Letter From A Past Scholarship Winner

Hello Auburn Aviation Association friends,

I thought I would share my story, nearly 10 years after you awarded me the scholarship while I was in High School.

Growing up in Auburn I had the opportunity to meet many great people at the airport, many of whom welcomed me into their hangars as I paced from one side to the other watching the airplanes land. Through these contacts I was invited to attend meetings at the Auburn Aviation Association and there I learned of a scholarship for flight training. I went though the application / interview process and was awarded a full Private Pilot scholarship with Beau as my instructor. Starting my training in 2003, I was able to train at my pace, earning my Private ticket in October of 2005. Soon after, John Kluenker, a corporate pilot and graduate of the University of North Dakota, came to an Auburn Aviation Association meeting and made a presentation of the program. I was hooked and started my college career at UND two weeks after graduating high school in 2006.

My time at UND was beyond incredible. I got the best training with the best instructors in the most advanced of aircraft. I completed the four year degree in just under 3 years, and also held posts as a Student Advisor for the Assistant Dean of the Aerospace College, President of student organizations as well as a University Flight Instructor. In my time there after graduation, I instructed over 500 hours for students from the USA, China, Japan, and Saudi Arabia. I was also fortunate enough to represent the University at career fair expos around the country including Oshkosh Air Venture for three years. Looking back I cannot express how much I got from my time at this great institution, not just from the academics, but finding the best friends I've ever had and retaining employment as a pilot at the start of and throughout the Great Recession.

With airlines ending a hiring freeze and recall of furloughed pilots in 2010, I found myself fortunate to accept an offer to become a First Officer for Air Wisconsin Airlines Corp in Appleton WI. Primarily an east coast regional airline, AWAC's route structure extends from as far north as Canada to as far south as Florida. While not able to provide the west coast flying I love so much, it did involve operating in and out of the world's busiest airspace. Based in Philadelphia PA, my schedule routinely takes me to all states along the eastern seaboard and many historical airports that make up the worst weather flying the USA has to offer. I have flown approaches into New York's La Guardia in between thunder

No doubt the job has given me a lot of gray hair, but I am able to influence a multi-million dollar operation for the better with experience from my four years flying the line. My two years of instructing for the airline has built a trust among the pilot group and I feel lucky to have their support.

To close my update to everyone back home, I want to thank you all so much for the opportunity you provided me over 10 years ago. The support of so many influenced my life in more ways than I can count. I want you all to know how your gift of \$3,000 lead to a life long career - and not just my own. As I write this update, I am returning from a career fair at my old Alma Mater - UND Aerospace. Just yesterday, I interviewed and hired 6 graduates from the UND program to become pilots for Air Wisconsin. Not only did your gift allow me to start my career, it now enables me to start the airline careers of others, also.


On Armed Forces Day Saturday, May 16, 2015 at 3 p.m. Outside Wings Restaurant at the Auburn Airport

Motion RC has developed a commemorative series RC Aircraft in the likeness of "Old Crow" and will be giving a demonstration at the event.


The RC "Old Crow" will be available for sale at the TGH Aviation Airport Shop.
