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Residents Approve Amendment to Lower Vote Threshold to 66 2/3 Percent to Amend Declarations

It was Announced at the April Association Meeting of Oaks Royal 3 HOA, that an Amendment to the Declaration of Easements, Covenants, Conditions & Restrictions (1984) to lower the number of residents needed to amend the document [Declaration] from 75 percent of the Lot Owners to 66 2/3, was passed.



"This is a major victory for the residents of Oaks Royal 3! Our ability to change outdated regulations, and respond to changing times has just gotten a little bit easier; while still being accountable to our HOA membership! Thank you to Kathy Swett and her team who worked hard to get the ballots out, follow-up, and counted. They worked hard to make the process work through these COVID times!" Ann Parks, HOA President

Kathy Swett, HOA Vice President reported at the April Association Meeting that the amendment passed by a vote of 113 – yes, 19

- no, 1 - abstain, 1 - yes N/C (received after voted final - Not Counted). The vote passed by (113/148 Lots) 100 = 76% with 144 of 148 lots reporting.

For clarity, the "yes" votes represented 78% of those who actually voted, however Article VII, Section 3 states that the declaration may be amended by "no less than 75% of the Lot Owners", not voting Lot Owners. Which always made reaching that magic 111 votes to reach 75% so difficult.

Along with the change of voting majority from 75% to 66 2/3, the new amendment removed language automatically extending the provision for another 10 years, opting for phrasing "preserved in the manner of or by Florida Statute 720.3032..." more consistent with state statute.

"Our Declaration document is substantially the same as it was written in 1984! Although major re-write efforts were made in the past, they were blocked by the Florida Department of State. The state favors targeted amendments, over general overhauls, where due legal review and process can be applied. This is why these past two amendments, 55 & Older and 66 2/3 to Amend, were so imperative to begin to bring our HOA into accordance with state law and county ordinances. And there is so much more to do!" Guy Engelhardt, past Declaration Committee Chair

Keeping HOA governing documents updated protects both the association and our residents by keeping the documents in accordance with current federal, state and county law. In researching the changes to this amendment we find Chapter 720.306(1) (b). "Unless otherwise provided ... any governing document of an association may be amended by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting interests in the association." This maintains the super majority needed to pass an amendment. Ensuring residents support the idea, while at the same time making the process easier by reducing the number of ballots needed to pass an amendment from 111 (75%) to 99 (66 2/3%).

In addition, we find in Chapter 720.3032(1). "Any property owners' association desiring to preserve covenants from potential termination after 30 years by operation of chapter 712 may record in the official records of each county in which the community is located a notice specifying ... "AND 720.3032(2). "Notice of (Name of association) under s. 720.3032, Florida Statutes, and notice to preserve and protect covenants and restrictions ... "The change made in our Declaration in accordance with this statute protect our covenants, and thus our HOA, from having a built in termination date, thus requiring an amendment to extend for a number of years. Our original charter (Declaration) was dated 1984 for 30 years, so it would have expired in 2014. The HOA renewed it for an additional 10 years, so would have expired again in 2024! By recording this provision in the new amendment it is "sufficient to preserve and protect the referenced covenants and restrictions from extinguishment" and protects our HOA into the future!

The next step is for the Association's lawyer to file the amendment with Pasco County, and return the final copy to the Association. The final copy, with effective date and Pasco County filing stamps will be posted to the web site and a copy sent to all members when people return in the fall.

After that you may be totally on your own, and we recommend that you let someone else know where you are in case your power and communications are cut off.

Preparing for Hurricane Season in Pasco County

As most of our resident snowbirds migrate north for the summer months, it is time to complete our preparations for another hurricane season here in Florida! The National Hurricane Center issued it's annual forecast April 15th for an above average Atlantic

hurricane season; with 18 named storms, 8 hurricanes and 3 major hurricanes. A major hurricane is one that is Category 3 or higher with 115-plus-mph winds. Even one hurricane directly impacting our community could be devastating. Those traveling north should take a few moments and prepare your properties before making that trek, or make plans with a neighbor who is staying behind who can assist you. We put together some tips that should help the snowbirds heading home as well as those who are new to the area or who live here year round.



- Yard Stuff: The first and easiest thing is to patrol your property before you leave and pick up anything that is not fixed to the
 ground and store it inside or underneath your home. Even if you think it is heavy, once an 80 150 mph wing gets a hold of it
 most items can get airborne! You are not just protecting your property, but every other property around you that your stuff may
 crash into, through, around on its way to who knows where. So do us all a favor and just put it away!
- Awnings are not just for shade and to stimulating naps when the rain taps gently on them creating that lovely pitter-patter we all love so well. Your awning are also a simple way to help protect your window from breaking under high winds and flying debris. But the awnings have to be lowered and secured before they can do any good! If you are going north we recommend lowering the before you go, or make arrangements with a neighbor to do it for you if a storm is coming. I have several northern neighbors on my list. If you have not lowered your awnings in while, or ever, we recommend you do so now. The aluminum poles and screws can get corroded in our salt air and you don't want to find out you need pats the day before a hurricane hits, because you probably won't find any! If you don't have any screw-downs on your awnings now is the time to find out, you just need to for each awning and they cost about 25 cents a set last time I got the hardware at Moody's Hardware downtown. They are super easy to install, always folks to ask around the park if you need help.
- Hurricane Guide: The latest (2020) <u>Pasco County Disaster Preparedness Guide</u> can be downloaded from this link. It is full of
 great info on living through all kinds of interesting scenarios from floods, fires, sink holes, tornadoes and yes everyone's
 favorites hurricanes.
- Evacuations: There is an evacuation map, and even though you will note that all the official evacuation zones are on the coast,
 PLEASE NOTE the following from the guide "All mobile home and RV residents must evacuate for any hurricane evacuation
 order issued in Pasco County, regardless of your location within the county. Never stay inside a mobile home or RV to ride out
 the storm. Evacuate to the home of a friend or relative, a hotel, a motel or a nearby designated shelter/evacuation center.
 Anchor your mobile home or RV with tie downs and inspect the tie- downs annually."

