Beelines By President Steve Messbarger



It seems spring is one of the busiest times for beekeepers. Making splits, evaluating your colonies; do they need food, are they making swarm cells? All too often, I hear my bees are drawing out queen cells. So, I tore all of them out, which is not the thing to do. Your bees start at the end of winter, to build up population to swarm on the first strong nectar flow. In the spring, we talk about splitting your colony, maybe adding a box to help crowding, adding supers on early. Anyway, once they decide to swarm, you probably will never stop them from swarming. We always tell everyone to have spare equipment on hand for this reason. Make splits with the frames that have queen cells on them and expand your apiary, Or, you can check

every day and then catch your own swarm. One thing about a swarm is, they will outperform, building a colony, drawing comb, and storing pollen and honey. If you ever get a chance to collect a swarm, I encourage you to do so. They're awesome. From what I've seen, swarm season has been a little slow. I'm guessing it's due to the rainy weather. I just picked up two swarms recently out of the same bush, one may have an unmated queen but I haven't been able to check it out due to this rainy weather. I guess spring can be a very trying time for us beekeepers, but it's all part of the game.

We have been wrapping up details for Fun Day. Thanks to Jo Patrick and the Fun Day committee, it's going to be a great success. We have hats for sale with the NEKBA logo on them. Don't forget to order a tee shirt - they look great with our logo and our bee frame picture on the back. You don't want to miss this Fun Day because it's loaded with tons of information. I'm excited for June 1^{st,} even with all the work it takes to put on. Oh, by the way, you might want to relax afterwards and have some BBQ with us and our speakers, so sign up for dinner as well!

Tips for May:

• When supering your hives add more than one super at a time if you have drawn comb. If you have new foundation add only one super at a time and start with 10 frames. Put your second super

on after the first one is almost filled.

- Use queen excluders to prevent brood in your honey supers and as a deterrent to and wax moths
- Double check medication dates—safety matters. Don't misuse any chemicals in the hive. Follow all time guidelines. Absolutely never medicate hives with supers on. It is illegal.
- Keep the grass mowed in front of your hives —it makes it easier for the bees to land. Old carpet scraps, roof shingles or weed barriers can be used to keep grass under control.
- Keep supers on until the honey is capped, unripe honey will ferment.
- Do not feed sugar syrup during a honey flow the bees will store the syrup in your supers rather than your honey.
- Don't get excited on hot humid days if the bees are hanging outside the hive. They are trying to relieve the congestion in the hive to cool it off inside. Earlier in the year this is an indication of swarming but his time of year it is natural, so don't worry.
- Keep up with your record-keeping so next year you'll know which hives produced the best for you.

Ticks, Mammalian, Alpha-gal allergy

I'd like to tell about something that happened to our grandson this past year that has changed quite a few things in his and our life style since this happened. Our 14-year-old Eagle Scout grandson has spent many nights camping over the past few years. He has had many camp outs at Kansas and Missouri state parks, Bartle (Osceola, Mo.), Wisconsin, Colorado, West Virginia and many other campgrounds.

In June 2018 while working on a service work day he developed hives a few hours after lunch. No one thought anything about it since he was clearing brush with many other people. He was given a Benadryl, and continued on.

In August 2018, my daughter and my grandson went to Indianapolis and went to a restaurant to eat an early dinner around 4:00pm. They both ordered a hamburger, fries and soda. After they finished eating, they started walking back to the hotel. My grandson was complaining about a bad stomachache but my daughter who ate the exact same thing, initially brushed it off assuming he ate too fast since they rarely eat hamburgers and fries. Around 5:00 pm, his stomach ache continues and now he is complaining that he's hot. My daughter tells him to lower the temperature in the hotel room and to take a nap because they have an early morning and long day ahead of them. 5:30 he says he's itchy and my daughter suggests he takes a cool shower thinking that perhaps the hotel soap or sheets are making him itch. At 5:45 he jumps out of the shower telling his mom that his lips are tingly and shows his mom hives that are covering his arms, torso, legs, neck (roughly 75% of his body). His face is swollen and they immediately recognize the signs of anaphylactic shock. Immediately they GPS an Urgent Care Facility and are there within 10 minutes. Since he has never had anaphylaxis before or any allergies for that matter, the doctor administers IV steroids and hooks him to an EKG machine and oxygen monitor. His hives are spreading, his stomachache is getting worse, his lips still tingling and now his chest is starting to get "tight" although he is not having difficulty breathing. Five to 10 minutes later, the doctor administers the 1st epi pen. Shortly after the shot, the chest tightness disappears, hives stop spreading and are slowly retreating. They return to KC but he has so much medication in his system it would take about a month to get him in for testing. September 30, 2018 he was staying overnight and around 8:00pm we all ate a steak, baked potato and vegetables. He woke us up at 11:00 and said he had a rash and had called his mother to come pick him up. They rushed straight to Children's Mercy and was released around 7:00 the next

morning after another epi pen.

