BY LAWS OF THE Apostolic Faith Bible College, Inc. Article VII Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- * Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- Creation and Formation
- * Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- * Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life
- * Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul, and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- * Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- * Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- Washing of feet
- * Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- * Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- * Destruction of the wicked
- * Conditional Immortality
- * Rapture of the Man Child Class
- Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- * A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if the are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.

Profaning The Name

This article has been inspired by a message that Bro. Jim Fox preached 30 years ago and from hearing some of the things I've heard people say.

The message was on Exodus 20:7- "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain." Jesus, name above all names, deserves reverence. Hebrews 12:28.. "let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and fear."

I was watching a TV program about house makeovers and I told my wife that many times the children or the parents will say, "o my God" when they see the new or remolded home. Why do they say that? What you hear many times gets in your mind. Why don't we just turn the filth on TV off instead of listening to it?

I'm reading a book, "Releasing God's Anointing in Your Life that has something in it that I believe very much. I love the Lord too much to be entertained by someone taking His name in vain. He has done too much for me to do that. If we do want to release God's power in our life, then we must reverence His name.

Most of us today have no idea of the reverence that the Israelites had for the name of the Lord. To release power in your life, reverence the name. Power is made available to us who believe when we speak the name; power to use against the devil and all his host, power to help ourselves and power to bless others.

We can use His name to fight the enemy. It's a good thing to know that we can have authority over the evil demon of cursing. Maybe we need to tell the devil to shut his mouth. Ephesians 5:4,'neither filthiness, nor foolish talking ,nor jesting, which are not convenient; but rather giving of thanks." If you make a mistake because of bad habits, if you hear yourself slip and use His name improperly, stop immediately and ask God to forgive you. You are actually hurting yourself.

Have you ever looked up some of the words that are used today? Take the word 'oath' for instance. Did you know, according to Webster's, it means (1) a solemn usually formal calling upon God or to witness to the truth of what one says or to witness that one sincerely intends to do what what one says (2) an irreverent or careless use of a sacred name; broadly: SWEARWORD

What about the word profane? (1) to treat (something sacred) with abuse, irreverence, or contempt: DESECRATE (2) to debase by a wrong, unworthy or vulgar use.

The word 'swear' is to (1) to assert or promise emphatically or earnestly (2) to use profane or obscene language: CURSE - transitive verb: to assert as true or promise under oath-swore.

Damn: (1) to condemn to punishment or fate; (2) to swear at; CURSE often used to express annoyance, disgust or surprise.

The word 'euphemism ought to be carefully looked at. It means a substitution of an agreeable or inoffensive expression for one that may offend or suggest something unpleasant; also; the expression so substituted. I urge the reader to look up these terms (Holy, Blasphemy, Vain, Slang, Gee, Golly, Gosh; etc.) and then ask yourself "are the words of my mouth acceptable in Your sight, O Lord, my Strength and my Redeemer?"

I speak blessing upon every believer.




90th Birthday Gelebration



I am writing this letter as a tribute to my Mother, Charlotte Elizabeth Ragan Bridges who died Oct. 18, 2008. in Amarillo, TX at the age of 94 years. Funeral services were held on Oct. 21,2008 and she was buried in llano Cemetery, also in Amarillo.

Charlotte was a strong and faithful servant of the Lord throughout her life. She accepted Jesus Christ at an early age. She was church secretary at the Apostolic Faith Church in Amarillo for 17 years until ill health prevented her from being able to continue her work. The family stayed together and helped each other, prayed and loved one another and always found ways to be happy and always were able to laugh together.

She met Alan Garret Bridges in 1913 and married in April ,1914. Alan worked on a farm close to Clearlake, OK. They later moved to a dairy farm south of Beaver, Ok. He then found work at the Ideal Food store in Beaver and moved to Plains, KS where he was manager and Charlotte was the cashier. In 1952 Alan began working for the Mid-Central Fish Company until his untimely death in 1977. Charlotte then moved to an apartment in Amarillo and was still active in church. 
Services were held at the 1st Baptist Church in Arnett, OK with interment at the Laverne Cemetery in Laverne, OK.


