

The Houghs Neck Community Council would like to invite you to join us for a Winter Blood Drive, on Tuesday, Feb. 21st, 2017 from 2:00PM ~ 7:00PM at St. Thomas Aquinas Hall, Houghs Neck. We will have plenty of homemade goodies. Hall is handicap accessable. Everyone that visits to donate MUST have at least one form of Identification ie; Drivers License or a passport. If you arrive without an ID you will be turned away. Appointments are highly recommended but walk-ins are very welcome. ATTENTION: The American Red Cross is closely monitoring the Zika virus. We ask you not to donate if any Zika virus risk exposures applies to you. We are asking you to return to donate blood 4 weeks after your last risk exposure. All other eligibility requirements still apply. After you make your appointment you can pre-register and answer the health questions with rapid pass at the redcross.org site. Blood Facts (From redcross.org)

It's a fact... you must wait 56 days between whole blood donations.

4.5 million Americans will a need blood transfusion each year.

43,000 pints: amount of donated blood used each day in the U.S.

Someone needs blood every two seconds.

Only 37 percent of the U.S. population is eligible to donate blood - less than 10 percent do annually.*

One pint of blood can save up to three lives.

Healthy adults who are at least 17 years old, and at least 110 pounds may donate about a pint of blood - the most common form of donation - every 56 days, or every two months. Females receive 53 percent of blood transfusions; males receive 47 percent.

Four main red blood cell types: A, B, AB and O. Each can be positive or negative for the Rh factor. AB is the universal recipient; O negative is the universal donor of red blood cells.

One unit of blood can be separated into several components: red blood cells, plasma, platelets and cryoprecipitate.

Red blood cells carry oxygen to the body's organs and tissues.

Red blood cells live about 120 days in the circulatory system.

Platelets promote blood clotting and give those with leukemia and other cancers a chance to live.

Plasma is a pale yellow mixture of water, proteins and salts.

Plasma, which is 90 percent water, makes up 55 percent of blood volume.

Healthy bone marrow makes a constant supply of red cells, plasma and platelets.

Blood or plasma that comes from people who have been paid for it cannot be used for human transfusion.

Granulocytes, a type of white blood cell, roll along blood vessel walls in search of bacteria to engulf and destroy.

White cells are the body's primary defense against infection.

Apheresis is a special kind of blood donation that allows a donor to give specific blood components, such as platelets.

Forty-two days: how long most donated red blood cells can be stored.

Five days: how long most donated platelets can be stored.

One year: how long frozen plasma can be stored.

Cancer, transplant and trauma patients, and patients undergoing open-heart surgery may require platelet transfusions to survive.

A patient could be forced to pass up a lifesaving organ, if compatible blood is not available to support the transplant.

Thirteen tests (11 for infectious diseases) are performed on each unit of

donated blood.

Shortages of all blood types happen during the summer and winter holidays.

Shortages of all blood types happen during the summer and winter holidays. Blood centers often run short of types O and B red blood cells.

The rarest blood type is the one not on the shelf when it's needed by a patient.

There is no substitute for human blood.

If all blood donors gave three times a year, blood shortages would be a rare event. (The current average is about two.).

If only one more percent of all Americans would give blood, blood shortages would disappear for the foreseeable future.

46.5 gallons: amount of blood you could donate if you begin at age 17 and donate every 56 days until you reach 79 years old.

The actual blood donation usually takes about 10 minutes. The entire process from the time you sign in to the time you leave - takes about an hour.

After donating blood, you replace the fluid in hours and the red blood cells within four weeks. It takes eight weeks to restore the iron lost after donating. You cannot get AIDS or any other infectious disease by donating blood.

10 pints is the amount of blood in the body of an average adult.

One unit of whole blood is roughly the equivalent of one pint.

Blood makes up about seven percent of your body's weight.

A newborn baby has about one cup of blood in his body.

Giving blood will not decrease your strength.

Any company, community organization, place of worship or individual may contact their local community blood center to host a blood drive.

Blood drives hosted by companies, schools, places of worship and civic organizations supply roughly half of all blood donations across the U.S.

People who donate blood are volunteers and are not paid for their donation. 500,000: the number of Americans who donated blood in the days following the September 11 attacks.