Another month goes by before he could be tested. We all started to speculate that it had to be meat. He was finally able to be tested and it was determined he had been bitten by a tick that causes Mammalian or alpha gal which means you are allergic to any mammal meat. He can eat poultry or fish but no more steak or hamburgers or any other mammal meat. He had been bitten a lot of times while at Bartle around Osceola, Mo. and said he had a slight fever so figured that was where it was contracted.

While at the Kansas Honey Producers Association meeting this spring, we overheard a gentleman talking about this and he said he could not even eat any dairy products due to the protein in them. This seems to be something that is not heard of much or not really diagnosed and there was an article in ABJ that even possibly chiggers may pass this on. All of us that keep bees contend with ticks and have heard of Lyme disease and a few other tick spread diseases and now another that is not as well-known but does exist. Bottom line is to use whatever means you can to protect yourself from these pests that attach to humans and mammals. One suggestion is permethrin. It is an insecticide, will actually kill ticks, and not just keep them away. It's different from DEET in that you put it on your clothes rather than spraying it on your skin. Be safe and protect yourself. Have a Fantastic Day - Andy Nowachek

HONEY PLANTS

So much to do this time of year and I need to stop and enjoy the flowers.

The wonderful fragrance of lilacs and their beautiful shades of purple at one of my apiaries reminded me

of this. Although they may not be considered much of a pollinator-friendly plant, they sure do wonders for the beekeeper! My gardening seems to be delayed until mid-May after most of the spring bee work is done. I'm sure you have been busy making splits (one of my favorite activities), grafting larva to make new queens (my most favorite activity), doing swarm prevention, and finally adding honey supers. It's a wonderful time of year; full of hope and anticipation.

I'm thankful for the moisture but fear prolonged wet weather. I hope the bees aren't cooped up for long as I dream of them making swarm cells in my sleep. I methodically check the hives in my free time and anxiously await my first nectar flow which will be Black Locust. I'm hopeful for another great year; but many times, in early spring, the cold and wet weather can wash out much of the nectar, damage the blossoms, or prevent the bees from flying. The locusts are just now leafing out and the supers are on and ready!

The bees near Lawrence are already filling their supers with nectar. They have a great assortment of forage around Clinton State Park and they've obviously found something to their liking. Locating

colonies where they have a vast array of nectar and pollen sources will result in healthier bees. They've been visiting Dandelion, Phlox, Mock Orange, Weeping Cherry, Dogwood, Redbuds, Crabapples and Bugleweed to name a few. Soon we will be seeing some Black Locust, Blackberries, Salvia, and Catmint. The rains and cooler temperatures will help prolong the dandelions. As of May 15, White Dutch Clover and Yellow Sweet Clover have been spotted blooming in Kansas City and Topeka. The committee has been working very hard to bring you another great Fun Day on June 1. It's a beekeeping festival of learning, fellowship, and fun! Coinciding with our Fun Day event, the Douglas County Master Gardeners will be holding their annual native plant sale in the building to the west of Building 21. We will have their plant list available. Take a few minutes in between our sessions to see what they have to offer to add to your own landscapes. Natives are a great addition to any landscape and are typically more droughttolerant and remember to always plant in groups!

SPEAKERS:

Randy Oliver owns and operates a small commercial beekeeping enterprise in the foothills of Grass Valley, in Northern California. He and his two sons manage 1000-1500 colonies for migratory pollination, queen production, nuc production, and honey. He has been keeping honey bees since 1966. Randy researches, analyzes, and digests beekeeping information from all over the world in an attempt to not only broaden his own depth of understanding and knowledge, but to develop practical solutions to many of today's beekeeping problems, which he then shares with other beekeepers through his various articles in bee magazines, his speaking engagements worldwide, and on his website: www.ScientificBeekeeping.com.

Dr. Katie Lee received her PhD. from the University of Minnesota. Katie's dissertation focused on improving the health and survivorship of commercial honey bee colonies. Most recently she conducted research with Marla Spivak at the University of Minnesota Bee Lab. She also worked on A Practical Standardized Sampling Plan for Varroa destructor on Apis mellifera.

Dr. Judy Wu-Smart is the Extension and Research Entomologist at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Department of Entomology. The UNI, Bee Lab pursues research questions and extension programs focused on stressors impacting pollinator health in both managed and wild bee communities. We certainly appreciate Dr. Wu-Smart presentations at past Fundays, and we are most fortunate that she has accepted our invitation to share with us again.

Dr. Matthew Smart, a published author, did graduate research at the University of Minnesota, Department of Entomology. He is currently a research assistant professor at University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Department of Entomology.

Dr. Marion Ellis, professor emeritus of entomology and researcher from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, will be a featured speaker. Dr. Ellis has spoken at our Fun Day events on several occasions.

Dr. Chip Taylor, professor emeritus University of Kansas, founder and director of Monarch Watch. Dr. Taylor will be conducting our annual swarm demonstration. It's always interesting to hear his antidotes about honey bee research.
