STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE ~ PER-CAPITA...

Each year the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly assess our church a Per Capita fee for every member of the congregation. The Per Capita fees are essentially dues for the services received from these governing bodies of the Presbyterian Church.

For 2020, First Presbyterian's assessment is \$47.00 per member, which the church pays regardless of how much is collected. Please take \$47.00 times the number of church members in your family and send that amount in a separate check made out to First Presbyterian Church, with "Per Capita" in the memo line.

The difference between what First Presbyterian owes and what is collected from the congregation will come out of the church budget. Thank you for taking care of this so that the church can take care of its many other budget needs.

PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE...



Judgement, Cheap Grace and Surprise at the End

"Cheap grace means grace sold on the market like cheapjacks' wares. The sacraments, the forgiveness of sin, and the consolations of religion are thrown away at cut prices.

[..] Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, Communion without confession, absolution without personal confession. Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and incarnate."

~ Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Ash Wednesday, the Lenten Season, Holy Week...these are the darkest days of the Christian calendar. I always look forward to the worship events of all-important season, as for me, they function as a bit of a "reset button" - a reminder that the stakes of faith are very high, and the outcome of our faith was secured at a horrible price. In the weeks of our journey to the cross with Christ, we are encouraged to renew practices of personal piety, recommit ourselves to acts of mercy and compassion and revitalize our commitment to social justice—all responses dedicated to halt any process that might cheapen the grace we have received.

This is why the season begins with the most austere and slightly morbid practice of imposing ashes and reminding ourselves that our deaths are inevitable. This is why the traditional music of lent was always so dirge-like...it was intentional, to set the serious tone for the darker realities of faith. (I will never forget the first time I imposed ashes on my 2-year old baby daughter and told her she would return to dust...my whole body revolted at the thought!) Ashes are a sign of repentance which makes us ready for Lenten truths, and Lent is a season of making ready...ready for death, and the judgment which follows.

As I get older, the concept of judgment has become more and more important to me. For one thing, I think that the untruthful nature of our world requires an ultimate confrontation with diving holiness, and that is absolutely something I want to be on the right side of! But that isn't the only reason—when I was a kid in church, I couldn't think of judgment in any bigger terms than getting sent to my room. At some point, I was made afraid of the idea—convinced that, "The God that holds you over the pit of hell, much as one holds a spider or some loathsome insect over the fire, abhors you, and is dreadfully provoked." (That quote is from my ancestor, Jonathan Edwards, the original great awakening hellfire and brimstone preacher, who scared me to death as a teen.) But the whole Lenten season has a surprise at the end...a savior who bore our judgment, and a resurrection that nobody saw coming. A break-out moment that changed everything for those who would have died without hope, faced judgment without a goal, and left us all drifting in meaningless religious words and acts.

Because of the grace, these days, judgment seems like something to aim at, a sure target I would like to hit. The Apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 3:15 speaks of believers being saved, but still standing before God and having their works judged. Paul used to speak quite often about his anticipation of this judgment, hoping that at the end of his journey he would have some churches, strong and true to offer to Christ. That's the kind of thing I mean when I say that judgment is something to aim at. I just want to haves something good to show for all the grace that has been invested in me—not because I must earn salvation, but because I would love to live as if grace was not wasted on me.

And that's why we hit the reset button on Ash Wednesday. To prepare for a judgment in which we actually have something to offer back to God—not our of fear, but out of love and respect for what Christ has done for us.

PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE (cont.)...



In the words of Bonhoeffer, "Costly grace is the treasure hidden in the field; for the sake of it a man will go and sell all that he has. It is the pearl of great price to buy which the merchant will sell all his goods. It is the kingly rule of Christ, for whose sake a man will pluck out the eye which causes him to stumble; it is the call of Jesus Christ at which the disciple leaves his nets and follows him. [..] such grace is costly because it calls us to follow, and it is grace because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ. It is costly because it costs a man his life, and it is grace because it gives a man the only true life. It is costly because it condemns sin, and grace because it justifies the sinner. Above all, it is costly because it cost God the life of his Son: 'ye were bought at a price,' and what has cost God much cannot be cheap for us. Above all, it is grace because God did not reckon his Son too dear a price to pay for our life, but delivered him up for us. Costly grace is the Incarnation of God."

a student must be an active member of First Presbyterian Church of Bismarck or must have been an active participant in the life of First Presbyterian Church of Bismarck for at least three years. The awards are given for students at any level of study beyond high school. Four years is the maximum for receiving scholarships: these need not be consecutive years. Graduate students may apply for scholarships, providing they are within the four year maximum. You are invited to observe a holy Lent by self-examination and penitence, by prayer and fasting, by works of love, and by reading and meditating on the Word of God.

Are Face Masks Really Effective at Preventing Illness?

Proper Handwashing May Be A Better Line of Defense Against Coronavirus, Flu By Rachel Nania, AARP, January 27th, 2020

Surgical masks are a common sight outside of hospitals during cold and flu season—or in times of an outbreak, like with the coronavirus. But how much protection do they really provide?

The answer is "some," says Amesh Adalja, M.D., an infectious disease physician and senior scholar at the Johns Hopkins University Center for Health Security.

A typical disposable mask can help prevent large-particle droplets from reaching your mouth and nose—two common areas where viruses enter the body. "But you really have to be meticulous when wearing them and not put your hand underneath them and touch your face or do anything that would contaminate your face and kind of obviate the reason for having the mask," Adalja says.