QUINCY POLICE WILL BE PROVIDING FREE BASIC BOATING SAFETY COURSES

The Quincy Police Marine Unit, in partnership with the Massachusetts Environmental Police, will be presenting three Basic Boating Safety Courses at no cost to the public. These courses are designed for persons 12 years old and up, regardless of boating skill.

Courses are nationally approved, and course completion will allow persons to legally operate a boat in states requiring Basic Boating Safety Courses. Everyone who completes the course will be issued a Basic Boating Safety Certificate. All graduates in the 12 through 15 year-old age group will be legally allowed to operate a motorboat without adult supervision. The same is true for 16 and 17 year old youth who wish to operate a personal watercraft (jet ski, wave runner, etc.) In addition, some insurance companies offer policy discounts for customers that complete a Basic Boating Safety Course.

Houghs Neck has been the beneficiary of many past Community Grants Preservation including the Maritime Center, Manet Lake assessment. environmental Leo Kelly Park, and regrading the softball field and improving the fencing and basketball court at LaBreque Field.

This year, I have worked on two applications for Houghs Neck. After hearing concerns from neighbors, I have requested \$300k for new playground equipment, landscape improvements and amenities to Macy Street Park/Grenham Playground. I have held two community meetings on Macy Park.

After hearing from residents near Perry Beach say that for years they were welcome to use a private dock, with that no longer being installed, boaters would like floats at Perry and others mention wanting docks for kayaking, etc on that side of the Neck. I have worked with the Quincy Police Marine Unit to request \$80k for engineering, permitting, design and acquisition funding for floats for that area. If granted, these funds would be available July 1st. Then we will have a community meeting to discuss how best to install the floats at Perry Beach.

The other applications I'll be supporting are the Houghs Neck Garden Club request for funding for Leo Kelly Park and the Houghs Neck Congregational Church request for historic preservation funds for repairs to the Belfry. These projects are all scheduled for a public hearing of the Community Preservation Committee on Thursday, February 9th at 7pm at Coddington Hall, 34 Coddington Street.

On January 9, 2017, I attended the MEPA-Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act Site Visit for the Houghs Neck Maritime Center. The City of Quincy was represented by

Bond and the Quincy Police Marine Unit/Harbormaster. Participating agencies included MA Department of Conservation & Recreation, Office of Coastal Zone Management, Division of Marine Fisheries and the Army Corps of Engineers. As part of the permitting process for this project, MEPA conducts a preliminary analysis involving all permitting agencies to be involved in the process. On my website, MargaretLaforest. com, I have posted the decision by Secretary Matt Beaton of the Commonwealth of MA Executive Office of Energy & Environmental Affairs which concludes that the Houghs Neck Maritime Center Project doesn't need to file an EIR, Environmental Impact Report. Concerns were noted relative to the floats as they currently sit in the mud at low tide. While we'd like to put skids on the bottom as suggested or put on top of ramp to get away from the low tide conditions, concerns due to the fetch damaging the floats make these options unfeasible. The other major concern noted is the Maritime Center building is currently in the Velocity Zone of the FEMA Flood Maps (FIRM). When completing major improvements above 50% of the value of a structure, the building code requires the structure be made FEMA compliant. The options are to either elevate the existing building, build a new building in the same location to Velocity Zone standards or the move the building to a higher elevation out of the flood zone. We have contracted with Wessling Architects and are just beginning the process to look at the future needs of the building and to determine what will work best for this location.

our engineering consultant Tighe &

have been running into the same issue when they go to make home improvements and the government is not exempt from this regulation. The Conservation Commission granted approval for the boat ramp construction and the Chapter 91 application for the ramp construction is being filed this week.

