September 15, 2019 Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time Lk 15:1-32

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Did you find what you were looking for? The full-length gospel reading today contains three parables of Jesus with the same three steps of 1) something being lost, then it 2) being searched for and found, and finally ending with a 3) public and joyful dinner celebrating the recovery! The lost sheep, lost coin and lost son! The Good Shepherd, Good Homemaker and Good Father all display great patience in searching, working and/or waiting for the animal, item and person to return. They are overcome with joy at the reunion and celebrate in grand style with neighbors! Feeling for the 'lost', (and who hasn't been there before?), what a comfort it is to know God celebrates our 'finding' so lavishly. Yet, such extravagance shown by the Shepherd, Homemaker, and Father, does raise questions. For example, while the shepherd searches for the one lost sheep, who is tending to the 99? Or, with the woman's lost coin, what was the final cost expense for her extreme effort, using up oil in her lamp, lost wages due to time away from her other work, and then laying out a pricey spread of food/drink for neighbors to celebrate with her? Or the Father who lavishly welcomes the wild son home, 1.with new ring, robe and prize beef cattle feast, 2. risking the alienation of the 'faithful elder brother-manager', and 3. the additional loss of his estate going forward (another heir)? Such joyful recoveries are risky and costly. Yet, Jesus tells these parables to indicate the joy in heaven over even one sinner repenting and coming to God! Especially with the woman and her coins, the greater expense and loss of additional resources in going to such lengths for recovery is clearly evident. Who would ever spend so much to get so little? To God, that is how irreplaceable and unique each child is in His eyes! To help understand God's Prodigal love, imagine if that one lost coin completed a set of special commemorative coins. I know when I was a kid we liked to collect a whole set of each year's dated pennies, nickels, quarters, half dollars and even whole dollar coins. Consider if you had collected all the denomination of coins from the dated year of your birth-now that set is special as a whole to you. Or I would collect a whole set of one year's new postal stamps issued and if ever one of them fell out of the folder book, I went crazy to find it (even to point of cleaning room-which is great length for a ten year old!) Why? To complete the whole set. I suggest that this accounts for the great sacrifice and cost involved in simply restoring what was original, 100 sheep, ten coins, and two sons. They are a unit, intended to be whole and entire. So whatever God had created to be together, without counting cost we work to restore if ever broken or lost. We see this a lot on the TV shows like Pickers or Antiques Roadshows. If an original item does not have all its parts or accessories, its value deeply reflects the loss. What is a baseball team with only eight players? A forfeiting team! Or a Basketball team with only four players, means there will be no playing today! So Jesus tells these parables to teach that what God has created whole and what He intends to be together, He will go to every length, taking on every sacrifice to restore and reunite! And if we are part of the whole (and we are as members of God's Family), we should do all we can to remain part in the whole, not adding to the reunion work by our willful separating. Another motivation accounting for such motivation to reunite, is the added value of personal and close connection? If that set of coins was given to you by a now deceased dear father, then that adds another layer of motivation to get the set back together. Or if that flock of sheep was of a branded and registered breed entrusted to you for further perfecting of the stock line, doesn't that change your interest in protecting the breeding potential of each sheep. Or the Father who longs for the Son's return because he is recently widowed, mixing grief over the child's departed mother, into his preexisting love for the son? Again, as with the Pickers' show, when an item has a unique documented history (provenance), it is even more valuable. (Consider Elvis' costume from his last show before his death, or the actual White house Secure Line Phone-Red Phone actually used in the Cuban Missile Crisis conversations). I am simply pointing out the added incentives to restore/reunite because of special personal or historical connections.

As disciples of Jesus, what a comfort for us to know we have Jesus as our Good Shepherd, Good Householder, and Good Father! He himself says in John 6:39 that "this is the will of the one who sent me, *that I should not lose anything of what he gave me*, but that I should raise it on the last day.(Also in John 18:9). Thank God we belong to Jesus, and He keeps us!
