have been considering this thought lately. The idea is that we worry if we got it right.

When we face something about the Bible or God we cannot answer, or there is a difference in opinion, we often conclude, "We will find out when we get to heaven!" We believe that when we go to heaven,

God will answer all our questions, all those we could not answer or figure out here on earth.

But is that necessarily going to happen?

The more I think about it, the more I do not believe this will happen. When

we get to sit in the total presence of God and experience his glory, majesty, and power in person, will we sit there with our score sheets and see how we did back on earth? Can you imagine? You are in the complete presence of grace, love, and majesty for eternity, and you got your theology 70 percent correct! That last part seems so unimportant against everything that heaven promises us.



Now, I am a pastor. My calling is to attempt as best I can to understand the truths of scripture and communicate those truths in preaching and teaching regularly. I would not be very good

at this calling if I got up every Sunday, threw my hands up, and said, "Does it all really matter?" Of course not, because that is untrue, also.

Our innermost desire is to know God more, to grow in knowledge, faith, and love in him. God created us to be in

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relationships, to grow in love and knowledge of one another and God. Desiring to understand God more is a good thing!

But as we all experienced at one time or another, God's thoughts and ways can be a mystery to us. We do not understand. We cannot comprehend. People seem to reach different conclusions than us. They perceive God in a way that seems foreign to us. The question for us is: what do we do when we hit those points?

Do we dig in and say they are wrong and we are right? Do we obsess over figuring out God,

determined to will an answer out of him? Or do we allow these times and moments for the all-knowing God to shape us? Maybe the mystery is that we must rely on God and not ourselves. Maybe that foreign viewpoint is just what we need to break through in a stale season of growth. Maybe, when we are face to face with God in heaven, that worry is not actually a big deal.

The truth is this: if you are a follower of Jesus Christ, you will be with him in the presence of God for eternity. Gladness and joy will be forever. May that be the thing we obsess over and treasure.
