February 11, Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

A leper came to Jesus and kneeling down begged him and said, "If you wish, you can make me clean." Mark 1: 40-45

Luke is a 21-year-old college student studying to be paramedic; he also works for the fire department in a small town in Oregon.

Not long ago, he went to Portland to celebrate his girlfriend's birthday. He parked in a paid garage. When he returned, he found the window smashed. His backpack and computer were gone.

Everything important to him was on that computer: his class notes, papers, and job applications. He felt sick.

Two days after the break-in, an exchange student from the United Arab Emirates named Masoud was approached by a man who said he had a computer for sale. Only \$200. Masoud had been in this country only a year; he admits he was naïve. But he needed a computer, and this was a good deal. He handed the man the cash and took the computer home. Within seconds of turning it on, Masoud saw Luke's files and photographs. Who would sell a computer with all this on it? Masoud realized it was stolen.

So Masoud called Luke on the cell number Masoud found on the computer. Luke remembers the call: "This guy with a thick accent told me he had my computer. He told me the story and said it was his fault. With his accent, I thought it was a scam. I told him if he really had the computer, he should take it to the police. I knew that would be the end of it."

But it wasn't. Masoud took the computer to the police and the police called Luke to come to the station to reclaim his computer. The police were as surprised as Luke - this just doesn't happen. The police also passed along Masoud's number.

Luke called Masoud immediately to thank him and insisted on repaying the \$200 that Masoud was out. But Masoud refused. Masoud said it was his mistake to buy a computer from someone he didn't know. More important, it was his honor and duty as a Muslim to return the property to its rightful owner.

"I saw a photo of this man in his paramedic uniform," Masoud explains. "Those are great people. They help people. He is a good man. I don't want my money back."

For Luke, the experience meant more than the return of his computer. Luke had never met a Muslim before. He had a new awareness and perspective of immigrants like Masoud.

Masoud, meanwhile, has had a rough first year in America. Shortly after arriving in Oregon, he was physically assaulted by a man who shouted at him to "go home" (the man was later arrested). Now the encounter with the computer thief.

When the president of the university of Portland State University, heard what happened, he arranged a new MacBook Pro for Masoud. "We're very proud of you," the president told him. "You did the right thing."

And Luke later took Masoud to dinner to thank him.

We can transform our lives and world in the goodness of God - if we "wish." We can perform our own miracles of healing and reconciliation, we can restore to health and community those society considers "lepers," we can be vehicles of God's grace to the brokenhearted, the lost, the despairing - if we choose to embrace the compassion of Jesus. Despite the cost and even though he had no legal obligation to do so, Masoud elects to do what is right and just; he embraces the principles on which his own faith in God is centered.
