PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE...

The World-Wide Witness of the Presbyterian Church and YOU

It never ceases to amaze me: within hours of almost any newsworthy disaster, I can Google http://pda.pcusa.org and find out what the Presbyterian church is doing in response. To date, I have never been disappointed: Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (which is largely funded by our One Great Hour of Sharing giving) is a highly efficient and compassionate organization, capable of moving swiftly into disaster situations, assessing damage and setting up helping agencies and making grants available for recovery.

At present, flooding caused by Tropical Cyclone Idai has affected more than 1 million people in Southern Africa. At this time, the death toll is over 1000. Assessment teams were on the ground within the first few days. PDA is responding through its partners in ACT Alliance in Malawi, Mozambique and Zimbabwe to address immediate needs and will be looking to support long term recovery as the needs develop.

Even before Hurricane Michael made landfall in the U.S., PDA reached out to the presbyteries in the path of the storm to offer resources and prayers. They have deployed National Response Team members for an initial deployment to meet with the Presbyterian and community leadership in developing short-term response plans and provide a ministry or presence. Initial grants have been disbursed to each of the affected presbyteries and church damage grants, which are used for continuing mission, are being disbursed as we receive the requests.

When my former Presbytery, Flint River, was hit by a tornado, PDA was accessible immediately, and on the scene in a matter of days, repairing the Presbytery Office, funding food and water for volunteers and the devastated neighborhood and offering grants for small churches who could not have rebuilt without them.

Right now, PDA deployed National Response Teams to the Missouri River basin to presbyteries that have invited them in, and they are processing grant requests as we receive them. The work of PDA also continues in Haiti, Guatemala, California, Peru, Flint Michigan and among the Rohingya people.

That I am trying to point out is this: we are part of something big, efficient, compassionate and worth every dime we invest in their effort. Believe in the ministries of the PCUSA. Understand the YOU are a part of their saving efforts in this world. I have become a huge fan of Presbyterian Disaster agency and I trust them to represent Christ and us in ministry to this broken world. The One Great Hour of Sharing is only the beginning of good things done in Jesus name. At any time, they are receiving donations to heal this wounded world.

I know there are multiple, wonderful charities which vie for your giving dollars. I also know that with the changes in tax law, some of you may find yourself scrutinizing the agencies to which you donated. I ask you to keep PDA in mind, check out their mission and ministries. We can be proud of them, and of our part in their ministry.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING ~ APRIL 14TH



This year, we are celebrating seven decades of One Great Hour of Sharing. What a wonderful legacy of caring for our brothers and sisters in Christ.

One Great Hour of Sharing began with a radio broadcast in 1949 appealing for offerings for war relief in Europe and Asia. In the 1960s, waves of Cuban immigrants coming to Florida increased the focus on poverty and hunger within our own country. Crises in our cities and efforts for civil rights led to the establishment of the Presbyterian Committee on the *Self-Development of People* in the 1970s. More recently, *Presabyterian Disaster Assistance* funded in part by One Great Hour of Sharing, has helped thousands of families after the earthquakes in Haiti and the hurricanes along the Gulf Coast.

During this Lenten season, let us open our doors, our eyes and our hearts so that we can see vulnerable and afflicted that we have been called to serve. Let us heed the call of Isaiah 58:12 to repairers of the breach through our gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing. Thank You for your prayerful consideration.

NURSE'S NOTES...



Hello April 2019! Yippee! Think SPRING!

Hope all of you are finally enjoying this April weather. Here is a story for you:

Jack strode into 'John's Stable' looking to buy a horse. "Listen here" said John, "I've got just the horse you're looking for, the only thing is, he was trained by an interesting fellow. He doesn't go and stop the usual way. The way to get him to STOP is to scream 'Hey Hey', and the way to get him to GO is to scream 'Thank God.'" Jim nodded his head, "Fine with me, can I take him for a test run?" Jim was having the time of his life. 'This horse sure could run' he thought to himself. Jim was speeding down

the dirt road when he suddenly saw a cliff up ahead "Stop!" screamed Jim, but the horse kept on going. No matter how much he tried he could not remember the words to get it to stop. "YoYo" screamed Jim but the horse just kept on speeding ahead. It was 5 feet from the cliff when Jim suddenly remembered "Hey Hey!" So Jim creamed "Hey Hey". The horse skidded to a halt just 1 inch from the cliff. Jim could not believe his good fortune; he looked up to the sky and raised his hands in the air, breathed a deep sigh of relief and said with conviction "Thank God!" OOPS!

