As a New York State Assemblymember, I attend Legislative Session in Albany from January through June. This is the time of year that we research, propose and vote on hundreds of pieces of legislation for the State, and pass a yearly Budget of more than \$150 billion. These legislative and budget bills affect services provided by state government, local municipal governments, schools, health and human service agencies, law enforcement, and other services which affect residents' everyday lives.

During the rest of the year, I spend time visiting the various organizations, neighborhoods and communities of the 129th District, meeting with individuals, business and school officials, and members of various agencies that enrich and support our families and community. It is through these meetings that I continue to learn more about the real issues affecting people's lives locally.

This is an integral part of being an Assemblymember, enabling me to better connect with the people I am serving. These interactions also allow me to determine whether certain legislation and policies may positively affect lives, and/or what else might be done.

The local community consists of an ever-changing combination of people, service providers, businesses, and non-profit organizations. The needs of the community are also always changing. One way to address changing needs is to meet with the people who are dedicated to serving the community. This newsletter includes some of the events and meetings I attended with my constituents.

In addition, many of my Assembly colleagues visited Central New York during the summer. Local Elected Officials Participate in Respectful Civil Discourse Debate



Assemblyman Magnarelli was a participant in a panel discussion presented by LeMoyne College President Linda LeMura entitled "Respectful Civil Discourse." Political pollster John Zogby, a native of New Hartford, moderated the event, which also included Assemblyman Al Stirpe, Senator John DeFrancisco and Onondaga County Executive Joanie Mahoney. The panel spoke about what has led to the current political climate and what can be done to reverse the trend. Students asked the local elected officials about their public offices and the influence they have in local political debates.

Regional Economic Development Council Meets in Syracuse

Since Governor Cuomo first initiated the Regional Economic Development Council process six years ago transforming our state's economic development strategy, Assemblyman Bill Magnarelli has been a voting member of Central New York's Regional Economic Development Council (CNYREDC). This year marks the 7th year of this competitive process which has enabled our region to receive \$529.1 million for 505 projects, the largest amount awarded to a regional council to date. This year, each of the 10 regions are competing for awards of up to \$20 million in grant funds which will be given to 5 regions, and the remaining 5 regions will receive up to \$10 million in grant funds. Awards will be announced later this year.

An Empty Factory Now Renovated

Assemblyman Magnarelli attended the opening of the newly renovated R.E. Dietz lantern factory building located by Leavenworth Park in Syracuse. The developer, Matthew Paulus, and representatives from state and local government were also on hand. This new multi-use project transformed the empty manufacturing facility into 92 market-rate apartments and commercial space. Assemblyman Magnarelli said, "I congratulate everyone involved for taking an abandoned industrial site and turning it into a cornerstone for further

investment on the West end of Syracuse. The revitalization of the former Dietz Lantern Factory building is another positive step for the City that will complement ongoing development and growth in Downtown Syracuse and the Inner Harbor. These investments are bringing people and businesses back to the City." The project received \$900,000 in NYS grant funding through the CNY Regional Economic Development Council. In addition, the project will also receive State Historic tax credits through the NYS Historic Preservation Office.



DestinyUSA Hotel Opens

Assemblyman Magnarelli attended the special ribbon cutting ceremony celebrating the opening of the new 209-room Embassy Suites by Hilton – Destiny USA Hotel on September 12th. Also in attendance were Senator David Valesky and County Executive Joanie Mahoney. The Inner Harbor area is currently going through a renaissance and will continue to evolve over the next few years creating another important community asset for our region.



Assembly Hearing on Adult Homes Held in Syracuse

The New York State Assembly Committees on Health, Aging, and Social Services held a public hearing in Syracuse on safety and quality of adult homes ("adult care facilities") at the State Office Building. Chairpersons Assemblyman Richard Gottfried, Assemblywoman Donna Lupardo, and Assemblyman Andrew Hevasi were in attendance to hear testimony.

