Good News Garden Harvest Vegetable Beef Barley Soup!



Whew! That's a long soup title, but I remember Pr. Bob saying one time, "There's nothing in that title that I don't love!" After several requests, I am glad to print the recipe (although everyone has their own favorite vegetable soup recipe!). Since I use a roaster, I have cut down this recipe down to a 6-8 qt. pot:

Sautee the following in 2 Tbs. olive oil until softened:

** 2-3 medium (10") zucchini, seeded but not peeled, and cut into bite-sized chunks.

4-6 ripe tomatoes, seeded but not peeled

1 large sweet onion, diced

Add the following:

- 1-50 oz. can beef broth
- 1-14 oz. can cubed beef
- 1-14 oz. can dark red kidney beans
- 1-14 oz. can great northern white beans
- $\frac{1}{2}$ c. pearled barley (cooked)

Add the following seasonings or play with your favorites: Garlic powder (or minced garlic), 2 bay leaves, parsley, salt, pepper to taste (garlic salt and pepper is nice touch), a little Italian seasoning. Simmer 2-3 hours, even better to make a few days ahead. Freezes well, or share with others!

This year I also added corn (frozen from a previous Community Dinner) and you could add potatoes, other kinds of beans, and small pasta instead of barley. Share the Good News with others! Jane (kjebersole@aol.com)

The answer is U R. You are missing. For U R an important part of the church, called and baptized into a community of faith. That means you are a Blessed, Beloved, Baptized Child of God called through your baptism to be part of this community of faith called the Church.

The Small Catechism quotes Jesus in Mathew 28, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit." The Small Catechism goes on to say that baptism is more than the water, but the water accompanies the word. The Word of God is important, and it is around the Word that we gather.

This community of faith gathers together every Sunday morning around Word and the Sacrament of the Altar. The Word is in Bible Study and Sunday School. The Word is heard in the hymns we sing, the scriptures we hear, the sermon preached, and it is seen and experienced as we receive the Sacrament of the Altar, the body and blood of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. They are the means through which we receive God's Grace. It is through His Word that we learn of God's mercy and grace for us. We only receive this blessed gift of grace if we are present, and this mercy and grace are realized fully when we are sent out to serve and allow the light of Christ to shine in and through us. The Light that we receive with the Word God shines through us, when we allow Jesus into our heart.

As the blessed, beloved, baptized children of God, we are called by God to be missionaries to others. Missionary is a hard word for us to wrap our brains around, but it simply means that we are called to show Jesus to others by allowing the light of Christ to shine in and through us. That's just it, we don't have to say anything, but we do have to show others Jesus by the way act, and by what we do and say. 


