Tucker Update

A lot is happening in Tucker as our city continues to develop the infrastructure that will frame future growth and development.

November 17 was the "Tucker Tomorrow" kick-off meeting to begin the process of developing a comprehensive plan for the city. Over 150 people attended the meeting to hear and share ideas for Tucker's comprehensive plan with the appointed steering committee, staff, Mayor and council members. This is only the first of many meetings and events to be held as the plan is developed. All Tucker citizens are encouraged to get involved, attend the meetings and share ideas. There is high interest in the community and the newly developing city of Tucker over the Sears property plans. The transformation from vacated warehouses to development aligned with the needs of the community and desired growth of the city affect us all. The proposed development project at the intersection of Hugh Howell and Mountain Industrial, known as the "Sears Project" has changed significantly since first presented. Stephen McCauley, McCauley Investments LLC, developer has presented a revised plan in which the movie studio is no longer a component and the number of housing units has been increased. Recommendations by staff and the Community Council were to deny zoning variance requests by the developer for the project. On November 14, the City council held the first reading of the zoning variances requested by the developer. A vote will

be taken after they have fully considered the request. The zoning requested by the developer is MU5-- high density and multi-use. Current zoning is light industrial with one parcel listed as multiple zoning. Zoning change requests are carefully considered, as the impact is significant and difficult to change in the future. Although a vote has not been officially taken, it appears that a change in zoning is unlikely to be approved.

The developer has also requested significant tax abatements for the non-residential properties with a 75% abatement for 25 years. While abatements are not unusual in development projects, this amount if granted, would set a precedent that would be difficult to replicate in future development projects The Zoning Board of Appeals was sworn in on November 15. The new board heard a request for a sign variance for the new Tucker Meridian project at Lavista Rd. and Northlake Parkway. The applicant requested a deferral to the December 20th meeting. Tucker will soon have access to a municipal court through an agreement with the City of Clarkston until a court is established in Tucker. City Hall is bustling and bursting at the seams. Early in 2017, a City Hall annex will open on First Street and will be the site for all meetings. The website www.tuckerga.gov/ is a "citizen friendly" site robust in information, calendars ... In December, UPS will be placing a 'POD" in the parking lot of the Smoke Rise Country Club. This innovative delivery solution has been used in several other areas of the Metro Atlanta Region during peak delivery season. The POD is used as a home delivery base for the community, utilizing a golf cart(s) with a pull behind trailer. All the delivery packages for the day will be brought out by a UPS delivery truck in the A.M. and off-loaded into the UNIT. A uniformed UPS employee would then begin delivering the neighborhood with the golf cart until all deliveries are complete. The POD will store the golf cart and trailer at night. The POD will be used until mid January.

Stone Mountain Community Improvement District

Several items noted on the CID website www.smokerisecid. com might interest Smoke Rise residents in the coming months.

The Georgia DOT plans a 'massive' road project on the interchange of I-285 and GA 400, creating new flyover ramps and new exit/ merge lanes to help alleviate traffic congestion in and out of Cumming, Alpharetta and Roswell. As the project launches and people seek alternate routes to these locations, traffic along the Mountain Industrial and Jimmy Carter Boulevards could increase by as much as 20%. The Hugh Howell Road/Mountain Industrial Boulevard intersection has been a very congested and often dangerous intersection for some time now. Several years ago the Stone Mountain CID funded a \$20,000 traffic study/conceptual design study hoping that this type of forward thinking might help them secure federal funding. Recently, the CID was notified that the intersection qualified under one such funding program. The design phase of the study will begin in early 2017 with actual road construction following in 2018.



HEALTH NOTES: by Cheri Schneider, M.D. Hookah? Or Hooked?

Last month I wrote about electronic cigarettes and "vaping". This month I thought I would follow up with an article on the equally popular Hookah smoking. In the Middle East, the Hookah, or "water pipe" as it is sometimes known, has traditionally been a vehicle for smoking opium and hashish. In the U.S., most hookah bars offer a selection of tobacco types and flavorings to mix with the tobacco. Hookah aficionados, like cigar lovers, are quite versed in the different types and flavors of tobacco they enjoy.

The hookah pipe has several parts. First, tobacco is packed into a bowl, which is then covered with aluminum foil that has air vents poked into it. Preheated embers or charcoal are placed on top of the bowl to heat the tobacco. Smoke from the heated tobacco is filtered through water, or sometimes flavored liquids, and then is inhaled through a rubber hose with a detachable mouthpiece. The hookah pipe can have multiple mouthpieces and be used as a communal pipe, or a single mouthpiece can be passed from person to person or used alone. Obviously, pipes passed from person to person can also transmit diseases like oral herpes, TB, upper respiratory viruses and influenza.

