CHRIST'S POWER AND AUTHORITY!!

Deut. 18:15-20; Psalm 95:1-2, 6-9; 1Cor. 7:32-35; Mark 1:21-28

Last weekend we kicked off our parish campaign towards becoming a "Tithing Parish." Even though the snowy weather prevented some of our parishioners from attending Sunday Mass, we had the pleasure of welcoming two witnesses from New Jersey and Rockland County respectively, who generously shared with us their personal experiences concerning tithing. Coincidentally, last Sunday's readings challenged us to leave behind "our boats, fishing nets and parents" to follow Christ. They called for detachment on our part, if we truly desire to follow Christ – Nothing, not even marital, domestic relationship or emotional attachment should distract us from leaving everything and following Christ because "this world in its present form is passing away."

In today's second reading Apostle Paul exhorts you and me "to be free of anxieties." In fact, when we free ourselves from inordinate attachment to material things, and depend solely on God, we find ourselves becoming less stressed and anxious. If you and I truly believe that everything that we have is a gift from God, then we will be willing to share a tenth of it with Him, knowing fully well that He will certainly replenish what we have generously shared with trust. Our dependency and attachment to material things often takes away our freedom to be faithful Christians. Thus, Paul further exhorts us to be aware that a call to discipleship is a call to emotional detachment from those things that might distract us from submitting our wills and intellects to God and His service. He encourages a life of total detachment and dependency on the will of God – loving Him above all things.

Emotional and/or physical attachments to material things do often provide us with some false security. It often provides us with a leeway to place mundane things above heavenly matters - to put temporal things and/or human beings above God, Who is the source of all that we are and possess. Today's gospel tells us that when Jesus taught in the Temple, "the people were astonished at His teaching, for He taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes." Unfortunately, in today's society, false prophets abound via radios - televisions - Internet - movie theaters billboards - computer/video games. Sometimes, instead of submitting ourselves to seeing Christ as the source of power and authority, we allow these things and people to play god to us manipulating our anxiety, thus aiding us to ignore Christ's teaching authority as explained by His Church. You and I must do our best to deny these false prophets the opportunity of preventing us from listening to Jesus Who teaches us with power and authority.

Today's scripture challenges you and me to reflect on whom we have given authority. Who or what is guiding and leading our daily lives? To whom or to what do we give the power to guide us away from our God, our faith, and our Church? To what or to whom do we give power over us? Jesus invites us to the life of discipleship and He intends us to be freed from anxieties. He wants to drive away the *devil of materialism* that possesses us. He wishes to purge us of the *unclean spirit of attachment*, and to set us free. Christ initiates us into His discipleship and He invites you and me to acknowledge His teaching authority, therefore, "if today you hear His voice, harden not your hearts."

PRESENTATION OF THE LORD



The Presentation of the Lord pulls many favorite mementos from the Catholic cupboard: candles, blessings, Christmas and church. The Mass of February 2nd begins with a blessing of lighted candles held by the faithful, who glow with the memory of the birth of Jesus.

The origins of the feast lie in ancient Jewish custom. On the 40th day after childbirth, parents brought their infant to the Temple to present him/her to the Lord and to purify the mother. St. Luke tells us that Joseph and Mary sacrificed two birds for the occasion after the birth of Jesus. Count up 40 days after Christmas and you'll come to February 2nd. Until the 1960s, we used to call this day "The Purification of Mary." The title changed for several reasons. We no longer believe that women who give birth need purification, and the true significance of the feast concerns Jesus coming to the Temple. He is the Promised One, Whose light will shine, beaming rays of hope to all the world. Also on the old calendar, this feast closed the Christmas season. Now we end the Christmas season with the Baptism of the Lord. So, even though the date for the Presentation still depends on Christmas, it has become a feast of ordinary time. Since it is a feast of the Lord, it takes precedence even when it falls on Sunday.

The candles you hold for the blessing come from your own home. If you like to use blessed candles for household prayer throughout the year, here is your chance to get them. On the day following this feast, our calendar permits the option of commemorating St. Blaise, a bishop and martyr of the early church. Legend has it that he once freed a child from choking, and while imprisoned under persecution he received light from friends who visited his cell with candles. Our church still uses candles from the Presentation of the Lord in the blessing of the faithful's throats on St. Blaise's Day. Blessed candles in our churches and homes signify the living presence of Christ in our community. With Christ as our light we warm a lost and wintry world.
