APRIL 16, 1999 was the official reopening of the Rafael Theater as the Christopher B. Smith Rafael Film Center. To be candid, the goal in getting there was difficult—in fact, it was the largest capital campaign mounted for the arts in Marin County.

That Marin has embraced the Rafael and its mission is a testament to the unique, supportive community that we call home, and that fact alone makes the challenges that we faced even more meaningful.

This summer the Rafael will host a regional version of the six-year-old conference for mission-based cinema organizations called the Art House Convergence. In January 450 art-theater staff, board, film distributors and vendors convened in Utah on the eve of the Sundance Film Festival. The Rafael has become an integral part of the national art-house landscape, working as a catalyst to create an environment that is both enlightening and entertaining and that will help sustain our film heritage, honoring its past and embracing the future.

I'd like to thank the donors whose generosity makes the theater possible, especially Chris Smith, whose name will always be attached to the Rafael's. I also thank you, our audience and true advocates, for 15 great years.

And a very special thank-you to our staff, particularly our director of programming Richard Peterson, general manager Dan Zastrow, as well as our program consultant Jan Klingelhofer, our managers Tim Fross and Ashley Baker, and all the wonderful staff who have contributed to the Rafael being voted Best Movie Theater in Marin 15 years in a row.

THE ORPHEUS LIVED ON this spot from 1920 until 1937, when it was gutted by fire, and the Rafael opened in 1938, serving as a beloved neighborhood theater for the next 50 years. In 1989 the Loma Prieta earthquake shuttered the building.



Nymphomaniac Volume I

The latest from groundbreaking, iconoclastic Danish filmmaker Lars von Trier comes to us as one story told over two English-language feature films. 

This wonderfully charming movie about teenage girl power from Swedish filmmaker Lukas Moodysson (Show Me Love and Together) takes place in 1982 Stockholm, where 13-year-old friends Bobo (Mira Barkhammar) and Klara (Mira Grosin) decide to form a punk band, despite everyone telling them that punk is



dead (as well as the minor detail that they can't play any instruments). They enlist Hedvig (Liv LeMoyne), a demure and religious classical guitarist, cut her hair, and a punk band is born. Based on a graphic novel by Moodysson's wife Coco, this sweet and funny underdog tale captures the rollercoaster of early adolescence with an infectious spirit. In Swedish with English subtitles. 
Breathing Earth: Susumu Shingu's Dream
