## **Rockhound Adventures: Wayne & Kathy Larson** Southeastern Oregon Sunstone

Wayne and I have wanted to try our luck at sunstone mining for a few years. We have seen the jewelry and carved pieces at the rock shows and jewelry stores and drooled over the exquisite beauty of these delightful stones. So, when Max Hatfield and Pat Lambert announced their extended fieldtrip and offered to let us tag along, we were delighted. We could not do the entire trip but agreed to meet them at the sunstone mining area in south eastern Oregon. Little did we know the adventure we were about to embark on.

It is a 7 hour journey to the mining area. The first half of the trip was uneventful with lots of trees, water and mountains along the way. However, on the other side of Burns is another story. Desert, dry conditions exist with very little to look at and few towns to stop at. We located the turn-off onto a gravel road named Hogsback, but our silly GPS insisted we take the first turn-off which was supposed to be quicker and shorter. We should have ignored the GPS and stayed on Hogsback, which is a few miles longer but a much better road. Instead we took a road that is rightly named Nasty Flats. Later we found a brochure that warned about this road.





We were pulling a tent trailer and it was going okay until we missed our turnoff (again the GPS telling us to go another direction). We continued on Nasty Flat Road and the road got worse until we hit a section that looked a bit like goat trails with lots of embedded rocks and potholes. We knew something was wrong and was ready to turn back when the inevitable happened (see picture of flat tire). After changing the flat on the tent trailer, we traced our way back to the correct turnoff and finally found the campground.

By now it was late and we scurried around setting up camp, then took a moment to look around.

The night sky was magnificent. Stars filled the air. I was too tired to stay up late, but did manage to spot 2 shooting stars and a couple of satellites. The next morning was better and we were eager to find out about sunstones.

Sunstones are feldspar crystals formed in molten lava and left to cool upon the earth. Eventually the cooled lava or basalt starts to break apart and the crystals are exposed. At the certain times of the day, mornings

or afternoons, the sun is at enough of an angle to cause these gems to glow like fire. In the public campground sunstones glowed all around us and are free for the taking. We filled a bag with these small beauties but the better ones are to be found in the mines.

Several mines exist in the area, Double Eagle, Dust Devil and Spectrum to name a few. Dust Devil has a conveyor belt which makes the picking of stone easier, but the belt was down for repairs during our stay. We instead tried the Double Eagle mine. At this mine, material is bought out by backhoe and loaded



onto a table where we were able to sort and keep all that we found.

Sunstones come in different colors, with the ones containing red, blue or greens being the most desirable. There are bicolor, watermelon, dichroic and color change stones. Some of the stones contain copper which glows in the sunlight.

Now that we know what to expect and which roads to avoid, this will be something to do again.

We got to Succor Creek, off loaded the 4 wheelers and headed to Pleasant Ridge picture jasper to collect from the mine tailings. We went back to Pleasant Ridge again the next day and then tried to find the Blue Badger picture jasper mine. We rode a short while and passed a place that could have been Blue Badger but seemed much too close to where we were so kept going and going. Saw some beautiful country and the only two people we saw the whole six days we were at Succor Creek. The next day we went back to the suspected Blue Badger mine. While Max was digging through the tailings, he suddenly jumped up because of the most beautiful centipede (bright orange and yellow) that came zipping out from beside him and



continued on its way. We decided that with the very bright colors the centipede was probably not something we wanted to mess with so didn't hunt him down so we could get a picture. We rode around looking for some of the other old mines but didn't find any other good jaspers. We did, however, find our yearly scorpion.



We continued on to McDermott to play a few slots and wait for Chris and Jerry Sorensen and Barb and Richard (from the Yakima Club). We moved out of the RV park to the Cottonwood Creek campground outside of McDermitt. We spent a few days hunting McDermitt thundereggs, Gary Green jasper, and McDermitt wood, got a little of each and had a great time. We had all signed up to go opal hunting with the Cataldos. We met them at the camp ground at Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge. It is a great camping spot – a hot springs pool filled with guppies that nibble on you if you stay still, and a hot springs shower. We went to the Kokopelli Opal Mine to dig in the bank for opals and to search the grounds for fossilized pinecones. We did a very successful job of We left Succor Creek a day early because we wanted to stop at Silver City, a location we had never been to. As we followed the road to Silver City, we realized that if we met anyone on the road it would be dangerous. We were a pickup camper pulling a trailer and unable to back around some of the sharp corners and no place to pull off to pass because of the river on one side and the hill on the other. We finally found a flat spot to turn around and made it out without encountering another vehicle. Silver City is on our agenda for next time we are in the area. On we went to Jordan Valley, where we visited the small museum. Since we were in the area, we stopped for some snakeskin agate. It is always a fun place to camp and pick up a few pieces. The sunset there was beautiful.

We left for Hart Mountain and wanted Wayne and Kathy to come with us but they stayed in the sunstone area. The Hart Mountain Antelope Refuge is another gorgeous area with a really great hot springs. We spent the next day taking in the sights of the Steens Mountain loop (9,600' elevation). There was still snow at the higher levels but it had been cleared off of the roads and the roads were recently graded so it was perfect timing. What an incredible place.

## **Rockhound Adventures: Dom & Evelyn Cataldo** Henry Mountains – Where the Dinosaurs Roamed



One of our favorite places to camp and rockhound is the Henry Mountains in southeastern Utah; south of Hanksville and adjacent to the Glen Canyon Recreation Area and Lake Powell. Once again, this past September we heeded the call of the Henrys and headed south.

