Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke18:1-8



"Jesus told his disciples a parable about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary. He said, "There was a judge in a certain town who neither feared God nor respected any human being. And a widow in that town used to come to him and say, 'Render a just decision for me against my adversary.' For a long time the judge was unwilling, but eventually he thought, 'While it is true that I neither fear God nor respect any human being, because this widow keeps bothering me I shall deliver a just decision for her lest she finally come and strike me." The Lord said, "Pay attention to what the dishonest judge says. Will not God then secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night? Will he be slow to answer them? I tell you, he will see to it that justice is done for them speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

29th Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke 18:1-8

We hear another unique parable of Jesus from Luke today: A dishonest judge (Luke 18:4), ends up doing the right thing, but not because he knows what the right thing is, or that he wanted to discover the truth. No, he administers a just ruling because of the tireless and eternally optimistic example of a persistently good little widow! Her consistent call for 'justice' day after day eventually wears down his selfish corruption and teaches his ignorance the virtues of truth and the common good! Luke 18:4 says that she faithfully appealed to the judge "for a long time". She didn't just make a stand for truth one time and then cynically give up when she was ignored by a corrupt judge. She was aware that 'the system' was 'rigged' toward protecting the interests of the wealthy and powerful. But more importantly she also knew, that 'truth' was on her side. So, day after day she showed up to make her appeal to the judge and speak truth to power. And eventually, (after 'a long time'), the judge offered a just decision in her case! Victory (but truth seekers never rest, because there is always another falsehood in line to correct and another injustice to make right). Those who live by truth take up the 'long view' of history, and do not become discouraged when injustice and propaganda seems to carry the day. Eternal truth eventually overcomes common falsehoods, and time will patiently reveal all the details. Vaclay Havel, the poet who became president on Czech Republic, called truth the 'power of the powerless'. Alexander Solzhenitsyn, a Russian writer-both he and Havel were imprisoned multiple times for 'speaking the truth against the Party', wrote that "violence survives only because of its supporting alliance with lies. Violence will cease when people end their daily participation in deceit"-the lies of the Herd, the Party or the Tribe. But that takes the demanding effort of daily commitment to seek truth and justice ('God's Will' we would say!) Or I think of Dr Martín Luther King, Jr's line from his speech at the National Cathedral March 31, 1968, when he said, "the arc of the moral universe is long but it bends toward justice' (March 31, 1968). Be patient, and the pursuit of truth untangles the twists of falsehoods. It is like what parents tell their children, "It is simpler to just tell the truth, and you don't have to work so hard remembering your lies!" In that sense, Truth is more simple and effortless because who has a memory strong enough to sort out all the tall tales you may have told different people.

I admire the devotion of this widow (Widows are often the heroes in Jesus' stories- think of the widow woman giving away her two little coins in Luke 21:1-4 or the sick widow who only wanted to simply touch Jesus clothes for her healing, Luke 8:43-48). She stands against the 'power-elite' who own even the judges! I think of the lines from Czeslaw Milosz' poem titled 'You who wronged' that are inscribed on the monument dedicated to the victims of Communist repression slain in a shipyard worker's strike in Gdansk Poland in 1970. The words of his poem are etched in the stone: You who hurt a simple man...do not be safe... the poet remembers.. you can kill him but a new one is born...deeds and conversations will be written down." Of course, the people of Poland patiently awaited and kept their faith, and nineteen years later (1989), Poland became a democratic republic, casting off its communist past. I think the poet Milosz had Jesus' words in mind here, "whatever is said in the darkness will be heard in the light, and whatever is whispered behind closed doors will be proclaimed on the housetops" (Luke 12:3). Jesus reveals to us the patient power of resurrection and the eventual fulfillment of all hope in Him!

Good does overcome evil, and life triumphs over death. But only patiently over time. I find Jesus saying this much repeatedly in several of his gospel proverbs such as "wisdom is vindicated by her works" (Matthew 11:19), "every tree is known by its own fruit" (Luke 6:44) and "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move" (Mathew 17:20). Time and faith (hopeful persistence) bring about the 'Great ReSet' of Justice through the righting of wrongs and the vindication of good. I imagine that we have all witnessed the power of patience eventually overcoming injustice. Often people express such convictions when we say things like, "Give 'em time--they will fall into their own trap", or "what comes around goes around". Patience proves it: Hope Springs Eternal! Peace, Fr Brian
