As a community we have been through this a number of times, and as a community we come together to assist those effected. On social media there were many offers to help others with clothing and food. It brings back memories of the Feb Storm of 78. Again the outporing of help to those effected was amazing. I forgot to thank the many voluteers that assisted at the Atherton Hough school shelter where as many as 100 residents stayed and road out the storm. Lastly thanks to National Grid for getting the power back on. Some of the rumors going around was that the power would be off till Monday Night or Tuesday but for most it was Sunday evening. 

Houghs Neck Maritime Center Update

The Houghs Neck Maritime recently received a \$1 million grant from the Seaport Economic Council. I was very honored to represent the City on behalf of Mayor Koch and present the Grant Application to the SEC at their meeting which we hosted here in Quincy. These funds are for the construction of the Maritime Center building and brings our grant awards to date over \$2 million for this project. Mayor Koch along with Chairwoman Lt. Governor Polito and Deputy Secretary of Housing and Economic Development Carolyn Kirk, Vice Chair of the SEC, addressed the topic of the property ownership with MA Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR). The City is currently authorized to manage the use of the property the state owns but has been awaiting an updated license agreement to incorporate this project and the long term use. The City was assured by Vice Chair Kirk that the document will be updated and will be following up with legal counsel. The meeting was filmed by QATV and the presentation slide show is available on my website; MargaretLaforest.com. After meetings and feedback from all the regulatory agencies who require permits for this project, the City has submitted all the required updates for the permitting process. The permitting process for coastal projects is very extensive. We do expect the new ramp to be constructed this season, the existing Maritime Center demolished, and will maintain the existing ramp for use during this phase of construction so boating season won't be interrupted. I will continue to chair the committee and will keep the community updated in partnership with Councilor McCarthy. Thanks! Margaret



From the Pastor

Astronomical High Holy Days

It's March! And with March comes glorious Spring! It's about time. It seems it's been a long time coming this year. Spring, also known as the Vernal Equinox begins when Earth, in its orbit around the Sun, is positioned such that the the Sun shines directly over the equator. On that day, the first day of Spring ,at the Equator, the length of the day is equal to the length of the night. What's amazing is that the seasons of the year can only happen if Earth's axis is tilted relative to the Sun. If we weren't tilted, our axis (an imaginary line running through the north and south poles around which the Earth rotates) would be perpendicular to the Sun's rays and, over the course of a year, the Sun would always shine directly over the equator and it would be like Spring (or Fall if you like) for us year round (hmm, maybe that wouldn't be so bad!). But we are tilted 23.5 degrees. For us in the northern hemisphere, when the axis is tilted toward the Sun it's Summer, when tilted away from the Sun it's Winter. In the Fall and Spring the axial tilt is that 23.5 degrees I mentioned but to the side relative to our Earth's position. If your confused, get out the globe and walk it

around a lamp (without the shade) that represents the Sun and see how the Sun would shine on it. Remember though, that the axis is always pointed in the same direction as you move around the Sun (lamp). Incidentally, that direction the north axis is always pointing to is what star?

On March 21st, for us here in Quincy, the Sun will rise to 48 degrees above the southern horizon by noonday. Yes, it does seem like the lengthening of the days has been slow in coming. But from here on, the lengthening of daylight will come much quicker and, with the changing to Daylight Saving Time (DST) on March 11, Voila! We can enjoy being in the light until late into the evening.

March also brings Holy Week this year, beginning with Palm Sunday (March 25), followed by Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. But Easter this year falls on the first day of April - April Fools Day. I've always appreciated the irony when the two days, Easter and April Fools Day, coincide. The resurrection of Jesus - God's enthusiastic AMEN! to a life that revealed God's dream of what it means to be human - a life that was so pleasing to God, a life lived passionately, with integrity, with love and compassion, a life that stood for what is just and right. A life that fed the poor and dispossessed with good food and good news, a life that sought to liberate all who were captive or enslaved to powers that degrade life, sap it of its joy and beauty. Yes, the powersthat-be that felt threatened by this life of life thought they could snuff it out, silence him by killing him, crucifying him. But God had/has the last word - the joke's on you. April Fools! You thought ultimate power over life and death was yours, that you had the last word - no, April Fools!

