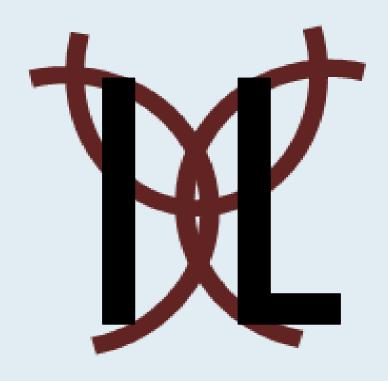

2023 PASTOR'S REPORT

Thank you for the privilege of serving God another year at Immanuel Lutheran Church; Bill and I feel blessed to be a part of your family of believers. In 2023 activity almost returned to what it was pre-Covid19. Even though Zoom has become a part of the fabric of meeting life, it is no longer the main form of group gatherings, although I did attend several classes and training sessions via Zoom. I was also off work for almost seven weeks due to having hip replacement surgery. Thank you again for the meals that were brought to our home for the first two weeks while I was not allowed out of bed.



This year our administrative secretary Lori Nemenz retired, and we had a retirement party for her which was well attended. We spent several hours interviewing candidates, hired, and trained Delani Kinzig, and she resigned due to health problems before the year was out. I would like to thank Debbie Redditt for the many hours she spent with the interviewing, hiring, and training processes, (Bob Dorler also helped with the interview process), and also for the hours she put in doing the job of secretary for the last month and a half of the year, then on into 2024. (A new secretary has been hired by the time of this report and Debbie is in the process of training her.)

Unrelated to the office or pastoral work I would like to thank Debbie and Bill Redditt for all the work they put into the Powell Ave. rental house renovation which was due to the damage done by the tenant. The house needed some remodeling, so this forced us to have it done. I know there were many other people who donated their time and talents into the renovation project, I'm sorry I can't name you all, but know that your efforts are greatly appreciated.

Other church related activities that I have been a part of this year were the Soup Cookoff, the



Trail of Treats, the Holy Trinity Sloppy Joe dinner, Sea-



wolves game, Adult Sunday school classes, confirmation classes, Bible studies, a noon Ash Wednesday service, the Wednesday evening Lenten services, a healing prayer service, an attempt at an 11:00 a.m. worship service (that did not garner enough attendance to continue), and Christmas Eve candlelight services which happened on the fourth Sunday of Advent.

Other activities I have participated in were attending the Pastor's weekly Bible study on the scripture readings (pericope), attending monthly Clergy Community of Practice meetings (a continuing education event held in Fredonia, PA from September through May), attending bi-monthly clergy lunches with other pastors from the Erie Conference, attending Erie Conference meetings, holding Confirmation classes, posting weekly sermons on Facebook (thank you Bill Kostur for videoing them), phoning area businesses to inform them of the Ash Wednesday noon service, hand delivering flyers to the neighborhood for the Trail of Treats, mailing Christmas cards to members with Christmas Eve service times (unfortunately I used 5 p.m. instead of 5:30 p.m. for the early service start



time), and I created and mailed post cards to the neighborhood with the (correct) Christmas Eve service information.

Beyond this, I made or received over 135 phone calls, visited 9 people in the hospital, 32 people in the office, and 7 people in their homes. There were 2 infant baptisms, 3 youth were confirmed, I officiated at 3 funerals (one was not in the church) and attended 18 meetings beyond the ones mentioned in the above paragraph.

I am thoroughly enjoying ministry with you here at Immanuel Lutheran Church. Thank you for your willingness to support our church. I am looking forward to another year in ministry with you.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2023

As my term has come to a close, I would like to thank my Immanuel family for the opportunity to serve as your council president for the past six years and for trusting in me to function in this capacity. What a journey it has been. The journey may have been challenging at times, with each year presenting a direct adventure, but it was also very rewarding. I have learned a lot about Immanuel Lutheran Church, its operations and its family. Looking back, I have taken us through coop meetings and a decision on joining the West Erie Cluster, scheduling and working with lay ministers, interviewing, hiring and renewal contract of a Pastor, downsizing to one service, resignation and replacement of our treasurer, first time closure of our church due to a world-wide pandemic, Covid protocols, drive-in parking lot services, payroll protection loan from the government, new boiler replacement in 2021, hiring of a new secretary, (actually two), updates to the garage and West 10th street rental unit, reorganization of outdated investment funds, bank account and utilities, wi-fi network placement throughout the building, terminating a tenant for cause and a major renovation to Powell Avenue rental house. It has been a privilege to share the joy, struggles, grief as we walk in faith with Christ by our side.

