## GROWING IN FAITH AND SERVICE: "I CAN MASTER THIS."

Continuing with our countdown list of the "40 things I should say before I die" is #20 "I can master this." How appropriate that it would come up on our list of 40 in the exact month when we have the distribution of our commitment cards for 2018 and as we end the year and look forward to having a new start in January of 2018.

"I can master this." is a bold statement that announces loud and clear that you think with <u>practice and perseverance</u> you will become competent, and maybe even proficient in whatever you are seeking to master. This year, as a church we are focusing our energy, time and resources on doing the two things we think as a church should be our priority and primary focus: <u>growing in faith</u>, and <u>coming together in service</u>. Both of these are a must for us as a church, and as individuals, if we are to truly follow Jesus and walk in his footsteps.

Yet, the inner journey of prayer, scripture, meditation, forgiveness, financial giving, and worship takes work, which requires <u>practice</u>. Day and day doing it, so that it becomes not only a habit, but a part of you, as if it were a companion to your very breath - that which you can't do without because it is a must for your very existence.

The outer journey is no different. Serving others takes a certain level of perseverance. I think the <u>perseverance</u> comes into play in two areas. One, is you must clear the time to serve others. Our world is constantly making all kinds of demands on us. Yet, the



question is whether we will make service a top priority in such a way that it is always on our mind to do, and keep as a part of our lives and thus we say our "no's" accordingly, so serving others may stay at the top of our "to do" list. The other factor which can eek out

coming together in service is dealing with our discomfort. Serving others often means doing what we have never done before for those with whom we are unfamiliar or just a tiny bit familiar. Sometimes when we realize this, fear sets in. Yet, we must persevere and work through the discomfort and fear of unfamiliarity to the point where it takes a back seat, and actually serving takes the front seat.

So then, carry on my brothers and sisters in Christ, so you too can say when it comes to growing in faith and coming together in service in 2018, "I can master this." You are encouraged to utilize and fill out the 2018 commitment card either placed in your church mailbox or mailed to your home, and bring it to worship on November 19<sup>th</sup> or mail it to the church by that date or soon thereafter. May God richly bless you as you step out in faith and service.




## FOOD PANTRY

When Mrs. Klein told her first graders to draw a picture of something for which they were thankful, she thought how little these children, who lived in a deteriorating neighborhood, actually had to be thankful for. She knew that most of the class would



draw pictures of turkeys or of bountifully laden Thanksgiving tables. That was what they believed was expected of them.

What took Mrs. Klein aback was Douglas's picture. Douglas was a forlorn little one and likely to be found close in her shadow as they went outside for recess. Douglas's drawing was simply this:

A hand, obviously, but whose hand? The class was captivated by his image. "I think it must be the hand of God that brings us food," said one student.

"A farmer," said another, "because they grow the turkeys."  $\,$ 

"It looks more like a policeman, and they protect us."

"I think," said Lavinia, who was always so serious, "that it is supposed to be all the hands that help us, but Douglas could only draw one of them."

Mrs. Klein had almost forgotten Douglas in her pleasure at finding the class so responsive. When she had the others at work on another project, she bent over his desk and asked whose hand it was.

Douglas mumbled, "It's yours, Teacher."

Then Mrs. Klein recalled that she had taken Douglas by the hand from time to time; she often did that with the children. But that it should have meant so much to Douglas ...

Perhaps, she reflected, this was her Thanksgiving, and everybody's Thanksgiving—not the material things given to us, but the small ways that we give something to others.


