### **General Rules for Exhibit Open Class:**

- Exhibitors may enter only two items in each class per person. 1)
- 2) An entry form must be completely filled out for all entries.
- All items must be produced or prepared within the current fair year (August 2019-August 2020) 3)
- Entries are limited to Beaver County residents. Non-residents may enter items as display only. 4)
- The Beaver County Fair Board will not be responsible for any lost, stolen, or damaged items. All reasonable means will be taken to 5) prevent loss or damage.
- All items will be received from 2:00pm to 8:00pm on Tuesday, August 25, at the Fairgrounds, with the exception of produce and flow-6) er entries, which will be accepted on Wednesday, August 26 8:00am-11:00am.
- 7) Judging of entries will be on Wednesday, August 26th
- The exhibit building will be open on Thursday, August 27th from 2:00pm-7:00pm, Friday, August 28th from 1:00pm-7:30pm, and 8) Saturday, August 29th from 10:00am-7:30pm
- Exhibits will be judged and ribbons awarded in blue or red ribbons. Cash premiums of \$3.00 for blue ribbons and \$2.00 for red rib-9) bons will be awarded.
- 10) Rosette ribbons will be awarded \$15.00 for Grand Champion, and \$10 for Reserve Champion or Judges Choice. There is a \$40.00 maximum on premium money awarded for open class exhibits, excluding rosette premiums. All items not claimed will become the property of the Beaver County Fair Board.

### **DIVISION C:** Food and **Baked Goods**

Food exhibits must be entered on a plastic or sturdy paper plate and covered with a zip-lock plastic bag. Large items, such as cakes, may be placed on a foil covered piece of heavy cardboard and covered with plastic wrap. Canning jars should be labeled with date canned and name of contents

### DIVISION E: Quilts

Quilts need to be new, clean, no loose threads, or animal hairs. County Fair Quilt classes Class 1: Large Quilt (perimeter 300" or greater) Class 2: Small guilt (perimeter at least 120" and less then 300")

- Class 3: Small wall hanging (perimeter less than 120")
- Class 4: Art guilts (Original design, non traditional pattern)
- Class 5: Applique Quilt

## DIVISION F: Paintings

All paintings must be SECURELY framed with screw eyes and wires, not strings or cords. The maximum size limit for all paintings is not to exceed 72 inches in its largest dimension, including the frame. **Class 1**: Graphic Arts (pencil & ink, etchings, block printing,

lithograph, collage)

Class 2: Oil Painting and Acrylic

Class 3: Watercolor, Tempera, Casein





## **DIVISION G: Photography**

Photographs will be judged in two categories: 1) Film/Digital w/ minimal manipulation and 2) Graphic/Digital with heavy manipulation. All photos must be ready for hanging. There will be framed & unframed categories.

## **DIVISION H: Flowers & Plants**

Entries will be accepted from 8:00 am - 11:00 am, on Wednesday, August 26. Judging will begin at 11:30. Exhibitors must furnish their own containers. Exhibitors are responsible for the watering and other general care of exhibits as needed. Exhibitors are encouraged to replace wilted flowers before 10:00 am on Friday morning.

The committee shall have the right to remove at any time the exhibit or part of the exhibit which has become unsightly.

# **DIVISION F: Agriculture**

Entries will be accepted from 8:00 am - 11:00 am on Wednesday, August 26. Judging will begin @ 11:30. The committee shall have the right to remove at any time the exhibit or part of the exhibit which has become unsightly.

(10 pods at edible maturity) Beans

(5 roots, 1 inch top, edible maturity, uniform size, washed) Carrots Radishes
