# Pastor's Word

It was a brutal winter, with extreme cold, lots of snow and a blizzard to boot. (And that would be a snow boot.) After 179 consecutive days with snow on the ground (OK, that's a slight exaggeration), there are finally signs of spring. The giant snow pile in the church parking lot is still hanging on, but we are hoping it will be gone soon.

It seemed to me to be past the time when the crocuses should have been coming up at our house. When the snow finally melted, I could see daffodils peeking out from the ground, but no crocuses. My working theory was that they had already emerged, shriveled, and died under all the snow. Or that it came time to emerge, but they saw all of the snow and just said, "Forget it." But I was set straight by folks with more gardening knowledge who said that it all depended on the ground temperature, and the crocuses would show up. So I looked yesterday, and sure enough, the first couple of crocuses have just made it out of the ground.

The bigger springtime story at our house has to do with our maple tree, struck by lightning last summer. The strike had such power that not only were many of our electronic devices fried (as well as those of several of our neighbors), but tree roots were literally blown out of the ground. An arborist told us that at least 2/3 of the tree would die, and that prognosis seemed to be borne out when the leaves of 2/3 of the tree began turning red in early August while the rest of the leaves changed color in October, as usual. So I was amazed yesterday to see leaves budding on pretty well the entire tree. It's too early to know if the tree will make it, but there is hope.

The themes of spring – of renewal and rebirth and growth - fit so well with the great celebration of Easter. Even when it may seem otherwise, God is still there. Even in the dark moments, God is working to bring forth life. Even when there is decay and the threat of loss, there is hope. And even on the other side of death, we have the promise of resurrection.

I hope you will join us for worship this month as we remember the excitement of the triumphal entry, the supper shared in the Upper Room, the darkness of the cross, and the great joy of resurrection.



# **April is Food Shelf Month at FBC!**

Mid-Iowa Community Action, Inc. (MICA) serves a variety of families in many different ways – all their families have their own unique needs. We collect items and money twice a year in February and September. We all know times are hard and some families are facing a trip to the Food Shelf when they have never before needed to and may have even donated in other years. First Baptist has a strong tradition of supporting the work the Food Shelf does.

Most Needed Items! Hamburger Helper Rice Rice mixes Potato mixes Soup

#### Other items needed:

Non-perishable, unopened, and unexpired food items - Bring things that YOU would enjoy eating.

Jell-O, hot cocoa packets, juice, pasta, pancake mixes, syrup, tomato products such as paste and chunks, coffee, tea and canned chicken, peanut butter, tuna, flour, sugar, canned beans – this provides protein for some families

**Personal hygiene items** – bath soap, shampoo, women's supplies, shaving crème and deodorant, toilet paper, Kleenex, paper towels

Household supplies –dish soap, cleaning products

**Infant needs** – diapers of all sizes and wipes, baby food

Money – Mica likes to give food vouchers to be used for milk, eggs, meat and fresh vegetables and fruit.

MICA's food pantry is entirely community funded. With financial aid they are able to shop for items that they are out of, often at reduced prices that are given to food shelves across the country.

# Community ID Program



Many community residents, including many citizens, do not have the necessary requirements to receive a driver's license or state-issued ID card. This is an issue in dealing with businesses,

health care providers, social service agencies, law enforcement and more. AMOS congregations in Story County are launching the Central Iowa Community ID card, a photo ID that is reliable proof of the holder's identity and residence. The first ID card drive is Saturday, March 30, at St. Cecilia Catholic Church, 2900 Hoover Ave., Ames. Doors open at 9 am and orientation from Ames Police and other community leaders begins at 10:00. Plan to devote several hours between orientation, paperwork, and photos. The card costs \$8 (cash only) and has a life of two years.