And that can be difficult to do, especially since face masks are uncomfortable, "and people inadvertently will have an itch on their mouth or their nose and they'll scratch at it," he adds.

Choosing a mask with a snug fit is key to keeping germs away from your face, says Amira Roess, a public health expert and professor of global health and epidemiology at George Mason University. She recommends an N95 respirator, which is higher quality than most loose-fitting disposable masks and, when fitted properly, can provide a more effective seal.

N95s, available at most drug stores and home improvement stores, block large-particle droplets and most small particles that are transmitted by coughs and sneezes, the Food & Drug Administration (FDA) says. Even still, a properly fitted N95 does not completely eliminate one's risk of illness, the agency warns. And they are not designed for children or for people with facial hair.

WASH YOUR HANDS TO WARD OF GERMS

The most effective way to reduce your risk for a respiratory illness or infection is with proper hand hygiene, experts say. Wash your hands before you eat, after you use the bathroom and after leaving a crowded place, Roess advises. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends scrubbing your hands with soap for at least 20 seconds and using a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol when soap and water are not an option.

Avoid sick people when you can, and get the flu shot if you haven't already. Also, don't discount the importance of good sleep and a healthy diet.



CHILD CARE CENTER HAPPENINGS...





Spring is on the way, but first – St. Patrick's Day! Here are a couple fun activities to help celebrate with your kids.

Leprechaun Ladders

Make "leprechaun ladders" to use as room decorations for St. Patrick's Day. Cut white or clear plastic straws into 1-inch sections. Cut 3-inch shamrock shapes out of green constructions paper and punch holes in the centers (make sure the holes in the shamrocks are smaller than the straws). Give each child 10 shamrocks, nine straw sections and a 2-foot length of green yarn with a straw section tied at one end and the other end taped to make a "needle." Then let the children string their shamrock shapes on their pieces of yarn with a straw section between each shamrock. When they have finished, hang the leprechaun ladders from the ceiling or in a window. For a fun surprise, sprinkle a light dusting of flour on the shamrocks for the children to discover on Saint Patrick's Day morning. Explain that the "magic dust" was left by leprechauns as they climbed and danced on their ladders!

Homemade Play Dough

You can make this play dough green or divide it up and make rainbow colors. Either way, it's a fun activity for St. Patrick's Day, or anytime!

- * 2 cups all-purpose flour
- * 3/4 cup salt
- * 4 teaspoons cream of tartar
- * 2 cups lukewarm water
- * 2 Tablespoons of vegetable oil (coconut oil works too)
- * Food coloring, optional
- * Ouart sized bags

Stir together the flour, salt and cream of tartar in a large pot. Next add the water and oil. If you're only making one color, add in the color now as well. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly. Continue stirring until the dough has thickened and begins to form into a ball. Remove from heat and then place inside a gallon sized bag or onto wax paper. Allow to cool slightly and then knead until smooth. If you're adding colors after, divide the dough into balls (for how many colors you want) and then add the dough into the quart sized bags. Start with about 5 drops of color and add more to brighten it. Knead the dough inside the bag so it doesn't stain your hands. Once it's all mixed together you're ready to play!

Store the play dough inside the bags once done to keep soft. Keeps for up to 3 months.

United States' Oldest Surviving Coast Guard SPARs Member Lives in Bismarck

The Nation's oldest surviving Coast Guard SPARs member not only lives in Bismarck, but is also FPC's very own, Terry Nelson. Terry enlisted in the United States Coast Guard in 1943, the first day that women were allowed to serve.

"I said that I have to be an officer, because my dad is currently, and I wouldn't be able to go home if I wasn't an officer and they made me an ensign." said Terry Nelson, Veteran.

Terry was trained at Coast Guard headquarters in New London, Conn. Upon completion of training, she was posted to the Coast Guard Pay and Supply division in Washington, D.C. Terry was honorably discharged in 1945 with the rank of Lieutenant JG. She joined the Coast Guard because she didn't think khaki was becoming to her eyes, and she thought the Coast Guard uniforms were "smart"!

On Tuesday, February 25th, Terry was recognized for her service and accomplishments to the United States as a SPAR during World War II and for her inspiration to the women who serve the U.S. Coast Guard.

Brig. Gen. Jackie Huber, NDNG had the honor of recognizing Terry and a fellow honoree. Both women were part of the SPARs program and held supportive roles at home to free up more men to serve on ships. "That is where women became part of the U.S. military and these women that we recognize today were the foundation for us. They set the path forward and broke barriers, and did all these incredible things during the particular conflict." said Huber.

St. Patrick's Day is celebrated by many people throughout the world, Irish or non-Irish alike, with food, drink and all things green. But do you really know why this is such an important holiday?

St. Patrick was a 5th-century Romano-British Christian Missionary and Bishop in Ireland. Known as the "Apostle of Ireland", he is the primary Patron Saint of Ireland.

According to the *Confession* of Patrick, when he was about 16, he was captured by Irish pirates from

his home in Great Britain and taken as a slave where he looked after animals until his escape six years later. At that time he returned to his family. This crisis would have dealt a crushing blow to most people, but St. Patrick isn't a saint for nothing. He overcame his displacement, endured his time as a slave and clung resolutely to a divine vision of helping his Irish Kinsmen. Indeed he did!
