Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Here we are once again, in the aftermath of yet another brutal and senseless mass killing, this time in a school in Parkland, Florida. It is an all too familiar scene in our society. *The Reading Eagle* recently reported in an unusual front page "Our Opinion" piece that since 2013 there have been 291 incidents of guns fired in schools across the country and in the first 45 days of 2018 there already were 17 such occurrences. The opinion piece went on to note that most of the incidents did not involve assault weapons, however, the deadliest of them did which brings me to the purpose of this month's letter.

There are many reasons that Christians should be interested in reducing the incidents of violence in general and gun violence in particular, but the main reason for me is the example Christ set for us in his darkest hours. As the passage above reminds us, even when those who sought to take Jesus' life came out against him, he responded in love with grace and healing.

There are many reasons for the violence that plagues our society. I don't pretend to know all the reasons or their cure, but I have some thoughts that I feel compelled to share with you. Her they are:

- 1. We need to let our state and federal legislators know that legislative inaction on their part is no longer acceptable. The carnage has gone on for too long, impacting more and more families.
- 2. We need to request that Congress lift the ban that it placed on the National Institute of Health preventing it from funding studies into the issue of gun violence and the policies that can work to curb its frequency and destructiveness.
- 3. We need to request that our state legislature and Congress take action to ban from civilian sale and use all semiautomatic and automatic weaponry along with all the devices that can turn a regular rifle into an assault weapon of carnage. Having grown up in a family that hunted game for food, I know that there is no need for such weapons. The argument that such a ban would tread on our 2nd Amendment freedom holds no water because other constitutional freedoms, such as those of

the 1st Amendment, come with limitations (libel laws, etc.). No freedom is unlimited!

4. We need to do a better job of caring for those in our society who become estranged from it or are broken emotionally and/or mentally. One way to do this would be to ensure that everyone has access to quality health-care because they are covered by adequate and affordable insurance.

Please take time to contact (phone call, letter, email) your state and federal representatives and talk with them about these issues. Urge them to not let this moment pass as they have so many times before, and remind them that they were elected to do the people's business, not that of the special interests whoever they may be. The children, teachers and staff of Parkland, Florida; Newtown, Connecticut; Jefferson County, Colorado; and Leesport, Pennsylvania deserve our very best effort in this regard.

As Christians you and I are called to make Christ's love known in word and deed. Now is the time for us to speak up and to act, not for ourselves, but for the sake of our neighbor – both near and far.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH EVENT

The Berks Festival of Faith program is held the 3rd Thursday of the month (none in Dec.) at Bern Lutheran. It is a program for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (ID/DD) that provides a free fellowship supper at 4:30 p.m., Sing-along at 5:30 p.m., and an All-join-in-Worship Service at 6:00 p.m.

Last year restaurants, congregations, and Thrivent sponsored the main course of the suppers: baked ziti, spaghetti, shepherds pie, meat balls & mashed potatoes, etc. Some sponsors provided a veggie, or salad, or dessert. A generous bequest from the Estate of Phil Cleres provided funds for the food items needed to complete a menu and provide dinner ware. Our BFF volunteers staffed some of the suppers, but the congregations had volunteers to help serve the supper.

Bern Church has allowed us to use their fully equipped kitchen for the prep work and cooking if needed; a Bern Church member who knows the kitchen has always been available to assist. Our volunteers are available to help set up and serve if needed.

The Berks Festival of Faith is a special ministry that a team of volunteers, most of whom were involved at Hamburg Center, has provided for 17 years. The purpose of this ministry is to give 'special needs' people a fellowship supper and worship experience that could prepare them to worship and participate in a community congregation. Members of community congregations are welcome ...needed ...to attend and assist out ID/DD individuals at supper and in the worship Service.