Immanuel has been guided this past year by the Holy Spirt to continue our ministry with wonderful, record accomplishments. We started the year in January 2023, with a **record** collection of 212 hats, mittens and scarves to donate to the children in need at Bethesda. February followed with a



record Souper Bowl monetary collection for the Holy Trinity Pasta Kitchen. February also saw the return of the soup cook-off with 8 delicious entries and all attendees had fun and left stuffed. Our administrative secretary, Lori Nemenz retired on March 23 after seven years of service. We thank her for her dedicated years of service. A new secretary, Delani, was quickly hired at the start of Holy Week, but recently resigned due to health concerns. In April, three confirmands were affirmed in Holy Baptism. In May and November, we had two successful **record** bake/book sales with a total revenue of nearly \$1K. Pastor Karen hosted three bible studies this past year in Lent, Pente-

cost and Advent. The Council designated the 2022 quarter Sun-

day monies for food to be purchased for the food pantry. This year's quarter Sunday donations was a **record** \$329.52. A brighter future ensued in May when the old fluorescent lighting was replaced in key areas with new LED lighting and Immanuel has already realized savings in our Penelec bills. A new security/video camera was installed, so office staff, working alone, can easily see those approaching the entry doors. I also applied for an received a grant for non-profits, for free Microsoft 365 and One Drive which has been installed on the office computer.

In the summer, the Property Committee also removed a rotted tree on the property and did some tree trimming over the parking lot. A dogwood tree will be planted, in that area in the spring, in memory of Char, from memorial donations given *continued*



by the Feiler-Lee family. The council also designated the John Leubin memorial monies to update the church sign with LED panels with other monies donated from Concordia Lutheran.

The Erie Gives campaign was another **record** breaker with our generous members giving \$12,400 to Immanuel with additional bonus bucks from Erie Community Foundation for a total of \$13,075.73. Now that the ECF is charging fees for credit cards and administrative/ technology fees, it would be more beneficial for Immanuel members to think ahead and mail in a check to ECF.



During the end of summer, God provided us with a perfect Sunday for an outdoor service. We also tried to host a second service for parishioners who requested a later time, however since the service was not well attended, the service was eliminated. The Social Ministry committee was crazy busy with collections for a **record** Coats for Kids collection, thanksgiving dinner stuffing, bus passes, school supplies and even hosting the October Holy Trinity dinner. Fellowship, Outreach and Growth provided a well-attended, wonderful outdoor picnic for us and

nice coffee hours at the first of the month, which are appreciated by many. The "Close Enough" quilters were quite busy sewing a **record** 128 quilts, which were blessed in October. The quilt group hosted their first National Quilting Day sponsored by Thrivent.

But undoubtedly the largest project of the year was the removal of the tenant, renovation, cleaning, painting and re-renting of the Powell Avenue rental house. A lot of my time and effort was

spent communicating and coordinating with our Church Mutual insurance, Serv -Pro and the tenant. Unfortunately, I did need to seek legal counsel, due to the tenant's unwillingness to vacate and she was given five days to vacate, as the house was not in a livable state. After the tenant vacated, she left 90% of her possessions in the unit which needed to be disposed of before cleaning and painting could commence. Cleaning, painting, demolition of bathroom, minor repairs, purchasing of products and fixtures and small updates were *continued*

accomplished by Immanuel volunteers. I appreciate all who helped Bill and I. A contractor was hired for installation of the new flooring, bathroom fixtures and removal and installation the kitchen cabinets along with some wall repairs. The unit was finished in mid-December and was rented in two weeks with the tenant taking possession on January 8, 2024. As the unit rented so quickly it does confirm the need for moderate priced, quality housing in our commu-

nity. We received \$24,472.64 from Church Mutual for the insurance settlement, which was used for repairs, mediation, restoration and renovation of the unit.

I could not have accomplished my goals without the support and caring of our Church Council, Standing Committees and staff members: Bryan, Lori, Wally and Delani. A huge thank you to our Treasurer, and my husband, Bill Redditt, for the countless hours he puts in to write checks, input the treasury, balance the books, create reports, manage payroll and put up with all our mistakes!

Many thanks to all of you for your service in whatever capacity you have been called. Perhaps you were a council member, committee member, choir member, altar guild, clean-up capacity, or just greeted us with a kind work or smile. Every person, member or visitor is important in this congregation.

We are blessed to have so many dedicated members and visitors who attend each week. *Now, there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who empowers them all in everyone (1 Corinthians 12:4-6).* I appreciate all of you for your generosity and the giving of your time, talents and treasures, which are essential to keep Immanuel prospering. We are an important part of the Lakewood community and continue to be a vital congregation for now and hopefully the future. Your giving helps us to remain focused to accomplish our call to serve our neighbors and our God. So, let's get excited and break more records this coming year and invite others to Immanuel to share the Good News!

