First Reading: Isaiah 55:10-11

The rain makes the earth give growth.

Thus says the Lord: 'As the rain and the snow come down from the heavens and do not return without watering the earth, making it yield and giving growth to provide seed for the sower and bread for the eating, so the word that goes from my mouth does not return to me empty, without carrying out my will and succeeding in what it was sent to do.'

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 64:10-14. R. Lk 8:8 **R**/ The seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest.

Second Reading: Romans 8:18-23

All creation is waiting for the revelation of the children of God.

I think that what we suffer in this life can never be compared to the glory, as yet unrevealed, which is waiting for us. The whole creation is eagerly waiting for God to reveal his sons. It was not for any fault on the part of creation that it was made unable to attain its purpose, it was made so by God; but creation still retains the hope of being freed, like us, from its slavery to decadence, to enjoy the same freedom and glory as the children of God. From the beginning till now the entire creation, as we know, has been groaning in one great act of giving birth; and not only creation, but all of us who possess the first-fruits of the Spirit, we too groan inwardly as we wait for our bodies to be set free.

Alleluia, alleluia! The seed is the word of God, Christ is the sower; all who come to him will live for ever. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 13:1-9 (Short Form)

A sower went out to sow.

Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such crowds gathered round him that he got into a boat and sat there. The people all stood on the beach, and he told them many things in parables. He said, 'Imagine a sower going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell on patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

The Gospel of the Lord.

Many of us hear the Word of God but understanding God's word, growing in grace and in wisdom, allowing that seed to grow, and nurturing that growth, is a life-long journey. It is only the disciples who are concerned with being the best possible soil to receive God's grace in his Word, that bears any fruit at all.

Being Open to God's Message

If we have ever had the experience of planting seeds, we do it with the greatest expectations of a good harvest or flourishing bloom. We take time to turn the soil, give it water and nourishment, sow the seeds and wait for the plants to grow. If they don't, we might ask what went wrong? Was it the sower or the soil?


In the first reading prophet Isiah preaches about the word of God falling like spring rain to soften the soil so that seeds will grow. The word will not return empty. In essence, God means what God says and this was the basis of Israel's hope through exiles and captivity. The second reading likens human beings to seedlings planted by God to ultimately share in the glory destined for all who play their part in living as faithful people of God. Such is the hope to which they are called.

The story of the Sower featured in the Gospel is one of many parables that characterised Jesus' teaching. Parables were short stories with open endings or double mean-



Every day God gives us signs, trying to get our attention. It might be in the form of a flourishing garden, a piece of music, a newspaper story, a chance meeting with a friend. God may speak to us in the readings at Mass, a homily about them or through our community gathered in prayer. God may call to us through a child who is lost, a stranger who lends us a helping hand, a neighbour struggling to make ends meet. If only we have eyes that see, ears that hear and hearts open to respond to him!

Creating God, unceasingly at work in the field of humanity; sowing the good seed and awaiting its yield. Let your spirit move in power over us to transform our hearts into the good soil you seek. Then may your word bear fruit a hundredfold as your love in us becomes active and real through deeds of justice compassion and peace.



ing that used images that were part of people's everyday lives to draw them into thinking more deeply about the ways of God. Jesus' parable today relates a simple scene of someone flamboyantly sowing seed in all directions such that some fall on pathways, or rocky ground, some amid plants that choke growth, and some fall on good soil where it flourishes to produce an abundant harvest. As Jesus told it nothing extraordinary happens and yet through this imagery he invited his hearers then, as he does us, to reflect on our experience and see what it might be saying about where and how God is at work in our lives and how we are responding to him.

Dear friends in Christ, Today's decision to place metropolitan Melbourne and the Mitchell Shire areas back into Stage 3 lockdown for the next

six weeks from 11.59pm Wednesday 8 July is sobering news. It is truly disheartening, and will bring renewed distress to so many families and individuals.

These words from Psalm 22 have come immediately to my mind (words that were on the lips of Jesus as he was crucified): My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning? O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest. (Ps 22.1-2)

Yet, I want to encourage you in grace, trusting in the abiding closeness of our loving Lord, who promised to be with us always.

In returning to Stage 3 restrictions in those specific areas, sadly the public celebration of Mass, which we have only just re-commenced, will need to go back to live-streaming; churches will need to be closed again to any private prayer; and the numbers allowed for funerals and weddings will be severely limited.

We expect specific details around the restrictions will be released by the civil authorities over the next 24 hours, and will be communicated to you as soon as possible. I ask for your patience in the meantime.

Now is a time for attentiveness to the care of one another. In the face of our own despondency and fears, our fatigue and anxieties, may we learn to hold firm in faith and hope, and experience sustaining moments of love. As the writer of the Letter to the Hebrews encouraged: Let us be concerned for each other, to stir a response in love and good works. (Heb 24.10)

Friends, while the Psalmist knew struggle and pain, there were also words of confidence that came from the heart: In vou our ancestors trusted; they trusted, and you delivered them. To you they cried, and were saved; in you they trusted, and were not put to shame. (Ps 22.4-5)

May our Lord Jesus be with you, and may His Blessed Mother accompany us all.

"Everyone lives a life that is often inconsistent or a contradiction' because people can be a sinner and a saint, a victim and a tormentor. No matter what one's situation is, people can put themselves back in God's hands through prayer. Prayer gives us nobility; it is able to protect one's relationship with God, who is the true companion along humanity's journey, amidst thousands of hardships in life, good or bad, but always with prayer," he said.

Each year, the Church celebrates Sea Sunday (12th July) an opportunity to recognise the important work being done by seafarers across the world. 


