## NO CHANGE IN DORVAL'S PROPERTY TAX RATE

### COUNCIL APPROVES 1961 BUDGET

The tax rate of 8.5 mills or 85 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation remained unchanged from the previous year as Dorval's City Council officially approved the city's 1961 operating budget amounting to \$2,384,569.46 last Friday evening.

In other words, the tax bills for most residents will be the same as 1960, with a slight reduction for those whose homes have depreciated slightly in assessed value because of age.

The 85 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation is broken down as follows: 61.9 cents general tax; 4.8 cents special tax to cover collector sewers; under by-laws 187 and 392; and 18.3 cents special tax to cover recreation services and facilities (excluding swimming pools) under by-laws 436, 440, 455 and 479. 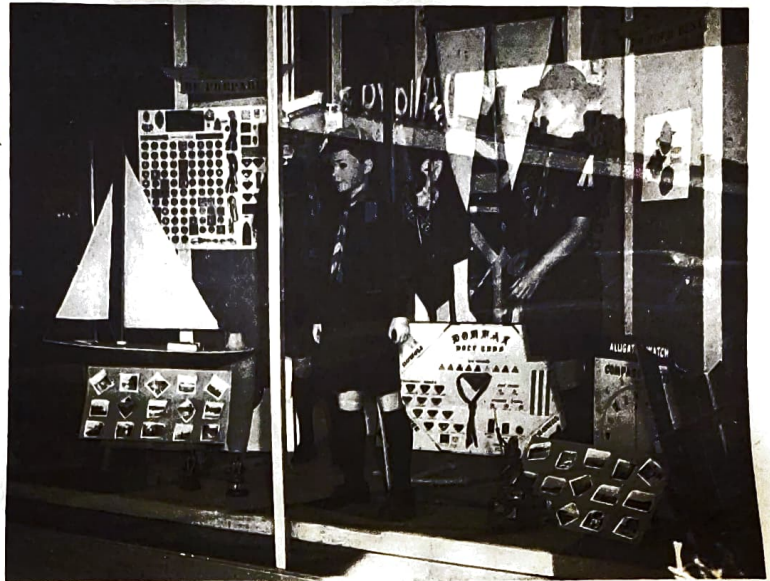

### City Council News & Notes

#### RAGWEED CONTROL

At the February 17th meeting of the Dorval City Council, a notice of motion was made by Alderman G.C. Goodale for the preparation of a by-law to control ragweed and other obnoxious weeds on private property.

The city is also looking into the continued control of Dutch Elm disease within Dorval's boundaries and expects to release an announcement in this regard within the next week or two.

#### AMUSEMENT CENTRE

A request by a Mr. Lou Wiseman for permission to operate a Go-Kart Concession Track and Trampoline Health Centre off Cote de Liesse in the east end of Dorval was referred to the City Planning Committee for study and report to the Council's committee meeting on March 10th.

#### HANDFIELD CIRCLE OUTLET

The proposed erection of a house which would block an existing pedestrian outlet from Handfield Circle to the Boulevard was the subject of a petition from a delegation of Handfield Circle residents at Friday's Council meeting. As a result of their representations, the City agreed to get in touch with the property owner concerned and obtain agreement to leave a five foot pathway along the west side of the lot in question.

#### BUILDING PERMITS

Building permits representing construction valued at

\$74,100 were approved. Of this amount, \$55,000 covers a proposed service station at the newly-planned airport entrance.

#### ROAD ROAD SALTING

A letter from Mr. F. Revell to Mayor Pratt concerning the application of salt to roads in Dorval was read to Council. Mr. Revell recommended the

### DORVAL RECREATION ACTIVITY SETS CONTINENTAL RECORD

In a comprehensive report submitted to City Council last Friday evening, Mr. Roger Bastien, Dorval's Director of Parks and Recreation, revealed that the general

attendance at pools and winter recreation facilities in the city amounted to more than ten times the total population of Dorval, or double the North-American average. In 1960, over 121,500 people made use of the swimming pools alone, while close to 60,000 have participated in or attended winter games such as hockey, skating, broomball and curling.

Following is a breakdown of total participants and spectators at the various pools during a selected period of 8 weeks from December 19, 1960 up to and including February 12, 1961.

**John Pratt says**

The Government recognizes that the first essential step to meet unemployment is to assist those who are out of work. For the first time, federal Unemployment Insurance now covers four million Canadians. For the first time, Unemployment Insurance benefits now cover the full 52-week period. Many workers (married women, fisherman, seasonal workers, etc.) who were formerly left out are now covered.

A recent international study described Canada's Unemployment Insurance Plan "the most generous and comprehensive in the world."

The Winter Works' Program introduced by the Government was this year extended to begin on October 15th.

Present estimates are that it will provide an additional 165,000, and possibly 200,000, extra jobs for Canadians this winter.

Government engineers across the country have been instructed to report on and recommend any projects, large or small, that can be proceeded with at once in the public interest.

