realized from this step particularly insofar as indirect costs of money by-laws are concerned.

By-laws have been given first reading on the maintenance of vacant lots, ragweed control - and so it goes, the lives of our Aldermen have been and will continue to be busy ones.

Council meetings are being held on the first and third Mondays every month during the summer, and we extend a sincere invitation to everyone to come and join with us at our deliberations.

Even if you have no particular problem or request in mind, you'll learn a lot by attending our meetings and you'll be all the better a citizen for it.

We are looking forward to seeing you.

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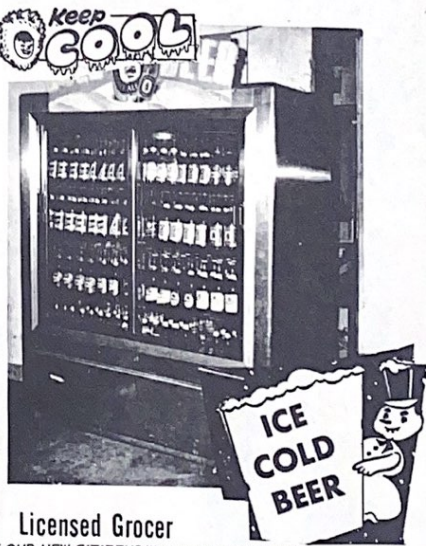
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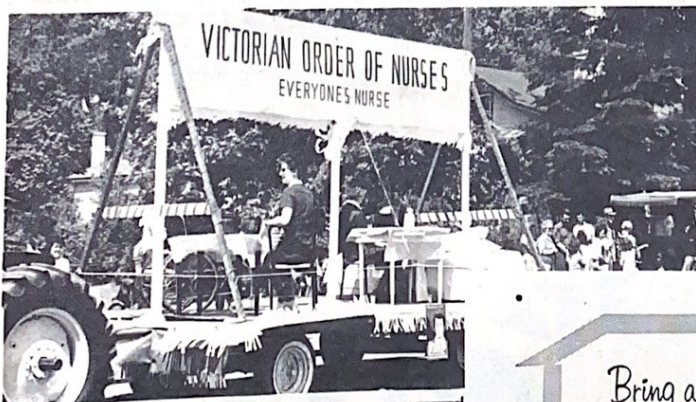

rooms, gymnasium and special classrooms, this new institution constitutes a real high-school campus serving nine elementary schools, all of which are under the jurisdiction of The Catholic School Commission of Pointe Claire and Beaconsfield.

The few following facts will describe adequately the scope of this educational undertaking by a Montreal suburb. The Catholic School Commission of Pointe Claire and Beaconsfield serves the Catholics of the City of Pointe Claire, the Town of Beaconsfield, the Town of Bale d'Urfé, the Parish of Pointe Claire (Ville Kirkland) and a section of the City of Dorval, or some 11,000 Catholics, providing a school population of approximately 4,000 pupils.

At the elementary level, during the next school year, some 1,140 French-speaking boys and girls will occupy forty-one classrooms in five different schools, while 1,660 English-speaking young Catholics will attend fifty-four classrooms in four separate schools.

These pupils progress from the elementary schools to St. Thomas High School. During the next school year, St. Thomas High School will have an enrolment of 1,125 pupils divided as follows: French-speaking boys, 200; girls, 250; English-speaking boys, 330; girls, 345. They will occupy forty-one classes from 8th Grade to the 12th Grade, in which the various options are available. With some pupils from outside territories, the total will easily reach 1,200.

The blessing of this new high school will take place in October, 1961.

The Catholic School Commission of Pointe Claire and Beaconsfield is very proud of St. Thomas High School, a unique achievement in the field of public education.
