Sunday Reflection – Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Who is Jesus for you, and what difference does he make in your life? Many in Israel recognized Jesus as a mighty man of God, even comparing him with the greatest of the prophets. Peter, always quick to respond whenever Jesus spoke, professed that Jesus was truly the "Christ of God; the Son of the living God." No mortal being could have revealed this to Peter, but


only God. Through the "eyes of faith" Peter discovered who Jesus truly was. Peter recognized that Jesus was much more than a great teacher, prophet, and miracle worker. Peter was the first apostle to publicly declare that Jesus was the Anointed One. The word for "Christ" in Greek is a translation of the Hebrew word for "Messiah;" both words literally mean the Anointed One.


Jesus told his disciples that it was necessary for the Messiah to suffer and die in order that God's work of redemption might be accomplished. How startled the disciples were when they heard this word. How different are God's thoughts and ways from our thoughts and ways! It was through humiliation, suffering, and death on the cross that Jesus broke the powers of sin and death and won for us eternal life and freedom from the slavery of sin and from the oppression of our enemy, Satan. If we want to share in the victory of the Lord Jesus, then we must also take up our cross and follow where he leads us. What is the "cross" that we must take up each day? When my will crosses with God's will, then His will must be done!

Saint of the Week ... St. John Chrysostom

John was born in 347 in Antioch, Syria, to a high-ranking military officer and was raised as a Christian by his widowed mother. Although he studied law under the distinguished rhetorician Libanius, he gave up his profession to study theology, ultimately becoming an ascetic hermit-monk.

When his health began to suffer, he returned to Antioch and was ordained a deacon in 381 and a priest in 386. Over the next 12 years he established himself as a great preacher. The zeal and clarity of his homilies were so appealing, especially to the common people, that he was given the Greek surname "Chrysostom," meaning "golden mouthed."

John was concerned for the spiritual and temporal welfare of the needy and oppressed and spoke out against the abuse of wealth. In his eloquent, moving and repeated insistence on almsgiving, he taught that what was superfluous to one's reasonable needs should be given away.

In 398 John was called to Constantinople to be its archbishop, much against his will. He gained a large following among the people, but his teachings on the misuse of riches angered the wealthy and influential. He was banished from the city in 403 and was kept in confinement in Armenia.

Even in exile, he found it possible to continue corresponding with his supporters, thus maintaining some influence over them. For this he was to be moved to an even more remote place at the eastern end of the Black Sea, but he did not survive the exhausting journey and died in 407 at the age of 60.

St. John Chrysostom is the patron saint of orators, preachers and speakers.