WOMEN'S QUILTING GROUP

The "Close Enough" Quilt Group worked all year producing 128 beautiful, unique quilts. In March, the Quilting Group celebrated the Lutheran World Relief's National Quilting Day Project. The sewers hosted members of other local Lutheran churches and members from a local quilt guild. The Close Enough sewers demonstrated how quilts are assembled for Lutheran World Relief, sharing the dimensions and how they are layered and tied. Demonstrations included cutting the fabric with electric shears, sewing squares together, binding the quilts, assembling, tying and the use of a 'holey' sheet. A \$250 grant was received from Thrivent to host the event. The grant was used to purchase new shears, needles, scissors, and pins.



On October 1st, the Quilt Blessing was held. During the year, 55 quilts had been donated to various organizations and groups, including: 46 to those suffering from the war in Ukraine, four to the Liberty House for homeless Veteran men, one to the Bethany Outreach Center for their annual golf fundraiser, and one to a local homeless man. After the blessing, the remaining quilts were sent to Lutheran World Relief. LWR ships the quilts all over the world, including places like South America and Africa. Immanuel's quilters are giving a special blessed momentum to families all over the world.

The quilt group is always looking for volunteers to help tie quilts on Monday mornings at the church at 9:30 am. In addition, we are always in need of donations of cotton blend sheets and fabric. This past year we were blessed with a large donation of fabric, batting and heavy thread.



WORSHIP AND MUSIC REPORT

We started off this year with a Hymn Sing at the Convocation meeting of several churches in the West County Cluster. Bryan Timm was on top of everything from bringing the organ and the hymnal to playing his fingers to the nubs! This was well received by all in attendance.



The Presque Isle Flute Choir came to our service on February 20th and gave us some beautiful music. The Flagship City Chorus also performed during a worship service for Prelude, Offetory and Postlude in August. I received great feedback from those that attended.

On September 28th five of us went on an excursion to Franklin to view the Tiffany Stained Glass windows at St John's Episcopal Church lead by their Pastor and my dear friend

Shawn Clerkin. These windows are so beautiful. We also took part in their Eucharist Service they have every week. We then departed for a delicious lunch down the street. Thanks again to Rick Durst for driving.

We are still finalizing the Altar Guild schedule for this year. Not as easy as you think! Right ladies!



I would like to give a special thanks to Pastor Karen and Bryan Timm for their help and dedication to Immanuel. Things run smoothly because we have these people keeping us moving forward.

MUSIC DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Being the third year following our pandemic, it is with great relief that I can say that our 2023 activities in the music department were conducted in a completely normal manner. No masks or isolation were necessary throughout the year which allowed at least our typical calendar to follow business as usual.

In an overview, our choir members all assembled on Thursday evenings to help support and lead in congregational song. As normal, the only variant of this is during Lent when rehearsals are conducted after the Holden Evening Prayer on Wednesday night. Our 2022-2023 year concluded with Music Sunday which showcased not only the role and importance of music in our worship, but how it works in harmony with the lectionary and architectural imagery. During our summer break we were treated to the Flagship City Chorus and the Flute Choir, both in residency at ILC. Trail of Treats was our typical outward engagement with the Lakewood community at large. With the choir season beginning again in September, we resumed our Thursday night rehearsal schedule. Christmas Eve once again saw an outpouring of guest musicians at the late service providing and extended meditative prelude with antiphonal organ works, violin, cello and guest pianist. We also welcomed numerous guest vocalists to join our choir.

In June, I had the honor to attend my first ELCA Synod Assembly as a representative of ILC. However, I also was in attendance in many other capacities. I was the accompanist for all daytime worship activities and also provided an outdoor hymn festival in conjunction with fellowship and fireworks at the request of the Bishop. If you personally have not experienced a Synod Assembly, I must urge you to consider. The event was all encompassing and a rich opportunity to connect to the larger community in a meaningful capacity.

2023 overall has felt like a transitional year for me. Much like many of us, it has been a year to establish a routine in the "new normal" following the community scars of the pandemic. However, the term "new normal" is far from adequate to really describe our situation, we still continue to struggle with diminishing resources and continually changing social norms. Having mentioned the Trail of Treats above, I take some personal pride in that activity having started it as an experiment to create meaningful interaction on a night so many of us expressed that we no longer wanted to participate because we were alone. Seeing it become a night of collaboration among our church community and the impact it makes in the Lakewood community is inspiring. I feel we need to create more events such as this that allow us to connect with our neighbors.



In my 25 years of service to Immanuel we have been through a lot together. The biggest concern on most people's minds is

the diminished capacity or resources in the religious sector over the past decade. What has continually astonished me is that despite all of our concerns, Immanuel continues to provide quality and meaningful worship without yielding to convenience. Immanuel is certainly a special family.