"To ensure quality care for our community's aging individuals, it's essential we make certain that the State provides the individuals and facilities overseeing their care with proper rates of reimbursement," said Assemblyman Magnarelli. "To shortchange them would mean that we are not financially supporting the systems that protect and care for our seniors in their times of need."

The hearing examined the availability and quality of adult home services, including the impact of increased funding for such programs. Adult homes house both aging individuals and those with complex medical or mental health needs, providing supportive services for independent living. These homes offer a level of care less intensive than nursing homes or enhanced assisted living, but more than senior living. Adult homes are funded largely by Medicaid and the New York State Supplement Program (SSP) which provides financial support to the aged and disabled. Advocates are concerned that the current SSP rate is too low, shortchanging facilities and affecting quality of care. Adult homes allow seniors to live more independently and avoid more expensive nursing home placement. Many local adult home administrators provided testimony on the challenges they face in providing quality care and service.



New Law Keeps Telecommunications Operations Local

The Governor recently signed legislation (A.6527-A) sponsored by Assemblyman Magnarelli which will ensure that the NYS Telecommunications Relay Center remains in Syracuse through 2020.

The NYS Telecommunications Relay Center is based in Syracuse and provides telephone service for the deaf, hard-of-hearing, deaf-blind, speech-disabled, or late-deafened people who use text telephones (TTYs) or voice carry-over (VCO) phones. The Center's operators provide the "Cap-Tel" service where operators provide text captioning, so the hearing impaired can communicate by phone. The Center employs approximately 100 people in Syracuse.

Assemblyman Magnarelli noted: "Passing this legislation ensures the NYS Telecommunications Relay Center will remain in Syracuse. This Center provides an essential service for the hearing impaired across the State. Keeping the Center in Syracuse protects nearly 100 local jobs and ensures these employees can continue providing quality service to New York residents."

CNY Diaper Bank Celebrates National Diaper Awareness Week



Assemblyman Magnarelli visited the CNY Diaper Bank as part of National Diaper Need Awareness Week, September 25 through October 1, 2017. Michela Hugo founded the CNY Diaper Bank in 2016 and has since distributed more than 200,000 diapers. The diapers are provided to struggling families through a growing network of 15 local social service agencies. Buying diapers can be a struggle for families living in poverty, as diapers are not covered by SNAP or WIC benefits and can cost more than \$100 a month. An inadequate supply of diapers can negatively affect the health, hygiene and welfare of both the parent and the child. Board members Kate Canada, Cayla Clark and Peggy Liuzzi joined Hugo and Assemblyman Magnarelli in the picture.

Celebrating with the Everson Museum



Assemblyman Magnarelli recently visited the Everson Museum of Art as a part of a national Visit Your Museum Week. Elizabeth Dunbar, Director & CEO and Everson Museum Board Chair, Cliff Malzman, accompanied Assemblyman Magnarelli on a tour of the Museum which provides our community with important programming for people of all ages. Last year, educational programming at the Museum served 13,000 visitors and included tours, lectures, classes, family programs and social events. In addition, the Museum hosts 80,000 visitors annually. The Assemblyman also learned about present and future plans for renovations and programming.

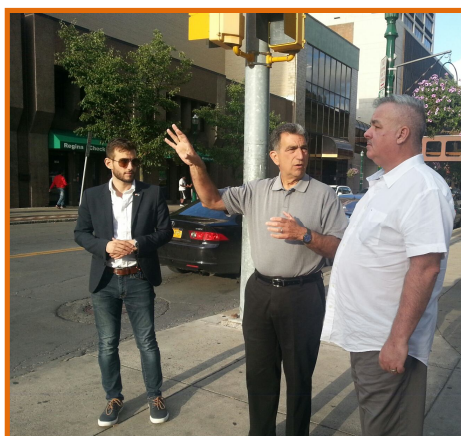


Chair of the Assembly Tourism Committee Tours Syracuse
