



Guild Meeting Minutes

August 28 , 2023 Hybrid meeting—in person and Zoom Virtual meeting

The meeting was called to order in the church at 7:04 PM.

Regina Scott Brooks started the meeting by reminding members that she had taken on the position of VP Planning and VP Programs in October of last year when there was only one month of meetings left in 2022, and she was scrambling in the cold winter months to set up programs for the 2023 calendar year. She contacted Betty Suiter, one of the few Master Quilters in the country and one of the guild's founding members, and she asked Betty if she would be willing to present a program in the 2023 calendar year. Betty said she would think about it and soon called Regina back to say yes, she would present a program. Regina was thrilled and decided then and there that it would be a good year.

Regina then introduced Betty who then gave a delightful, humorous and educational presentation with a slide show of her quilts, and also actual quilts. If you were at the meeting, take advantage of watching her lecture again.

At the end of Betty's lecture, Regina announced that we need one more School House presenter for October's meeting. Dianna Zimmerman had flyers and yard signs in the parking lot after the meeting.
Contact her is you want flyers or yard signs. Kathy Lejewski asked members to turn in the money from their raffle tickets. TC Wiley said she has 111 entries so far. All quilt entry forms must be postmarked by September 11. Vickie Madsen needs more people to sign up for judging, which will be Wednesday, October 4 from 11:00 AM-4:45 PM, and Thursday October 5 from 7:30 AM until 5:00 PM. Jean Veltman gave a rundown of signups and asked people to please sign up after the meeting. Many volunteers are still needed.

Pat Henningfeld listed the Board positions that still need people to fill them. The 2024 Board will be voted on at the October meeting. She reiterated that after being President for the past several years, she will not do it again and hopes that a President will step forward.

Show & Tell was presented and the meeting adjourned at 8:45 PM.




Lighthouse Legacies 2023 Featured Quilter

Lighthouse Legacies 2023's Featured Quilter is the effervescent TC Wiley! A 20+ year member of LHQ, TC is an enthusiastic ambassador for our guild and for the art of quilting. Here is her story!

As a little girl, I enjoyed sewing my own clothes and doll clothes, but I sure didn't know what a quilt was. In the early 1990's, my sister showed me her first mystery quilt. I told her that it would be a long time before you would see me cutting apart good fabric and then sewing it back together again. Boy! Was I wrong! Quilting started for me soon after that.

I joined Lighthouse Quilters Guild in the mid 1990's and that opened up a whole new world for me.



One of my first quilts was "We Love Our Green Bay Packers" in 1996. Check it out...it will be hanging in my booth. Oh what I have learned and achieved since then!

In 2004, I created the Elmwood Fabric Gallery for Jim Deibler of Sew 'n Save of Racine. I continued to manage this new entity until 2012 when it was time to retire to take care of family.

Since then, I have been involved in the 4H Quilting Program and facilitated several fun seasons along with my sidekick, Jennifer Clingaman. Alongside of this, I also manage the Quilts for Foster Kids program. The Wednesday Wannabes (a long time group of quiltsy ladies that started as a sub group of Lighthouse Quilters)



get a list of kid's names and we personalize a quilt for each foster child by embroidering their names on a pocket on the quilt back. The quilts, once all created by the Wednesday Wannabees, are now created by many groups within Racine and then finished and managed by the WW group.

My husband, Jim and I had a long-arming business (Creative Hands Quilting) for a little more than 20 yrs. Jim did the long-arming....We did the customer side of things together. I kept the schedule! Quilting and machine embroidery (which became an obsession in 2012 or so) are two things in my life that make me happy. I don't know what to say about my quilting addiction except that I tell people that I'll be taking my sewing machine with me when I go!