As the apostle Paul says, "we preach Christ crucified, to the Jews a stumbling block, and to the Greeks foolishness..." You would have to be a fool to believe that the God of all creation, creator of all that was and is and will ever be, the great I AM, mystery of mysteries, was incarnate in this man, Jesus of Nazareth, a man chosen by God, yet a man mocked, tortured and killed. The Crucified Christ...whom God raised from the dead. What does that say about reality! That's right, Paul says, "we are fools for Christ." Yep, that's who we are. Christ is risen! Happy Easter! These courses are designed for persons 12 years old and up, regardless of boating skill. Courses are nationally approved, and course completion will allow persons to legally operate a boat in states requiring Basic Boating Safety Courses. Everyone who completes the course will be issued a Basic Boating Safety Certificate. All graduates in the 12 through 15 year-old age group will be legally allowed to operate a motorboat without adult supervision. Dear Houghs Neck Residents,

Last month, the majority of Legislative Joint Committees reported out the legislation that came before them, whether favorable, unfavorable, or to further study. The House and Senate Clerks have been processing thousands of these reports as more than 5,000 bills are filed each legislative session. All committee reports have to be read on the House or Senate Floor and then referred to a standing committee in each branch. The majority of legislation will be referred to either the House or Senate Committee on Ways and Means for financial analysis.

On February 14th, the House of Representatives approved legislation expanding consumer options in cases of data breaches. As the Chair of the Joint Committee on Consumer Protection Professional Licensure, my and committee members and staff worked to produce this legislation in less than four months. In addition, as the Chair I led the House floor debate, reviewing and recommending action on floor amendments, making a presentation in the House Democratic caucus, keeping in communication with the Republican Caucus members, answering legislators' questions, and responding to media interviews. The months leading up to debate were extremely intense and had us working with a number of organizations including the Governor's Office, Attorney General's Office, the committee members, Boston Chamber of Commerce, Massachusetts Banking Association, Associated Industries of Massachusetts, MassPIRG, AARP, and a number of data security companies and experts. Ever since the Equifax breach last September, at least 7 different Congressional Committees have been investigating the matter. My committee was able to provide new consumer protections and vote on the issue in months. House Bill 4232 was engrossed by the House on a 152 to 0 vote. The legislation is now before the Senate.

House Bill 4232 builds on the existing law that was established in 2007. Credit reporting companies are under federal jurisdiction, but the federal law allows states to provide certain consumer protection measures. Over the past decade, technology has changed and the means by which we securely communicate has changed as well. House Bill 4232 reflects those changes by updating the current laws to reflect technological advancements. The most important aspect of the



legislation is the ability for residents to freeze and unfreeze access to their credit report without cost. The current law allows credit reporting agencies to charge consumers up to \$5 to freeze or unfreeze their credit, totaling up to \$15 to freeze or unfreeze your credit with all three of the major credit reporting agencies. The removal of the fee allows consumers to have more control over their credit without any financial burden. In addition, credit reporting companies will be required to freezes and unfreeze your credit within 15 minutes of the request if it is done through the credit reporting company's secure website or by telephone.

With the bill passed by the House, parents or guardians will be authorized to establish a credit freeze for incapacitated persons or individuals under age 16. There are increasing reports of children or incapacitated persons having their identity stolen and new lines of credit being opened in their names. This bill will allow parents or guardians of incapacitated persons to place a freeze on their credit on their behalf. Minors, or children under the age of 16, do not have a credit report and it's not until they are able to get a job at 16 that they begin developing credit. By allowing credit reporting agencies to develop a "file" or record of an individual under 16, they can then place a freeze on the file to provide extra protections for young people against identity theft. Businesses in Massachusetts that require a review of

of all identity theft is that of credit cards and bank accounts. Under federal law, the financial institutions pay for the fraud not the consumer. Social security numbers, however, can be used to create fake identities, open bank accounts or create lines of credit. Credit monitoring will alert a consumer of any action taken that will affect their credit report.

Entities that suffer a data breach will be required to report to the Office of Consumer Affairs and Business Regulations any updated information in a timely manner after the initial breach report. There is an exception when state or federal law enforcement directs the breached entity to withhold information because there is an active investigation. The initial notification to the public is important, but it is equally important that the state and the public are updated regularly as new information is discovered.

Lastly, a consumer that contacts one credit reporting company to activate a credit freeze will be provided information by said credit reporting company about the other two companies, should the consumer desire to get credits freezes from them as well. The three credit reporting companies are Experian, TransUnion and Equifax. A credit reporting company cannot require any consumer to get a credit freeze; this must be a voluntary action by the consumer. Providing contact information only gives the consumer choices about what actions to take next.