Following a circuitous route, we traveled through the picturesque towns of Loa, Limon and Bicknell and onward through Capitol Reef National Park to Hanksville. A few miles east of Hanksville, we turned south on Highway 276 and headed into the Henrys. The Henrys run in a generally north-south direction, extending over a distance of about 30 miles. The Henry Mountains and the surrounding deserts are considered remote

and other than water enthusiasts on their way to Lake Powell, the chances of meeting other people in the area are low. Therefore, you want to carry extra water and be sure that your vehicle is in good working condition.

The geology of the Henry Mountains is quite interesting. Millions of years ago, semi-molten diorite from within the earth's interior forced itself upward into the overlying layers of the earth's crust to form high domes called laccoliths. Today these domes form the five major peaks of the Henry Mountains. The five major peaks of the Henrys are Mount Pennell, Mount Ellen, Mount Hillers, Mount Ellsworth and Mount Holmes. Erosion has now exposed the hardened diorite core of the mountains. The domes and arched sedimentary rocks are seen as flanks of the mountain range. This process is dramatically displayed at the southern end of Mount Hilliers.



We usually camp near Star Springs in a cowboy corral area surrounded by juniper and pinyon trees. Tranquil days and unbelievable night-time skies highlight our time spent near the base of Mount Hilliers (elevation 10,723 feet).



During the day, we explore and search the deep canyons of the Henrys for petrified wood, agate, jasper and dinosaur coprolite. Although agatized dinosaur bone is found in the Henrys, collection is forbidden. One of the prizes from the Henrys is petrified cycad – from the time of the dinosaurs.

Some of the best, most colorful cycad ever found came from the Clay Point area of the Henrys. The rare *Hermanophyton* has been collected from the Brushy Basin formation around Hanson Creek

Canyon. The black Mancos shales yield small ammonite and marine specimens. Dinosaur coprolite is found in several locations within the Henrys; always fun to find that special specimen to take home.

But best of all is the opportunity to enjoy the spectacular scenery presented by the Henry Mountains. Rugged, plunging canyons, multi-hued soils, towering mountains, and the desert environment combine to present photographic excellence. Our time spent in the Henrys is always memorable. *Evelyw Cataldo* 

## **Rockhound Adventures: Dom & Evelyn Cataldo** Rockhounds in Costa Rica

In January, Dom went to Costa Rica. The Costarican coffee growers are having a problem with rust and Dom and his partner went down to see if they could provide a solution. I tagged along to keep them out of trouble.

This was not our first time in Costa Rica. As a couple, this was our fifth trip, plus Dom had traveled in Costa Rica on business an additional four times. We do enjoy the country and its people.



Wonderful sightseeing and experiences are foremost in our memories of Costa Rica; rockhounding not so much. In all the trips, not a rock shop has been found nor an opportunity to collect. The hotel that we stay at, Hotel Bogainvillae, has an excellent lobby display of minerals and rock found in Costa Rica. However, the specimens pale in comparison to those from other countries. We have seen a few rocks displayed in gift shops here and there. We have yet to find a specimen worthy of purchase and transport back to the U.S.A.

However, there are two museums in the heart of San Jose that would be of interest to the traveling rockhound. The first is the **Museo de Jade**. This museum houses a large collection of pre-Columbian jade artifacts dating from 500 B.C. to 800 A.D. Jade was the most valuable commodity among the pre-Columbian cultures of Mexico and Central American, worth more than gold. No local source of jade has ever been identified within Costa Rica; jade was traded from Guatemala and neighboring regions.

Many of the jade pieces are pendants of fertility goddesses, shamans, frogs and

snakes. The craftsmanship is excellent and the artifacts are in a fine state of conservation. Besides the extension collection of superbly crafted jade pieces, the museum houses some amazing pre-Columbian pottery.

The second museum is the **Museo del Oro** which contains over 1600 dazzling pieces of pre-Columbian gold items dating back to 500 A.D. The artifacts range from simple round earrings to intricately worked representations of local animals and humans. The Indians used the lost wax process to create the golden images. The craftsmanship is extraordinary.

If you happen to be in San Jose, Costa Rica, don't miss an opportunity to visit both of these fine museums. In addition, there are many extraordinary sights to see and fun things to do in Costa Rica.

This cab should not be set into a mounting so the judges can see your technique on the edges and back. If your cabochon has been set, then it needs to be entered into Category 5.

**Category 3 – Silverpicker of the Year:** Bring something (cab, stone, carving, rock, jewelry, etc.) that you have purchased at a rock show, rock shop, yard sale or from a hobbyist that will impress us.

**Category 4 – Faceter of the Year:** Bring your bling and treat us to the sight of the best gemstone of the year that you have personally cut. The gemstone can be loose or in a setting.

**Category 5 – Project of the Year:** Show us your flair and skill by entering something that you have made between 11/1/13 and 10/31/14 and incorporates rock in some manner. It can be a sphere, a piece of jewelry, bookends, a gem tree, a carving, or ???? If you made it using rock, it's eligible. If the number of entries warrants, jewelry items may be separated into their own subcategory.

**Category 6 – Steal of the Year:** Some of you have a real knack for finding "great deals". Bring a rock or rock-related item that you have purchased during the contest period that cost between \$1 and \$10. Free rocks are not eligible. Showcase your genius for searching out bargains.


