The library is now offering Curbside Pickup Service. Pickup times are Tuesday and Thursday from 9-11 a.m. and Wednesday from 3-6 p.m.

Patrons should email Heather Fox at heatherfox@ccaschools.org to request books and movies. You can also call the library at (319)622-3192. If we are unable to answer, please leave a message and we'll get back to you. After making requests, patrons will receive an email or phone call letting them know their items are ready to be picked up. The items patrons request will be placed inside a plastic bag. The bag will have a piece of paper attached with the patron's name. There is a cart sitting by the library doors at the outside entrance. The bags will be on top of the cart so you can stop by at your convenience during our dedicated pickup hours. If you prefer to not have a name on your bag, let us know and we can run it out to your car.

All returned items will be guarantined for five days to ensure the safety of our patrons and staff. After five days, the returned items will be checked in and put back into circulation. Please continue to return materials in the dropbox outside. We are being very flexible with due dates at this time.

N EWS AND NOTES

Emergency Grants to Two Local Groups

Two nonprofit organizations in the Amanas received Iowa Arts and Culture Emergency Relief Grants this summer due to the COVID-19 pandemic and its impact upon such groups

These grants provide short term financial relief to museums, historic sites and cultural groups affected by state disaster declarations, natural disasters and other forms of emergency. After the CARES Act gave states additional funding, these grants were made available in Iowa through the Iowa Arts Council.

The Amana Heritage Society received \$4,500 via the National Endowment for the Humanities and the State Humanities Plan. The Old Creamery Theatre Company received \$14,000 via the National Endowment for the Arts CARES funding. Grants may used to support salaries, programs and pay bills.

The Amana Heritage Society has opened its sites on a limited, COVID-19 sensitive manner. In addition they've created a new "Communal Carry-out" program at the Communal Kitchen on Wednesdays. Communal style meals prepared by the Amana Meat Shop are sold via pre-order (622-3667) and can be gotten and carried out at the Communal Kitchen or eaten on-site. They've added picnic tables in the yard so that folks can dine outside. The program which features traditional Amana Colony fare has been popular. Last week over 30 diners called in for potato dumplings and creamed chick-

The grants in Iowa ranged in size from \$1,000 to \$19,000. Grants were awarded to many state groups and sites, Orchestra Iowa, Cedar Rapids, which received \$18,000, Brucemore Mansion, Cedar Rapids which received \$14,000 and the Cedar Rapids Opera \$4,500.

They have been called "highly competitive" as the number of applications far exceeded the number of grants that could be awarded.

These grants followed a first round of grants given in April to individual artists - musicians, actors, artists who've been unable to work or perform due to COVID-19. In all 156 lowa artists received \$1,000 each.

In a spring survey conducted for Iowa by Americans for the Arts, 255 arts and cultural organizations across the state reported a total financial loss of \$2.85 million as of April 7. On average, those organizations lost approximately \$11,000 due to closures, cancellations and increased expenses.

Nearly all of the respondents reported that they have canceled performances and other events, affecting an estimated 100,000 audience members and participants.

Sixty-two percent of respondents expect the pandemic's impact on their organization to be "severe" or "very severe." A quarter of the organizations have reduced staff or payroll.

The bike ride will make its way through the Colonies and then enter Marengo, its halfway point, from the north before heading south to Highway 6 and returning to Amana. REMINDER CONCERNING SOUTH DUMP

What is commonly referred to as the South Dump, is private property and **only** for the use of Amana Society stock holders living within the Amana Colonies, and may be under 24 hour photo surveillance.

Absolutely No burning is permitted at the South Dump. Burning is dangerous and not compliant with DNR Regulations.

Only organic compostable yard refuse is allowed, and users **must** empty & remove plastic bags or other containers used to transfer yard waste. Lumber, and other building material, & trash dumping is absolutely **NOT** permitted.

Using the dump is a privilege, not a right, and all dumping will end if Iowa Dept. of Natural Resources (DNR) and Amana Society rules on what may be dumped or the burning ban are violated.

If you witness violations of these rules, *please* report those abuses, to Amana Society Conservation at 319-213-3445.

VETERANS' ECHE

"Post Traumatic Stress Disorder"

What is PTSD? According to the DSM IV Guide to Mental Health Illnesses and Disorders it is defined as either a person experienced, witnessed, or was confronted with a situation of an actual or threatened death, or the threat of physical integrity to self or others, or the person's response involved intense fear, helplessness, or horror.

Some may ask, "But what does that mean?". Well, I could give you the word for word explanation out of a medical journal, or I could give you a famous quote from General William T. Sherman that is simply stated, "War is Hell". Either way in comes down to the fact that our brain isn't built to process traumatic situations that occur in times of war or other stressful and traumatic situations.

Here is some additional information pertaining to other symptoms of PTSD

A wide variety of symptoms may be signs you are experiencing PTSD:

- Feeling upset by things that remind you of what happened
- Having nightmares, vivid memories, or flashbacks of the event that make you feel like it's happening all over again
- Feeling emotionally cut off from others
- Feeling numb or losing interest in things you used to care about
- Becoming depressed
- Thinking that you are always in danger
- · Feeling anxious, jittery, or irritated
- Experiencing a sense of panic that something bad is about to happen
- · Having difficulty sleeping
- Having trouble keeping your mind on one thing
- Having a hard time relating to and getting along with your spouse, family, or friends

It's not just the symptoms of PTSD but also how you may react to them that can disrupt your life. You may:

- Frequently avoid places or things that remind you of what happened
- Consistent drinking or use of drugs to numb your feelings
- Consider harming yourself or others
- · Start working all the time to occupy your mind
- Pull away from other people and become isolated If you or a veteran you care about have experienced traumatic situations in the past and are currently experiencing some of the above mentioned symptoms, then please remember that you are not alone and help is available. For veterans to talk to someone about what they are going through please contact your local VA Hospital to schedule an intake appointment. For the families of veterans who have been diagnosed with PTSD please remember that your loved ones were fortunate enough to come home, but they also brought a little bit of the