Is hookah smoking better or worse than regular cigarette smoking? Consider the following differences: A cigarette is usually smoked in about twenty puffs over five to ten minutes of time. Hookah smokers puff fifty to two hundred times in a one-hour session. This is a difference of about 500 cubic centimeters of cigarette smoke versus 90,000 cubic centimeters of smoke from a hookah-which is often inhaled much more deeply. Carbon monoxide, a component of smoke from any source, is also found in much higher levels in hookah smokers. Carbon monoxide levels in smokers are naturally higher than levels found in the non-smoking population (9% vs 2-5%). In hookah smokers, carbon monoxide levels (measured as 'carboxy-hemoglobin') as high as 26% have been reported! This is high enough to require treatment in the hospital!

Like E-cigarette studies, little long-term data exists on the effects of flavorings and tobacco from hookah on the body. Yet! Several chemicals released in hookah smoke are known to be toxic or are known carcinogens: nitrosamines, benzene, formaldehyde, and heavy metals like arsenic, chromium and lead.

Lastly, like E-cigarette smokers, hookah smokers often 'dual-smoke'. This means they also smoke regular cigarettes in addition to hookah. 'Hookah bars', are popping up all over the place, heavily targeting areas that 18-24 years olds hang out... like college campuses. Encourage your younger neighbors to consider these facts when deciding if hookah is really a cool social activity to partake in!






Knowledge + Information = Savings! Saving on Natural Gas

Are you paying too much for natural gas? Let's investigate this. In our area, most homes are heated with natural gas costing about \$1,000 annually. You can add your own bills up to see if that is where you land, but the bottom line is, if it is more, you may be paying too much. Who you select for your gas retailer makes a difference in how much you pay each year for heat.

As readers of this column know, I believe in keeping our dollars here in our Smoke Rise community whenever possible. So I will for a second time devote this article to how you can save some money in the selection of a natural gas retailer. This is timely because the best time to lock-in a 12 to 18 month gas rate is in the fall. I recommend locking in a rate instead of going month-to-month where you are exposed to volatility in the marketplace and might do better in some months, but risk doing far worse in other months.

In 1997, the Georgia General Assembly deregulated the natural gas industry. Atlanta Gas Light (AGL) became the gas wholesaler providing gas, reading the gas meters, and providing the local pipelines for retailers who then buy the natural gas, deliver it through the interstate pipelines, and provide billing and customer service. AGL's retail operations became Georgia Natural Gas, which is now one of 14 natural gas retailers operating in Georgia according to the Public Service Commission (PSC) website. Some of the retailers are local, and some are out-of-state investor owned utilities. Two utilities- True Natural Gas and Walton EMC- are operations of Georgia-based, not-for-profit, electric membership cooperatives.

These two retailers run neck-and-neck in having the lowest overall price, in what the Public Service Commission website (www.psc.state.ga.us) shows as "apples-to-apples" price. The apples-to-apples designation refers to factoring in service and other fees to give a fair comparison. This is why you can't believe every TV ad or postcard mailed to you home about low per therm costs. Some retailers show low per therm rates but have higher monthly service fees that hide the fact you are paying more than you think. In



the chart, you can see the 3-year history of several retailer's rates and how they vary over time. What you won't see in the chart is that True Natural Gas also gives a loyalty discount allowing customers to save on each bill with a credit toward their monthly service fee once eligibility is met. And the longer you stay, the more you save. Stay long enough and your monthly customer service charge could be as low as \$3.45 a month versus \$5.95. That's a \$30.00 per year extra savings. In November they offered an 18-month fixed rate of \$0.443/per therm and the lowest published 12-month fixed rate of \$0.398/therm. Mention you are a Smoke Rise resident learning about them from the Smoke Signal, and get the additional advantage of no credit check, no deposit, and no switching fee.

Be Smart with Your Online Purchases

Online shopping can be fun, but you should always have your guard up – especially during the Holiday season. Many people like going online to easily find the perfect gift and save time, but they can also end up with identity theft, malware, and other cyber unpleasantness. To reduce your chances of becoming a cyber-victim, be sure to observe a few simple security precautions.