- Emergency Shelters: <u>Pasco County Emergency Management</u> will provide a list of emergency shelters prior to a pending storm.
- OR3 Clubhouse as Shelter: At the April Association meeting it was discussed that residents could utilize the building during a storm, AT YOUR OWN RISK. The Oaks Royal 3 clubhouse is not a rated storm shelter, the Association makes no claimed as to its safety in a storm. We highly recommended you seek a county storm shelter or to travel to a loved one or place outside the effected area before the storm hits if possible. The Clubhouse is a stick-built structure, not cinder block. We have no beds, shelter supplies or generator. If a storm is pending the current plan is to shutter and lock the clubhouse at least two (2) days before expected storm hit. If you plan to use the clubhouse, please let Guy Engelhardt Or Larry Way know in advance and one door shutter will be unlocked to allow you entrance/exit. After that you may be totally on your own, and we recommend that you let someone else know where you are in case your power and communications are cut off.
- Special Needs Shelter: If you have Special Medical Needs such as oxygen, electrical medical equipment or other medical requirements you may qualify for the Special Needs ProgramThis program qualifies you to be transported to a special needs shelter in case of an evacuation due to a storm. You must register with emergency management each year for this program. Be sure to notify them if you have a service animal. For more info on this program call 727-847-8137 or click on the link above.
- Pets at Shelters: Make a plan for your pets now. Pasco County Animal Services offers a low-cost vaccination clinic including microchipping. The clinic is offered weekly at the shelter. Don't leave your pet and don't use your pet as an excuse not to evacuate. You are putting yourself, your family and your pet at risk! If you are ordered to evacuate, take your pet and your pet supplies with you. Seek shelter with friends or relatives or at a hotel. Many shelters/evacuation centers will not turn away pets. If you plan to take your pets with you to a shelter, YOU are responsible for your pet while staying in the shelter. You will need to bring your own crate and any supplies that apply from the list provided. If you plan to go to a hotel or motel, go online to: petswelcome.com. After the storm has passed, be careful allowing your pet outdoors. Familiar scents and landmarks may be altered and your pet could easily be confused and become lost. Downed power lines, other animals, and insects brought in with high water could present real dangers to your pet. Nearly 80 percent of pets displaced by a disaster are never reunited with their owners.
- Sand Bags: If you have a doorway in a low-lying area, where water is likely to rise or be driven into your home, sand bags may
 be helpful. The county assists by making sand and sand bags available for residents to fill and use at their residents. Be aware
 that in some past years you have had to go to one location to pick up bags and then go to another location fo fill the bags.
 Some years you have had to fill your own bags and they can be quite heavy. Please pay attention to the Emergency
 Management announcements.
- Evacuation Plans: It just makes sense, that if you have a place to evacuate to out of the path of a major storm, and you can leave to do so and save yourselves the anxiety of being here during a storm and the immediate aftermath. Pack up the meds, important papers, pet, some clothes and go. Have your Evacuation route picked ahead of time, and don't wait until the last minute. LEAVE EARLY if you can. Remember, if you are leaving there will be at least 1,000,000 other people on the road with you! Heading for the same motels, using the same gas stations, eating at the same restaurants and yes using the same rest stop facilities! And guess what folks? While those 1,000,000 people are all trying to go one way at the same time, the trucks bringing supplies into the state like gas, food, bottled water, etc. can't get in! I have seen I-75 and I-95 turn into parking lots the day before a hurricane hits as everyone who is leaving hits them at once, and then finds out there is no gas, and not a free hotel room or food between Miami and the Georgia boarder! However, roads like 301 & the 19/98/27 combo all lead out of the state and will generally be light on traffic and have fuel and amenities available. We have left at night the day before, and gone up 98/27 into Georgia or Alabama with absolutely no problem. In fact we thought we were the only ones on the road for most of the trip out of Florida a couple of times!
- Preparing to Wait it Out: If you are going to wait it out in your home, be careful batten down your awnings, put away anything

that can blow around. Then prepare inside. First let someone outside the storm zone know you are staying in your home; if the power and phones go out someone can let emergency services know where to look for you. Make sure you have a supply of all your meds and canned food. We have had storms since I have been here that have knocked the power out to the grocery stores and pharmacies for 4-5 days. Also, after a storm stores often need to wait for supply trucks to be able to come into the state before they can re-stock from the pre-storm panic buying. Fill your tub with water so you can use it to flush the toilet, you will so appreciate this if your water goes out. Start stocking up water now. Keep some gallons on a shelf, and just switch them out each year. Believe me if a storm is coming the gallons of water disappear overnight and they can not get resupplied until after the storm. An alternative is to keep some of those empty water containers available, and when a storm is coming, just fill them from your tap. Have a battery operated radio, just in case your electric goes out for 4-5 days. At least you can keep informed. Keep a car charger for your cell phone so you can charge it if you lose power after the storm (do not do this during the storm).

After the Storm: Check on your neighbors who sheltered in place; you can share resources and help each other. Do not go out
on the roads after the storm until Pasco County Emergency Management says it is clear, if you evacuated wait for the all clear
to return, there will be debris in the roads, downed power lines, and businesses will be closed. Let emergency services do their
job, don't become an emergency!


