The Reverend's Ruminations - February 2024

"Have you not known? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth? It is he who sits above the circle of the earth, and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers; who stretches out the heavens like a curtain, and spreads them like a tent to live in; who brings princes to naught, and makes the rulers of the earth as nothing" (Isaiah 40:21-23, NRSV). This is the call of the prophet Isaiah on the opening Sunday of the month.

As we "penguin shuffle" our way carefully across any thawed and refrozen snow or ice to a Sunday worship service or other destinations this month, where are we focusing our eyes (outside of our cautious gaze across uncertain walking surfaces)? Isaiah's original message may have been for our wandering ancestors of the Jewish nation, but we would all do well to remember that Almighty God is still living and active, working on our behalf in a world that seems inclined to run amok after the newest, shiniest, or loudest semblance of hope for an uncertain future.

Midway through the month of February is a holiday with which most of us are familiar — even if it is mostly a made-up observance seemingly meant to bolster the greeting card, chocolate, and floral industries. OK, a little mid-winter reminder to express love to those dearest to us is probably a good thing, but this year Valentine's Day also coincides with another "reminder" day within the church year: Ash Wednesday. As you likely know, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the church season characterized by soul-searching and repentance, known as Lent.

Unfortunately, many of us think of Lent primarily as a season of self-denial, during which you gaze longingly into the cupboard or fridge at snacks or drinks that you have sworn off until Easter. Yes, this is one way in which Christians seek to emulate the wilderness temptation and sacrifice of our Savior, and I invite you to try giving something up, especially if you have never endured such a test before. But Lent is about more than just fighting off a junk food craving like we're on some well-meaning diet. These forty days (not including Sundays) are meant to help us put away the distractions of the world around us and instead spend more time learning and emulating the words and actions of Jesus. Plan your weekly schedule to include our short mid-week Lenten services at 5:30pm on Wednesdays, spend some extra time reading in your Bible, or pick up one of the UCC daily Lenten devotionals (limited amount available, so first come, first served).

This year's devotional is entitled "Bend," and is filled with readings, reflections, and prayers for the season. It draws inspiration from Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians, where he writes: "We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; we are perplexed, but not despairing; we are bent, but not destroyed" (2 Cor 4:8-10, adapted).

As the description from The Pilgrim Press says, "Jesus modeled flexibility: hardship and persecution bent but didn't break him. Change and challenge strengthened his ministry. Impossible situations yielded to healing and release... Bending can be scary, of course. Responding to pressure with flexibility can be counterintuitive... But bending can be a source of strength: Trees bend in the wind. Bows bend in order to release their arrows. The river bends around the mountain."

How many of us could benefit from a bit of flexibility and increased resilience instead of a stiff arm from those we reach out to, or the danger of cracking under the pressures of life? No matter how you observe the forty days of Lent, you are (in some small way) seeking to identify with Jesus' withdrawal into the temptation of the wilderness. The Lenten journey is important to our Christian experience. Without experiencing its challenges, we will find ourselves ill-prepared to share in the joyous event of Jesus' Easter resurrection.


Moderator Abigail Anderson adjourned the meeting, and Pastor Cory closed with a prayer. Respectfully submitted, Christina Hainy, Clerk

Hy-Vee & Fareway Report as of 21 January 2024

During the first 3 weeks of 2024, \$16,009.46 (8.00%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 7 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$35,365.15 (23.58%) toward the 17th goal which is now \$200,000.

During the same time, \$5,715.65 (3.81%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 42 weeks, Fareway is at \$46,667.75 (31.11%) toward our 5^{th} \$150,000 goal.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. During this time, a number of slips from 2022 were received. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Fast & Fresh (Gas), Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Delivery slips/sheets can also be used. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house.



In our current Sunday sermons, we are continuing our journey through the Old Testament lessons of the Revised Common Lectionary. Find a fresh point of view on the meaning of discipleship that brings clarity not only to the joy of following Christ, but also to the reality of fear, uncertainty, and danger. Discover how you can face trials in life with confidence of finding hope, healing, and encouragement through God's Son, Jesus Christ.

Creamy Four Cheese Garlic Spaghetti from Abigail

Ingredients:

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 tablespoon butter

5 garlic cloves, minced

8 oz spaghetti

1 cup cooked pasta water

1 chicken bouillon cube

1 cup heavy cream



1 ½ cups Four-Cheese Italian White Cheese Blend Mozzarella, White Cheddar, Provolone, Asiago

1/4 cup parsley finely chopped (or use green onions)

Instructions:

- 1. Heat olive oil and butter on medium heat in a large skillet, add minced garlic and cook for about 1 minute on medium heat, without burning.
- 2. Cook pasta in a separate pan, drain. Reserve some cooked pasta water. Dissolve 1 cube of chicken broth bullion in 1 cup of hot pasta water.
- 3. Add pasta water (with the dissolved chicken broth bouillon cube in it), heavy cream, and cooked spaghetti to the skillet with cooked garlic. Bring to boil, stirring. Once the liquids are boiling, immediately add cheese and keep stirring everything together (spaghetti and the cream), while boiling, until cheese melts and coats pasta, for about 1 minute. Reduce to simmer and continue to cook, constantly stirring, to thicken the sauce for another minute or two.
- 4. To serve, top each serving with finely chopped parsley or green onions.

Note:

******May want to make extra broth to add if it is too dry.
