SPECIAL GNOME NEWS INTERVIEW

The Gnome News recently sat down with Josh Layton to discuss the newly sponsored sport of Flag Football. This is the second year that SCAN has worked with Josh as he has developed and expanded the Flag Football program with local students. In 2022, students in grades 5 and 6 participated. In 2023, students in grades 5-7 participated.

Gnome News: What was the reason to incorporate Flag Football into the community?

Josh: As a graduate of Cumberland High School, football was a favorite sport in school and became a passion of mine. I was part of a football program from 5th grade through my senior year of high school. Bringing football to the Stew-Stras area provides an opportunity for additional youth to compete and be involved in a sport.

Continued from P 4: Gnome News: What are your short-term and long-term goals with this program?

Josh: This is our second year offering flag football through SCAN Little Hatchets program. The first year was a unique experience not only for the kids, but also for me. The kids who participated last year were upset when the season ended. Those kids now have a better understanding of the game and enjoy playing football on the playground at their schools. Now that we are about to end our second year, the number of players has increased, the players have a better understanding of game strategy, and games have been more competitive. Fan feedback has been great. The games were enjoyable for the fans to watch.

My short-term goals are to continue offering this sport through SCAN and incorporate 8th graders next year to increase the experience of the game. I have reached out to other representatives that reside in other NTC towns to see if they would be interested in also forming a team to start competition against other teams.

Long term goal is to determine if there is an interest in this sport within the NTC school districts. The Flag Football program will be the baseline to develop interest and support to potentially get an 8-Man football program into the High Schools.

Gnome News: What is 8-man football?

Josh: 8-man football is a growing sport in Illinois. Other states have had 8-man football programs for years, but in the recent years it has been gained popularity in smaller schools that cannot man a full 11-man football program but still want to play the game. As of now 8-Man football is not affiliated through IHSA, and there are 30 teams throughout the state with a post season and a championship.

The games can be scheduled on Friday nights or Saturdays, meaning it is flexible to schedule a game to not interfere with other sports. The football field is smaller than a normal football field and can be set up inside of a track.

Gnome News: The NTC has a strong standing with fall baseball; won't this interfere with the fall baseball season?

Josh: If a school, students, and community are interested in adding this sport, a dual athlete could potentially play both sports. Football can also be beneficial for baseball. There are many college and pro athletes who were standouts in both sports as there are similar skill sets required for each sport.

Gnome News: How expensive would it be to start a program?

Josh: Starting this program would be an investment, however, there are ways to assist in getting many of the expensive items. There is a process where larger schools can lend out equipment or sell used equipment that is still good. There are grants and other sources of money that can assist with the expenses. I know this is not something that will happen overnight and will take support from the communities to commit in assisting each school and the NTC.

Gnome News: Why should the communities support this idea?

Josh: Support from the communities is vital to establishing a new athletic program in the school and NTC. 8-man football would offer opportunities (besides baseball and basketball) to many players with different skillsets, abilities and interests as well as add additional seasons for cheer, dance, and pep band.

Flag Football itself has grown and expanded interest not only in the US, but also abroad as the Olympics just added Flag Football to their list of sports for other counties to compete in starting in 2028.

These places include the Shelby County State Bank in Strasburg, First National Bank of Waterloo in Stewardson, Trinity School, Stewardson-Strasburg High



School, St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Strasburg, Strasburg Community Center, Beecher City/Stewardson Clipper Journal office in Beecher City, and Sacred Heart School in Effingham.

All reusable sneakers from their sneaker drive program are recirculated to secondhand markets so people can access quality, pre-owned footwear at affordable prices. All heavily used and damaged footwear are recycled to reuse materials or to convert waste into new energy. The collection of shoes will continue until May.
