## **CORN PLASTIC ACTIVITY**

- 1. Place a tablespoon of cornstarch in a plastic zipper-seal bag.
- 2. Add 2 drops of corn oil to the cornstarch.
- 3. Add 1 ½ tablespoons of water to the oil and cornstarch. Seal the bag.
- 4. Mix the cornstarch, oil and water in the plastic bag by rubbing the outside of the bag with your fingers.
- 5. Add 2 drops of your favorite food coloring to the mixture and mix well. DO NOT completely seal the bag.
- 6. Place the bag in a microwave oven for 20-25 seconds on high. Be careful. It will be hot. Form your plastic into a ball while it is still warm and describe what it does.
- 7. Record your scientific observations.
- What are the physical properties of your biodegradable plastic?
- What could you make with this biodegradable corn plastic if you let it harden?
- What will happen if you put the biodegradable plastic in water?
