SCRIPTUAL REFLECTION: REMAIN IN MY LOVE

There is a survey on almost everything nowadays. Some are very insightful and vital and some are less than that. I wonder if there is any survey that shows how many people on earth feel unloved. The result might surprise many of us – or probably won't – since each of us most probably have come across a number of people who felt or feel unloved, that is, apart from the ones we read about or see in the news. More surprising might be the number of Christians who feel unloved; and closer to home - Catholics who feel unloved. Now consider the vast number, probably all of us on earth, who feel that we are not nearly loved as we should be or as we would like to be loved.

So, what's the point? Paul's Letter to the Hebrews informs us that "In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days he has spoken to us through His Son" (1:1-2). Jesus is the full revelation of God's identity and qualities. And now, because of Christ's coming, we know that God is Love! (today's second reading - 1 John 4:8). In the Gospel this reality takes on a somewhat incredulous meaning. Jesus tells His disciples that He loves them as the Father loves Him. In His own words, "As the Father loves Me, so I also love you." How many times have we heard this passage and never stopped to think how live-changing this is supposed to be for us, God's children, and especially for those of us who follow Christ.

This week I want to invite us to stop and think or reflect on the enormity of Christ's point. He meant what He was saying. Let's start by imagining God's love for His Only Begotten Son! It must be an extraordinary love. It has to be mindboggling to say the least. Now we move to the next level – imagining that God loves us with the same love, same intensity! Yep! That's what Jesus was saying to them and is saying to you and me: God loves me the same way, with the same love. Remember, Jesus said that He and the Father are ONE. So, when He says He loves us as the Father loves Him, the meaning should not be lost on us.

This can be challenging to us, mere mortals. It can become overwhelming and almost incomprehensible. When adoptive parents have blood kids of their own, they may be conscious of and struggle to love both equally and still not succeed. But Jesus tells us that Our Father loves us, His adopted children, as much as He loves His Beloved Son.

This should be a game changer for us. But that's if we are able to grasp and internalize this beautiful good news. Jesus then ends by telling His disciples and us, "Remain in My love" (John 15:9). In other words, savor, bask, glory in My love, let My love saturate you, enfold you, etc. What could be more beautiful and fulfilling than that? Sadly, we sit atop a gold mine and live in want; some of us wallow in poverty, and worse still, some in abject poverty.

May we rise and take possession of our wealth and live like the princes and princesses that we are. Amen.

Today, we pay tribute to our beloved mothers, living and deceased, those wonderful ladies in our lives, families, churches, communities who, like our Heavenly Father, love us immensely. We pay tribute to all those who, though not mothers in the strict sense, love us with true and motherly passion. May your love wells never run dry. May you always bask in God's love, now and to eternity. Amen.

May the souls of our deceased mothers and the souls of all the faithful departed rest in peace. Amen.

ASCENSION THURSDAY (May 14th)

The fortieth day after Easter Sunday, commemorates the Ascension of Christ into heaven, according to Mark 16:19, Luke 24:51, and Acts 1:2.

In the Eastern Church this feast was known as *analepsis*, the taking up, and also as the *episozomene*, the salvation, denoting that by ascending into His glory Christ completed the work of our redemption. The terms used in the West, *ascensio* and,




occasionally, ascensa, signify that Christ was raised up by His own powers. Tradition designates Mount Olivet near Bethany as the place where Christ left the earth. The feast falls on Thursday. It is one of the Ecumenical feasts ranking with the feasts of the Passion, of Easter, and of Pentecost among the most solemn in the calendar, has a vigil and, since the fifteenth century, an octave which is set apart for a novena of preparation for Pentecost, in accordance with the directions of Leo XIII.

Although the place of the Ascension is not distinctly stated, it would appear from the Acts that it was Mount Olivet. Since after the Ascension, the disciples are described as returning to Jerusalem from the mount that is called *Olivet*, which is near Jerusalem, within a Sabbath day's journey. Tradition has consecrated this site as the Mount of Ascension and Christian piety has memorialized the event by erecting over the site a basilica. St. Helena built the first memorial, which was destroyed by the Persians in 614, rebuilt in the eighth century, to be destroyed again, but rebuilt a second time by the crusaders. This the Moslems also destroyed, leaving only the octagonal structure which encloses the stone said to bear the imprint of the feet of Christ, that is now used as an oratory.

Not only is the fact of the Ascension related in the passages of Scripture cited above, but it is also elsewhere predicted and spoken of as an established fact. Thus, in John 6:63, Christ asks the Jews: "If then you shall see the son of Man ascend up where He was before?" and 20:17, He says to Mary Magdalene: "Do not touch Me, for I am not yet ascended to My Father, but go to My brethren, and say to them: I ascend to My Father and to your Father, to My God and to your God." Again, in Ephesians 4:8-10, and in Timothy 3:16, the Ascension of Christ is spoken of as an accepted fact.

The language used by the Evangelists to describe the Ascension must be interpreted according to usage. To say that He was taken up or that He ascended does not necessarily imply that they locate heaven directly above the earth; no more than the words "sitteth on the right hand of God" mean that this is His actual posture. In disappearing from their view "He was raised up and a cloud received Him out of their sight" (Acts 1:9), and entering into glory He dwells with the Father in the honor and power denoted by the scripture phrase.



ASCENSION THURSDAY MASS TIMES: This Thursday, May 14th, we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension of the Lord, a <u>Holy Day of Obligation</u>. The Mass schedule will be as follows:

Wednesday, May 13^{th} , at 7:30 p.m.; and **Ascension Thursday**, May 14^{th} , at 7 a.m., 9 a.m., 12 Noon & 7:30 p.m.

Please note that the Parish office will be closed Thursday, May 14th, for Ascension Thursday.
