The Reverend's Ruminations - September 2022

Well, it finally got me. I guess I've been lucky for the last couple years—healthy in the face of the worst of the pandemic despite even family members succumbing to the dreaded COVID-19 infection caused by a coronavirus called SARS-CoV-2. Yes, I received the now familiar, two-dose vaccine early in the pandemic, as well as a booster shot. Yes, I've tried to be careful about spending time among crowds, and wore a mask reliably during the height of public restrictions. And yet, after 28 months of carefully watching and learning, masking and isolating, vaxing and trying to continue living life, it finally got me.

And it's definitely <u>not fun</u>—but I don't have to tell you that!?! Almost everyone seems to have had an experience with COVID-19 by this time, whether you have endured it yourself or helped care for a family member very much under the weather. Some have even lost friends and family members to the virus, and will never forget the tragic, lasting impact it has had on your life. As I tested positive yet again today (now over six days since first seeing that second line on the 'ol home test), I was disappointed not to be able to return to the office. Yet we've become accustomed to alternative methods of communication, so all I needed to do was fire up my laptop to check my church email and get started on my monthly newsletter article(s).

Of course I still needed a subject on which to "ruminate," so as I concluded a brief lingering coughing spell, I began thinking about the many sicknesses mentioned in the Bible, how many of our ancestors were afflicted with diseases even less understood than COVID, and how faith has guided all of us during the darkest hours of our afflictions. In Psalm 41:3 we hear the Psalmist affirm, "The Lord sustains them on their sickbed; in their illness you heal all their infirmities." But some days, on our sick bed, we may wonder who—if anyone—is going to sustain us. When I was shivering under a blanket with a 101° fever, coughing so hard I thought my head would explode, I, too, struggled to hold fast to such assurances. But once the fever broke and I settled in to the next several days of generalized aches and coughs, I was able to pray and keep myself connected to God's providence.

In the ensuing days, you might say I followed in the footsteps of the prophet Daniel, persevering despite the fatigue that many of you have experienced with COVID: "Then I, Daniel, was exhausted and sick for days. Then I got up again and carried on the king's business; but I was astounded at the vision, and there was none to explain it" (Daniel 8:27). With an official positive test, I couldn't officiate Orel Barker's funeral, but scrambled to put together the worship leader parts and a funeral meditation for our reliable friend, Chuck Rudolph, to step in and lead on short notice. Thank you, Chuck, for your incredible flexibility!!

Obviously, I couldn't attend my regularly-scheduled Air National Guard drill weekend either, but luckily we'd already planned an alternative worship experience at the Martin County Fair in my absence. I hope that many of you enjoyed the outdoor community worship service, especially since our annual "worship in the park" event with St. John's UCC was rained out only a couple weeks before!

As we move into September, I pray that the "normalcy" of a schoolyear schedule brings more of us back to worship together. Summer camping, fishing, and other special events always seem to be detrimental to church attendance, but as we try out a new 9:30 worship and Sunday School experience, it will only be successful if we all come together with an open mind and a commitment to one another as brothers and sisters in Christ's family. I promise I'll be healthy in the next few days, so I hope to see you soon!

The Council met in the Fireside Room at 5:45 PM. The meeting was called to order and led in prayer by Moderator, Abigail Anderson. Minutes of the July 20th meeting were approved as printed. Motion M/S/C (Kay/Cathy).

Treasurer's Report: Catherine Johnson reported that additional money was given for the pie/pork chop fundraiser. There are updated tax exempt forms available in the church office. Discussion was tabled on the parsonage fund and deciding which source of funds to use for the Krause Construction work.





Many of us struggle with the transition back to the structure and busy-ness of life after the freedom of summer. HyVee & Fareway Receipts Report as of 21 August 2022


During the last four weeks \$17,814.59 (11.88%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 18 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$52,525.74 (35.02%) toward the 15th \$150,000 goal. Remember, Hy-Vee Gas can be used. A group of 36 slips with gas discount amounts, but no Hy-Vee Gas were turned in.

During the same four weeks, \$2,458.12 (1.64%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 85 weeks, Fareway is at \$111,180.20 (74.12%) toward our 4th \$150,000 goal. It will still take about 30 weeks to reach the \$150,000. Yes, four weeks ago, I said it would take 32 weeks to reach the goal, but the number of slips and their value has decreased to about \$600 per week during the last fifteen weeks while during January through April, they averaged about \$2,500 per week.

This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Gas, Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house. Even the very small amounts help.