Did you ever wonder about chapped lips? In WIKI there was an article by Dr. Chris M. Matsko in how to avoid and treat chapped lips. Here is how to help chapped lips:

Chapped lips are hard to avoid, and can't be instantly fixed. For most people, prevention is the best cure. For others, chapped lips aren't preventable. Instead, they are a long-term symptom and side effect that must be dealt with and lived with. Most chapped lips can be remedied (and prevented!) with water and lip balm. For severely or chronically chapped lips, consult your primary care physician.

- 1) Apply lip balm. Opt for a plain beeswax balm, or one that contains sunscreen. Lip balm shields your lips against the weather, so don't forget it on dry, sunny, or windy days. Lip balm also seals cracks in your lips, preventing infection. Apply before going out, after eating or drinking, or whenever you notice it has worn off. Avoid flavored lip balms if you have a habit of licking your lips. Opt for a nasty-tasting balm with SPF. Avoid lip balms in pots, as repeatedly dipping your finger into the balm can breed bacteria that you may spread into your cracked lips. Wrap a scarf or hood across your mouth on a windy day. Avoid irritating it as it heals.
- 2) Avoid picking. Scratching, peeling off flakes of dry skin, and biting chapped lips are all tempting, but equally bad for your mouth as it heals. Picking at chapped lips can irritate them and cause bleeding, which will slow the healing process and may invite an infection. It can also trigger cold sores if you are prone to them. Do not exfoliate your chapped lips! Your skin should be treated gently as it heals. Exfoliating can lead to infection.
- 3) Hydrate to heal. Dehydration is a common cause of chapped lips. Drink water and apply moisturizer to your skin. You can heal a mild case of chapped lips in a few hours by drinking water. A more severe case will take longer: drink water with every meal, before and after you exercise, and whenever you feel thirsty. Dehydration is especially common in the winter. Avoid heating your house with dry heat, or invest in a humidifier.
- 4) Visit a doctor. If your lips become red, sore, and inflamed, you may have Cheilitis. (Cheilitis is a condition that causes red, swollen patches in the corners of your mouth where your lips meet and make an angle. Other names for it are perleche and angular stomatitis. You can get it on one side of your mouth or on both sides at the same time.) Cheilitis is caused by irritation, or by an infection. If your lips get so

chapped they crack, bacteria can enter that causes Cheilitis. Your doctor may prescribe an antibiotic or antifungal cream for you to apply until the Cheilitis subsides. Lip licking is a common cause of Cheilitis, especially in children. Cheilitis can be a symptom of contact dermatitis. If you are prone to rashes, talk to your doctor about the possibility of a contact dermatitis diagnosis. Chapped lips are a symptom of many medical conditions, including autoimmune disease, thyroid disease, and psoriasis. People with Down Syndrome often have chapped lips.

Dr. Chris M. Matsko says you can prevent chapped lips by following these suggestions:

- 1) Stop licking your lips. You might unconsciously lick your lips to hydrate them. Unfortunately, lip licking has the opposite effect, since it washes the natural oils off your lips, causing dehydration and chapping.
- 2) Breathe through your nose. Breathing through your mouth can dehydrate your lips. If you tend to breathe through your mouth, practice nose-breathing to get in the habit. Sit for a few minutes each day and breathe in through your nose and out through your mouth. Try sleeping with a nasal dilator strip to encourage your nasal passages to open.
- 3) Eliminate allergens. Keep allergens and dyes off your mouth. Even a mild allergy or intolerance to a food can cause chapped lips. Check the ingredients of your lip balm. Avoid anything you may be allergic to. If you experience swelling of the throat or shortness of breath, discontinue use of the lip balm and call 911.
- 4) Hydrate and protect. To best protect against chapped lips act like you already have them. Drink water with every meal, and keep a glass nearby for whenever you're thirsty. Apply lip balm when you're headed outside or when the heater is on. Cover your face on windy winter days, and use a lip balm with SPF on sunny days.

Pastor Leanne shared the plans for Holy Week services. A Worship Enhancement group will be meeting in May to review our service and make suggestions. Seven members of the congregation have signed up to participate in the Visibility Team. Pastor Leanne will be offering a prayer at the Legislative Assembly, Capitol after Easter.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

The 4th month of the year is an outstanding one!