Contractors on \$54 million worth of federal Public Works projects have been instructed to carry on through the winter. An additional 103 federal projects are to be started this winter.

In the last three years Canadian exports have increased by 10% a time when many of the leading industrialized nations have been having serious trade difficulties. In the same period, imports into Canada have dropped by 3%.

Canada has entered a new era of prestige and influence in world affairs. The leadership given to the Nations of the Commonwealth and the other Middle and Small Powers has opened new prospects for peaceful settlement of differences and has brought hope to the peoples of many lands still struggling for their freedom.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker's plan for National Development has

set the stage for a new era of progress and expansion in Canada. It began in those areas which had not received a fair share of the general national progress. It has given the greatest lift in many decades to the economy of the Atlantic Provinces. It has opened up the Canadian North as never before in our history. It points the way for the Prairie Provinces to participate in the industrial progress of the rest of the country. by Mr. Charles Larose, the City of Dorval has refused cooperation to the Dorval Chamber of Commerce.

We would like to emphasize that this is far remote from the truth. We have offered to the Chamber of Commerce, like to all other groups interested, our most sincere and complete cooperation in promoting industrial development within the limits of the city. We have told the Chamber of Commerce and all other similar groups that they can count on our cooperation at all times, and should they uncover, on their own efforts, individual prospects, we will endeavour to supply all necessary information to welcome a new industry in Dorval.

We did, however, tell Mr. Larose that we could not give him the names of the prospects who are interested in coming to Dorval or who are negotiating with different real estate companies acting on behalf of the owners of the land since the information was given to us in strict confidence. Some years ago, unfortunately, the City lost two large industrial prospects because of too much publicity. The competition in this field among municipalities is very keen and our neighbouring municipalities of Lachine, Pointe-Claire, St. Laurent and Town of Mount Royal have a very extensive development program competing strongly with Dorval.

We believe in the old adage that "too many cooks spoil the broth" and therefore told Mr. Larose that we failed to understand how releasing confidential information to a public body would benefit the City, but we did reiterate our desire to cooperate 100% for the benefit of all the citizens of Dorval.

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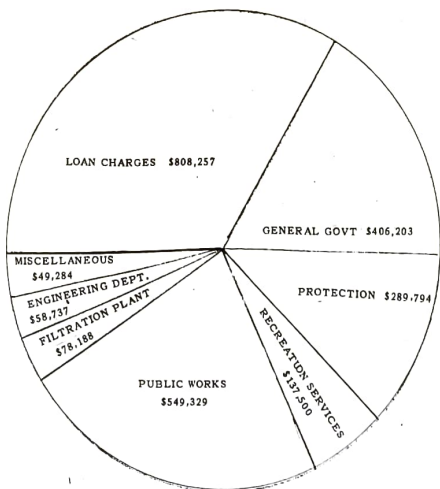

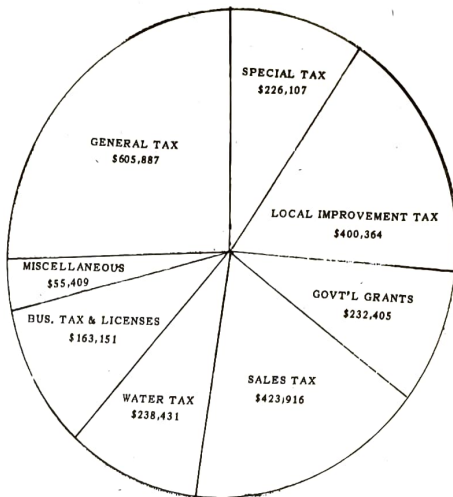

## NEW LAKESHORE DIRECTORY

Homes and offices in Lachine began receiving the latest edition of the telephone directory this week (starting Wednesday, February 15), and telephone-users were asked by local Bell Telephone Manager R. C. B. Love to put it to use immediately.

"The new directory became effective as of the date of delivery, and because of the many new and changed listings, subscribers should bring their Blue Books of Telephone Numbers or other personal lists up to date without delay," Mr. Love stated.

The front cover of the new book features a black-and-white sketch of the *Basile Cloutier* Town Hall. Drawn by Albert Cloutier, A.R.C.A., to commemorate the municipality's 275th anniversary, it is set-off at top and bottom by the green panels recently introduced to make telephone directories more colorful.

The back cover contains illustrations of the colors and models of telephones available, including the new Princess set which made its appearance here last summer.

According to Mr. Love, 25,000 directories are being distributed in Lachine this year, an increase of more than 2,050 over the number delivered in 1960. In all, more than 62,000 are slated for the region covered by the book, compared to about 56,000 last year.

The over-all figure this year includes copies for subscribers in *Ville de Lery* who were formerly listed in the *Valleyfield-Beauharnois* directory. Following a recent opinion survey, these *Ville de Lery* telephone-users have been transferred to the *Chateauguy* exchange from *Beauharnois* in order that they may have free calling with the metropolitan Montreal area, and their new numbers have been interlisted with *Chateauguy* customers in the new directory.

