Today's speaker was Lee Meyerhofer from the American Transmission Company. Lee is a former Wisconsin assembly member from Kaukauna and has been with ATC for 13 years. His

job title is "Local Relations Consultant", and he did a fine job of relating to us today. His presentation was titled "Power Forward".

We learned that ATC is a Wisconsin based company that owns and operates an electric transmission system in much of the Upper Midwest and all the way down to Louisiana. That geographic area includes over 5 million customers and almost 10,000 miles of transmission lines. Lee simplified the company for us by suggesting that we compare ATC's system to our interstate highways. Lee said "we move electrons instead of cars".

Replacing aging infrastructure is a high priority for ATC because much of the system is getting close to 70 years old. In the 15 years since ATC was formed, Lee said 600 miles of new transmission lines have been built and over 1,800 miles have been upgraded. Lee spends much of his time traveling through Wisconsin to meet with the public and explain the need to keep our transmission system robust.
