

Dear Folks,

We begin every Lenten season acknowledging our need for God's mercy and forgiveness. We profess that "we are created to experience joy in communion with God, to love one another, and to live in harmony with creation." (From the Invitation to Lent, ELW Leader's edition, pg. 617) In an effort to more fully experience that community, we are invited to engage in self-reflection, prayer, fasting, and sacrificial giving including works of love as part of our Lenten practices.

On Ash Wednesday I confessed that I feel like we have been living a Lenten season since Lent 2020. Over this past year, we did not need the ashes on our forehead and the words, "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return" to come face to face with our fragile mortality. The limits of our earthly life are detailed on news reports every evening. As it stands now over 500,000 people, loved ones to others have died from COVID-19. We have taken a year long journey of the sacrifice of social distancing, mask wearing, giving up plans to travel, visit family, and generally living a normal life. Gone is the beloved music and singing in our worship. It's been a year of sacrificing not being with loved ones as children are born and loved ones die.

In many ways we are like the people in the prophet Joel's time who heard the call to repent in troubled times. Joel proclaimed that even though the people were living in days of darkness and gloom, God was still with them. Joel reassured his people of God's mercy and steadfast love.

We, too, have that gift from God of steadfast love and mercy. Yes, in Lent we are called to examine ourselves because of our sin and brokenness. Yet, because we are loved by God, we have the promise of salvation through Jesus Christ's death and resurrection. It is by God's grace and mercy in our baptism, that we are released from that sin to live a new life.

Perhaps in this Lenten season, we don't focus on the sacrifices we usually do, sacrifices that hold no lasting meaning as they disappear come Easter Sunday. Instead, let us use our prayer and repentance to remind us of the grace filled life we live because of God's love and forgiveness for us. Perhaps our daily prayers can remind us that we are imperfect people and need God's love and mercy. Admitting we are in need of that grace, perhaps we can even extend that grace to others. Let's not be so quick to judge, but quick to share God's love, grace and forgiveness with others.

This past year has been tough on everyone. As we look for better days to come, allow God's love, grace, and mercy to sustain you through this present moment. God's grace has brought us this far and will continue to be with us in the days to come. May you have a meaningful Lenten season that reminds us of the sacrifice of God's son for us.

Baskets of Promise

"...satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday." Isaiah 58:10

When emergencies like natural disasters or conflict arise, many families must flee their homes, leaving their belongings behind. When they arrive in a refugee camp or other place of safety, they are scared, vulnerable and dirty from the travel. The simple items included in a Personal Care Kit allow them to wash away the dirt and sweat, with the fresh scent of soap and the softness of a towel as reminders of someone's care and concern for them in their plight.

Items may be brought to the church during the Lenten Season.

Each kit includes:

- One light-weight bath-size towel (20" X 40" to 52" X 27"), dark color recommended.
- Two or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars.
- One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging.
- One sturdy comb, (no picks or fine-toothed combs);
- One metal nail clippers (attached file optional)

If you wish to participate, but rather have someone else do the shopping, please place your donation in an envelope on the offering plate marked "Personal Care Kits."


