The Sarasota Ballet

On March 27 at the Van Wezel, they have Program 6, the company premiere of Sir Frederick Ashton's full-length Romeo and Juliet, bringing the grandeur and passion of Shakespeare's tragedy to the Sarasota stage.

It was choreographed by Ashton in 1955 to Sergei Prokofiev's score for the Royal Danish Ballet. Romeo and Juliet evidences Ashton's choreographic ability to portray the nature of humanity through dance.

Closing the Season is Program 7 opening April 24 and featuring three company premieres by Jerome Robbins, Sir Frederick Ashton, and David Bintley. Premiering in 1970, Robbins' In the Night comprises of a trio of pas de deux, and contemplates romantic love in stages evidenced by three couples - one euphoric, another restrained, and a third tempestuous. The work demonstrates a refinement of Robbins' approach to dance, while maintaining a dash of his trademark cynicism.

Choreographed during the opening stages of the Second World War, Ashton's Dante Sonata is a synthesis of wartime symbolism and his reflections upon experiencing Franz Liszt's piano piece of the same name—itself composed on Liszt's reactions to Dante Alighieri's pivotal masterwork.

The sentiment of Dante Sonata is, for Ashton, uncommonly bleak and hopeless, with Roslyn Sulcas of The New York Times describing it as, "an embattled expressionist encounter between good and evil with no clear outcome.

The final ballet of Program 7 will be a company premiere of a work by David Bintley. One of the great English choreographers of today, Bintley has been heralded by of whom Neil Norman, Chief Dance Critic of The Stage, as the "torchbearer of an extraordinary legacy." Bintley has ended his tenure as Director of the Birmingham Royal Ballet in order to pursue increasing demand for his choreography.
