Annual Awards Program

Carl Proehl Award

To recognize those career and technical educators who currently have performed active service above his/her regular educational duties to career and technical education within the state of Florida. The recipient of this award must demonstrate a leadership role in promotional and leadership activities which increased local or statewide support for career and technical education. The recipient must also have been involved in activities promoting the goals of the Florida Association for Career and Technical Education. This award symbolizes the qualities and leadership exemplified by Dr. Carl Proehl for whom this award is named.

D.C. Jaeger Corporation – FACTE Student Award

A tuition scholarship for \$1000 is awarded to an outstanding career & technical education student for the first year of enrollment at any state university or community college with a major field of applied technology or other career and technical field.

Hall of Fame— Professional & Support

The Hall of Fame was established to perpetually recognize our most outstanding and distinguished professional career and technical educators and support professionals, organizations or businesses, who have made a long term significant impact on the field of career and technical education in Florida.

Joe Mills Career Excellence Award

To recognize a career and technical educator who has made outstanding contributions that are of state and/or national significance. This significance should be aimed toward the improvement, promotion, development and progress of career and technical education. This award was established in 1987 to honor Joe Mills for his consummate dedication to the goals of career and technical education and the profession throughout his career. 