You can minimize your risk with the following:

- 1. Do not shop on public computers or with public wireless Internet access. They may contain viruses and other malware that steal your information.
- 2. Protect your computer and mobile devices. Be sure to use up-to-date antivirus protection, and make sure each device is receiving updates.
- 3. Use strong, unique passwords for each online account. A strong password uses more than 10 characters, with numbers, special characters, and upper and lower case letters.
- 4. Use a credit card to pay online not debit cards. Credit cards are protected by the Fair Credit Billing Act and may limit your liability if your information was stolen or used improperly. Always check your statements regularly and carefully.
- 5. Look for "https" in the Internet address (URL) when making an online purchase. The "s" in "https" stands for "secure" and indicates that communication with the webpage is encrypted. Alternatively, look for the lock symbol (it's sometimes green) in the Internet address bar.
- 6. Beware of "pop-ups" that claim items are "free" or available at a very low price. Sometimes a refundable deposit is requested, other times, direct access to your social media account is requested. These are scams intending to victimize you and your friends. Close the ad by pressing Control + F4 on a Windows computer and Command + W on a Mac.
- 7. Do not auto-save personal information. You may be given the option to save your personal information online for future use don't do it. Consider if the convenience is really worth the risk.

There are several Internet sites that help debunk scams. The Federal Trade Commission has a great website devoted to sharing information on scams. Go to: https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/scam-alerts. Also, be sure to check out the Internet Crime Complaint Center: http://www.ic3.gov/default.aspx. Whenever I get an email warning about a new theft ring, or a free offer, I go to the Urban Legends Reference Pages to investigate. You can find that site online at http://www.snopes.com.

The bottom line is – use precautions each and every time you are online. If you do encounter problems with an online shopping site, contact the seller or company directly to resolve any issues. You may also contact the state's Attorney General's Office, the Consumer Protection Agency, or the Better Business Bureau www.bbb.org.

duties from those who are busy with their own families or may be traveling during the holidays.



Mountain Mums Garden Club

The Mountain Mums Garden Club had a very interesting and active meeting in November. On November 9, the Mums met at the old Browning Courthouse in Tucker. There, Trish England, a founding member of the Tucker Historical Society (THS) and 15 year board member, shared with us the history of the courthouse and much of Tucker. Although not on the list of historic places (because it was moved), it has the original cedar shakes and tin roof. It badly needs painting due to termite destruction and lead based paint... and will cost approximately \$16,000 to complete. Currently the THS is taking donations for the project and selling books about Tucker history at stores in the Tucker area. The original ledgers from the courthouse have been bound and can be viewed on site.

Trish also told us how Tucker had a large garden club, started in 1934. It is now defunct, but the records rare preserved in spite of a clubhouse fire several years ago.

The Mountain Mums then met Matt Houser, a Professional Landscape Architect, Urban Planner and Capital Program Manager with CH2M who took us on a tour of three of the ten park or green space sites in Tucker. Tucker has yet to take over the Park and Recreations Department from Dekalb County. They have two years from May of 2016 in which to choose to do this. Mr. Howser told the garden club group that three parks: Johns Homestead Park, Henderson Park and Cofer Park have dams holding back lakes. Currently they have not been well maintained and will need more that \$1 million for dredging, repair and maintenance. Tucker Recreation building may also need significant work to rid it of lead based paint, asbestos and mastic from floor tiles. This could cost nearly \$100,000. Additionally, the swimming pool at Cofer pools is aged and needs significant modernization. It also could cost nearly \$1 million to update. The bottom line is, that it is a very expensive thing to take over the Parks and Recreation Department. Much planning and investigating are actively occurring to create a master plan for Tucker Parks and Recreation. Mr. Houser said, the good thing, is that Tucker's parks have 'great bones' to work with.

Mr. Houser then spoke briefly about how funding for Parks and Recreation would likely occur. Beside collection of Franchise fees already in the budget, they would consider issuing bonds. Then, he anticipates that Tucker would receive a share of the county-wide SPLOST, which is being reworked before it will be voted upon. Negotiation with Dekalb County will be key. Please attend any community meetings regarding this important topic! Clearly this will take time to work out!

Morning Glories Garden Club Enjoys Tree Care 101 Lecture

November's meeting was a primer on tree care from expert Peter Jenkins. Peter "Treeman" Jenkins is an ISA certified arborist who owns the company, Trees Inspection.com. He offered us some very pertinent insights into tree care and management. His website www.treeinspection.com is full of helpful information about trees and tree care. "How to Spot a Dangerous

Tree" may be especially helpful as you evaluate the trees on your property.

Smoke Rise is filled with many lovely species of trees of all ages. Examining your trees each year to observe their growth and identify any issues that need to be addressed is good stewardship. Mr. Jenkins suggested a four-zone inspection for every homeowner. First, look at the tree as whole. Does it look full and lush with normal foliage, or is it thinning, leaning and etc.? Second, look at the base of the tree. The presence of fungi may or may not indicate a problem, depending on the type of fungus. Third, look at the trunk. Do you see borers? Do you see 'toothpicks' that indicate the Ambrosia Beetle infestation or other insects? Lastly, look at crown of the tree. Is it full? Are there broken limbs or brown leaves at the wrong time of year? If there is an issue, Mr. Jenkins advised us to call a certified arborist.