On Thursday, February 16th at 6:30pm, I will be hosting a neighborhood meeting regarding the application to the Zoning Board of Appeals filed by Bob Galligan to subdivide the parcels containing Louis Parking Lot from the Restaurant. Bob previously filed this application and intended to develop the Parking Lot parcel with condominiums. The condo proposal was opposed by all the neighbors and myself. At that time, a neighbor suggested the city using Community Preservation Funding to acquire the parcel and to have it for a shared neighborhood use. While a shared use may have some merit, at this time, the City has not taken any action in regards. Mr. Galligan has stated that due to financial struggles of the restaurant, he is interested in subdividing the parking lot for a private sale. I was quite surprised to hear that he filed the subdivision request without contacting me directly, as all zoning applications require Councilor notification by the applicant. I asked for a continuance by the Zoning Board so that the neighbors could hear from Bob and get their questions answered. The Zoning Board of Appeals will hear this matter on Tuesday, February 28th at 7:15pm in the first floor meeting room of Old City Hall. I encourage anyone with questions or concerns to attend and express your support for or opposition to this project. If you are unable to attend any of these meetings and would like to express your opinion for the record prior, you can send a letter to the Quincy Zoning Board of Appeals at 55 Sea Street, Quincy MA 02169 or email Inspectional Services Director Jay Duca at jduca@quincyma.gov and you can always contact me directly. One of my most important roles as your Ward Councilor is to keep you informed of matters that may affect you. I welcome you to contact me if you have a question or need additional information. As I complete this month's bulletin, the House of Representatives and Senate are debating the House Rules, Senate Rules and the Joint Rules. The rules establish the parliamentary procedures for the 2017-2018 legislative sessions for each chamber, for the joint legislative committees, and for standing committees. this time, committee assignment recommendations from the Speaker of the House, the Senate President, and the House and Senate minority party leaders have not been made. Once they make their recommendations, each branch's respective political parties will hold a caucus to approve or reject the recommendations. Once committee assignments are given, legislators will begin the process of moving offices and taking up legislation moved into committee.

The legislative filing deadline for immediate referral to joint committees was January 20th. The co-sponsoring period ended on February 3rd. The House of Representatives filed 3,706 bills and the Senate filed 2,057, for a total of 5,763 bills. I have been reviewing requeststo co-sponsor legislation throughout January. have received hundreds of co-sponsor requests regarding nearly a thousand pieces of legislation from constituents and advocacy groups alike. I cannot co-sponsor everything, but I am giving every request consideration. I have personally filed 76 bills this legislative year and have highlighted a few below.

I am working with the District Attorney on several bills, but two in particular are of interest. The first is "An Act regulating sex offender

The bill will require sex offenders to include their Internet identifications as part of their sex offender reporting information. This would include, email addresses and social media aliases. Several states, including New Hampshire, have implemented similar versions of this proposal.

The other bill I filed with the support of the District Attorney is "An Act relative to drug driving". This bill would enable police officers to become certified Drug Recognition Experts. With the legalization of marijuana, many questions have been raised about how to prevent drug driving when there is no breathalyzer or other non-invasive test to determine if an individual is under the influence of mind-altering substances. Certified Drug Recognition Experts are trained to recognize signs of drug use, providing probable cause for an arrest. Further tests would be required to prove the influence of drugs, but this bill would provide police officers with the probable cause needed to initiate an inquiry into drug usage while driving.

Another bill I filed is "An Act relative to providing dental care to senior citizens "which would provide full dental coverage for senior citizens under MassHealth (also known as Medicare/Medicaid). Currently, MassHealth provides only the most basic coverage. Senior citizens pay thousands of dollars outof-pocket for dental care, presenting a major challenge for those who live on fixed incomes. If this bill were passed, seniors would be covered to receive restorative, endodontic, and

periodontal treatments, as well as dentures.

"An Act establishing senior citizen toll discount on the Massachusetts Turnpike, the Ted Williams Tunnel and the Tobin Bridge" would provide a 25% discount on tolls for drivers 65 years and older who own their own car. The bill also establishes penalties for individuals who abuse the program. There are similar senior discount programs in New Jersey and Florida and they have been implemented with great success.

"An Act requiring employers to employed individuals to be trained in OSHA" would require all employees and contractors in the construction industry to have at least 15 hours of training under the United States Occupational Safety and Health Administration requirements. bill became a priority after the tragic death of two individuals in the South End last fall. This tragedy could have been prevented if proper training had been in place. The bill would require the Board of Building Regulations and Standards to establish regulations for certification, make information public about violations, sets up fines for violators, and create

guidelines for municipalities to be able to refuse permits for applicants in noncompliance.

"An Act increasing the annuity for gold star families" would increase the state's annuity to gold star families from \$2,000 to \$2,500. This increase would be the first in over a decade.

"An Act relative to mandatory reporting of elder abuse" would require individuals who work or care for senior citizens to become mandatory reporters and report cases of abuse to the Office of Elder Affairs. The bill is similar to other bills that require the mandatory reporting of child abuse and abuse of persons with disabilities.