SOCIAL MINISTRY YEAR END REPORT 2023

Our year began collecting \$420 in support of Holy Trinity Soup and Pasta Kitchen on "Souper Bowl Sunday".

Twenty personal care kits were created for Lutheran World Relief.



School supplies were collected for Harding Elementary and member, Alli Lee, at Fairview Elementary. Over 200 packs of tissues, rulers, crayons, pencils, markers, glue and many other supplies were donated.

We supported the Coats for Kids drive that Inter Church Ministries organized. With the help of the Concordia Lutheran Memorial Foundation donating \$500, we purchased or had donated 36 coats, 19 hats, 15 pairs of gloves or mittens, and 3 scarves.

At the end of October, we served 49 people at the sloppy joe dinner at Holy Trinity. It was the most people we have served in many years.

We supported Community Shelter Services by collecting money for



weekly bus passes. As of this writing we collected \$250 to purchase at least 33 bus passes. They will be delivered in the new year.

As always without the support and generosity of this congregation the Social Ministry committee could not do the work outlined to help those in need in our community. Many thanks to the good and faithful servants at Immanuel Lutheran.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

We thank all of you for your help this past year in helping to maintain our church and our properties on Powell and 10th Street.

As you are aware, our past tenant on Powell left us with an unimaginable mess. However, sometimes out of ruin and ash a phoenix arises and a blessing follows. We have renovated the Powell home with a new kitchen, bathroom, appliances, cabinets, flooring and fresh paint. We want to thank everyone who worked on this project, and we especially want to express our deepest appreciation to Bill and Debbie Redditt for their time and talent in buying all our fixtures and countless hours in demolition, painting and cleaning. The house is now rented for 1,200 per month.



In the Spring we installed new central air conditioning in our

10th Street rental which had been purchased in the fall of 2022. This allowed us to increase our monthly rent in the unit to cover the cost and was specifically manufactured to work with our new furnace.

We replaced our hot water tank in the church. It was over a decade to be repaired. Replacement was the most efficient and economical way to rectify the needed maintenance and service on the old unit.



New LED lighting was installed by Bill Redditt, Rick Kuntz and Debbie Redditt throughout the key areas of the church.

We want to thank Stan Holsopple for his leadership as chair of the Property Committee for countless years.

We had many members, too many to thank, who contributed time and talent for all these projects. A special thank you to our caretaker, Wally Coughlin, for the maintenance of the interior and exterior of our church. He has been a blessing to our congregation.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT 2023

Even though we haven't had very many children active in Sunday school classes we have tried to keep a somewhat active Christian Education program with adult Sunday school, Bible studies, Vacation Bible School and confirmation classes.

Semi-weekly adult Sunday school classes are held where we delve into the scriptures used for the Sunday sermon. This way we have not only a deeper understanding of the scriptures, but also a more concrete way of applying them. It would be great if more adults would join our Sunday morning study.

There were Bible studies held during 2023. In Lent we studied "On the Road to the Cross", and in Advent it was "Come, Emmanuel". There was also a study using the book "He Leads Me Along Life's Journey" that will be completed in early 2024. 7 or 8 adults attended each study.

On April 16 we had three young people, Brody Bonsell, Trista Paternosh and Nate Paternosh join our church after taking part in two years of Confirmation Classes led by Pastor Karen and Anita Byrne. They were given "Holy Spirit Crosses" to remember their confirmation and their membership vows. The worship service was followed by a cake and beverages to celebrate the confirmands. Please contact the pastor if you have any youth who have not been confirmed in their faith who wish to do so, and a new class will begin.

"Hero Hotline: Called to Serve God Together" was the

theme for Vacation Bible School held at Lakewood United Methodist Church in July. Anita Byrne helped in person and many of the church members made donations of food and monetary support.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2023

The included 2023 Treasurer's Report Statement of Activity for the year ending December 31, 2023 compares our actual 2023 Revenue and Expenses to our 2023 Budget. 2023 Offerings of \$78,767 were 7% above budget (\$5,387 above budget) and 1% below 2022 offerings (\$5,650 above budget).

Rental income for 2023 was below budget by \$ 5,300 due to the 6 month down time of the unit for restoration and renovation in the Powell Ave rental. Both rental houses are currently occupied for 2024. (Rental rates for Powell Avenue were increased in January 2024 to cover increased costs for real estate taxes and improvements to the property.)

All other expense categories were within budget, except for Church/Property repairs and maintenance (Powell Avenue renovation costs), and Benevolence Expense which was \$613 above budget (most of the additional benevolence expenses were offset by designated member contributions).