The directory also lists subscribers in *Pointe Claire*, *Ste. Anne de Bellevue*, *Coteau de Lac*, *Coteau landing*, *Hudson*, *Rigaud*, *Roxboro*, *St. Clet*, *Ste. Genevieve de Pierrefonds*, *Ste. Justine de Newton*, *St. Polycarpe*, *Vaudreuil* and *Dorval*.

## C of C Discuss City Charter Amendment

The monthly meeting of the Dorval Chamber of Commerce held last week at the Green Lantern Restaurant, was highlighted by an active discussion of the proposed amendment of the City Charter concerning signs and by the showing of movies of the Swiss expedition which unsuccessfully attempted to climb Mount Dhaulagiri in 1958. The movies were shown by Sandoz(Canada) Limited with the compliments of Chamber President, Gordon Graham.

The discussion of the City Charter amendment arose when it was brought to the attention of the meeting that the City intended to present a proposal to the Private Bills Committee at Quebec on the next day to place very severe restrictions on the advertising by means of signs in the City. It was pointed out that the power to regulate signs was already a part of the Act governing the City and that the amendment would merely bind future City Councils to a course of action which they might not wish to follow since further change would also require charter amendment. As a result of the discussion, the Secretary was instructed to send telegrams to the head of the Dorval delegation and to the Chairman of the Private Bills Committee requesting that the matter be shelved until it could be given further study and until the industry, commerce and citizens of Dorval could be given an opportunity to comment on the

proposed change.

Also discussed at the meeting were the suggestion of a rail service from the Airport to the centre of Montreal, the plans for the new hospital fund drive and the progress being made in the campaign to end water pollution. With respect to the latter heading attention

was drawn to the Quebec Chambre de Commerce brief on water pollution which would soon be presented in Quebec. Among other things it is expected that the brief will urge the government to augment the federal assistance now available for sewage treatment plants.


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## Comment on Sports

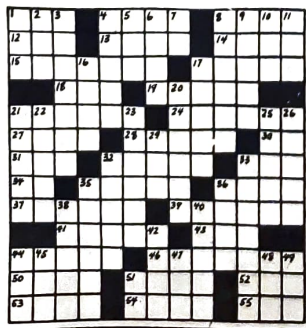

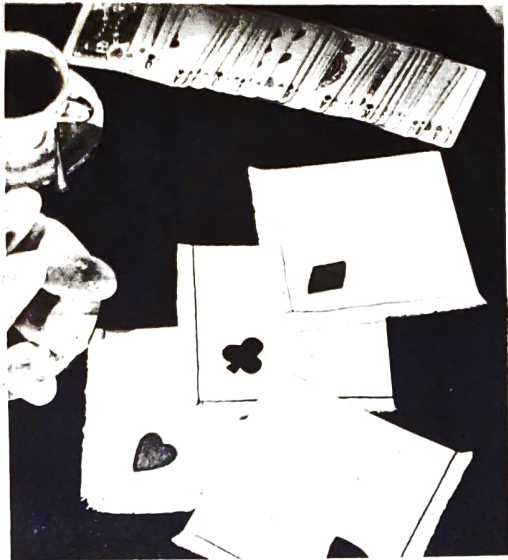

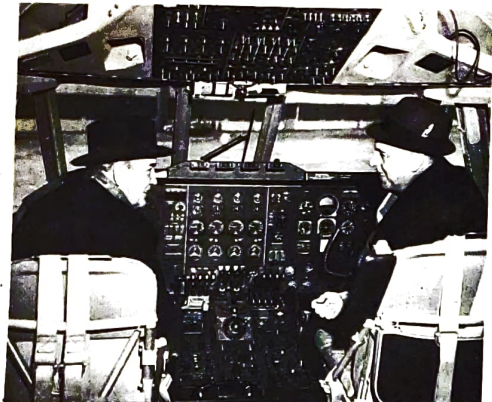

In 1960 actual expenses totalled approximately \$2,249,786.00 and the city ended up with a modest surplus of \$4,634.00. A true comparison with the 1961 budget expenditures is difficult to make because of several variables such as the item of \$97,241.50 in 1960 for the Trans-Island Boulevard - which item does

not appear in 1961 because of the Provincial Government's decision to assume this cost. However, certain specific comparisons of like items are possible; e.g. interest on bonds and redeemed bonds expense is up by some \$141,290.00; city hall staff salaries have increased by approximately \$19,935.00 because of additional staff and salary increases; increased fringe benefits for all municipal employees as a result of new union agreements ac-

counts for a jump of \$37,063.00 over 1960; a new union agreement providing higher salaries for police and firemen, plus additional staff in this department, results in an increase of \$51,181.00; while another \$20,276.00 rise in expenses is accounted for under recreation services. The city is planning a pamphlet explaining in detail how the tax dollar is spent, and it is expected this will be mailed to each taxpayer within the near future.
