FIRE CONCERNS IN BENJAMIN CROSSING

Did you know that Benjamin Crossing is serviced by a volunteer fire department? I didn't! After the fire claimed a house and damaged several others on Fletcher Court panic set in. Are we safe? Maricella Chavez, the homeowner whose home was destroyed by a recent fire, has the same concern. She stated that it took 30 minutes before a fire truck arrived on scene. According to a report from the Journal & Courier the fire department had to move vehicles parked on the street in order to access the house. I asked Ms. Chavez about this and she responded, "The cars were in my driveway. We had to move everyone's car to the street to avoid them catching on fire." It was a good thing they did, too. Her husband's front bumper had already melted due to the heat of the fire. If the cars had stayed in the driveway they could have ignited. Unfortunately, this delayed the fire department from putting out the flames immediately upon arrival. Almost 40 minutes after the fire started the fire department was able to begin dampening the homes. Ms. Chavez recalls in terror that she was going to put her one month old to sleep upstairs moments before the fire started, "If the baby was upstairs we wouldn't have gotten to him."

The fire department would be too late." Her family and guests made it out safely. Ms. Chavez was at her mom's house later that night when it all sunk in. "I can't believe this. Everything is gone." The next day; however, Red Cross called her with a place to stay and people in our community began providing her with donations. Ms. Chavez says her neighbors have been so amazing during all this and she expressed her gratitude toward everyone in the community. She is writing a letter to the Journal & Courier thanking everyone and would like to host an Open House once the home is complete. Before the fire Ms. Chavez said she just lived in Benjamin Crossing and didn't really know anyone. But after everything that happened she realized that this is a great community of people that really care about each other. The Neighborhood Watch & Safety Committee chairman, Fred Coker is working with the City of Lafayette to see if a program similar to ones in Anderson, IN can be implemented in our community. Communities in unincorporated areas of Anderson, IN pay extra to have the city fire department respond. Would you be willing to have dues increased to offset this charge if it meant keeping your family safer?

PROJECTS UPDATES

ALLEYWAY SIGNS - COMPLETED: Working together with the Tippecanoe Department of Transportation the Association modified the existing traffic sign layout to improve alleyway aesthetics, consistency within the neighborhood and prevent traffic confusion.

PARK RENOVATIONS & DEMOLITION: The HOA Board had high hopes at the Annual Meeting that our new playground equipment at Oakley and Crescent Parks would be installed this spring. A bit of red tape pushed this project back, but the Association now has the all clear from Tippecanoe County to move ahead! Bids are coming in for the demolition of Chilton Park playground and a date will be set soon. Plans are still forming for a new playground, which has also been approved by the County. Input from homeowners has already helped shape these plans; keep the suggestions and ideas coming!

To basketball or not to basketball? Concerns have been increasing about safety at Oakley Park, including the behavior of some who frequent the basketball court. It has been suggested that we transform the basketball court into another amenity. While this sport is near and dear to the hearts of many Hoosiers, would Oakley Park be safer without it? DEAD TREE REMOVAL & COMMON AREA CLEAN-UP: Yikes!! What are the dead trees and bushes still doing in the subdivision? Ugh, more red tape! The Board learned that Benjamin Crossing has a landscaping plan and it must be followed. If a tree or bush is removed and it is on the Final Development Plan; it must be replaced with one from the species list. There are a few other rules, but Board is working on bids and hopes to begin replacement this fall. Have you seen the new mulch? The lawncare contractor is slowly adding red mulch to all the beds. No completion date has been provided, but it should be finished by the end of the summer if no further complications arise. To curb vandalism and beautify our seating areas cement slabs are being added. The benches will be bolted to the slabs for added security. This project will be completed in the next few weeks.

POND CLEAN-UP: The HOA Board has hired a pond maintenance company specifically licensed for aquatic weed and algae control! The English pond is getting special attention. Bids to have rip rap placed around all drainage units are being collected. If funds are available the Board hopes to have the project completed this year.

WALKING PATH ON 250E: The County would eventually like to add a 10 foot wide walking path the entire length of Benjamin Crossing on 250 E and stop at the corner of 450 S. This will not cost the Association any money for the development of this amenity. The County anticipates partial construction to begin this year.