Peter shared numerous tree tales: from cat rescues to destruction of homes or cars by trees falling due to storms or fungal infestations. He also noted that with our current drought we should be especially diligent in observing and maintaining the health of our wonderful tree canopy.

DeKalb County Adds Water Bill Dispute Locations

DeKalb County residents wishing to dispute their water bills now have additional times and locations throughout the county to begin the dispute process.

In September, DeKalb Interim CEO Lee May issued a moratorium through the end of 2016 on the disconnection of residential water accounts that have been contested through the Utility Customer Operations Center's Customer Assurance Team.

At these locations, water customers will be able to speak with county representatives about their bills and place their accounts in dispute. During the dispute period, customers with disputed accounts will be required to pay their average bill based on 12 months or six billing cycles prior to the anomaly bill.

This time of year I start to feel the panic rise, realizing that I have done little or nothing to prepare for the holidays yet. There is still a Halloween owl sitting on my stair case. He's going to get a little Santa hat to cover the dust. However, I am prone to sudden bursts of energy when I cook, decorate or buy gifts. This brings on an affliction that I like to call bi-purchase angst. That's the feeling you get when you buy a great gift, take it home and then realize that you really, really need two of these amazing and charming items, only to return to the store to find that they are sold out forever in all stores in the Western Hemisphere. Why didn't I buy two? Why? Why?!!! Even though I'm sure to spend more on the dog than my family I know we all need easy, thoughtful gifts to give so that our human friends will think that we are nice, charming and capable of operating kitchen appliances other than the can opener. These recipes are not complicated, or elaborate or even all that unusual. What they are is easy, so that you can host a brunch, tea or party that won't have your guests fleeing in terror from your house, even with the Halloween Santa owl.

Raspberry Salad Dressing

1 (10-oz.) jar seedless raspberry all-fruit spread - like Polaner's® 1 clove of minced garlic (optional)

- 1/2 cup plain white rice vinegar don't get flavored
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil other than olive oil
- A tiny dash of cayenne pepper

Just blend this all together until really combined. Taste and add more vinegar if you want to...or salt and pepper. It's delicious on this winter salad:

1 package salad greens, or fresh baby spinach...enough for 4

- 1 orange, peeled and sectioned
- 1 pear, sliced into about 12 sections
- Thin slices of sweet onion if desired
- Bleu cheese crumbles if desired
- 1/2 cup dried cranberries
- 1/2 cup toasted walnuts, pecans or almonds

Divide greens among four plates. Divide remaining ingredients equally and artistically to impress everyone. Drizzle with raspberry dressing.

So easy, I'm ashamed to share it Gingerbread with Custard Sauce

Gingerbread: Take 1 box of Gingerbread Mix. Make it. Cool it. Cut it into squares to serve eight. Pour "custard" sauce over or around and pretend it took you all day.

"Custard Sauce": Mix together 1 box instant cheesecake flavored pudding, 3 cups of whole milk, and 1/4 cup heavy cream. Let sit. Taste and decide if it's the pourable consistency you want. Stir it again and decide it will do. Pour over gingerbread, add a dash of nutmeg and tell everyone how difficult your life is but that it's Christmas and nothing is too much trouble for those you love.

This next recipe is an oldie but goodie. Make at least a day ahead. The leftovers can easily be stirred together and re-used if put in a darling little serving bowl. I often use this same mixture mixed with mayonnaise and prepared mustard as a spread for ham and rolls. It's very versatile and lasts a long time in refrigerator.

Good Ol' Jezebel Sauce

Mix together equal amounts of pineapple preserves and apple

jelly. 8-ounce or a 10-ounce jars are fine. Add 2 Tablespoons dry mustard, 1 teaspoon pepper and half a jar of prepared horseradish. NOTE: use half a jar and let this mixture sit for a few hours in refrigerator. Taste it, and if it's not zippy enough, add the rest of the jar of horseradish. The original recipe calls for a full 5-ounce jar. Refrigerate 24 hours and serve over a block of cream cheese with crackers.

1 can condensed milk

large bag milk chocolate chips
small bag semisweet chocolate chips
cup chopped toasted pecans

Lightly grease an 8" square pan. Heat condensed milk in heavy saucepan until it's fairly hot, stirring continuously so it won't stick. Just before it boils, remove from heat and add chips. Stir until melted. Stir in pecans and immediately pour into pan. Spread and cool. Perfect. Every single time. If you are ambitious, roll the mixture into balls while it's still a little warm, roll in cocoa, sprinkles, or chopped nuts and tell everyone this is your best truffle recipe. Well, it's my best truffle recipe. Merry Christmas from Santa Owl and me!
