It is not clear as to when exactly the Gardena School was built.

The first school was in a house owned by Clifford Stone known as the Thornton place. It was purchased and later demolished by Don Buckley. Allen "Doc" Stone remembered that at one time "they held school in the building in one room, and Clifford Stone lived in the other part." Later a larger building, the present Lions Hall was built. Being there was no high school in Gardena the graduating eighth grade class attended high school in Touchet.

July 17, 1906

The residents of Gardena country had to send their children to Touchet and had petitioned for a separate district. The Gardena School must have had a successful start as the paper in February 1906 mentioned. "Miss Maggie Loyd who is principal of the public school at Gardena is in the city visiting friends".

August 26, 1908

Chester Day, a Monmouth Normal graduate, has been engaged to teach at Gardena School. This newly formed District now has an enrollment of fifty with the prospects for this number to be increased. Mr. Day has had some experience in teaching and comes highly recommended.

September 4, 1908

Chester Day of Monmouth, Oregon arrived in Touchet on Wednesday and after visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Paul Johnson, went on to Gardena. He will open school next Tuesday.

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
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LETTERS





Special awards were present:, Oldest Alumni in attendance - Naomi (Cline) Dodd (Class of 1922. Oldest Alumni Veteran in attendance—Wilbur Wagoner (class of 1935 - US Army. Alumni traveling the farthest - Kathy (Armstrong) Buchanan (class of 1971 - South Africa - 10, 149 miles.








Gardena School continued...

May 24, 1913

The paper gave an account of County Superintendent Miss Mary Gilliam giving out diplomas to the eighth grade graduates at Gardena. The students receiving diplomas were Elmer Thornton, Laura McDonald, Joel Byrnes and Mattie Bosley. Mrs. D.M. Calvin was the principal.

September 1914 - May 1916

The paper listed the Gardena teachers as Chester C. Day and Ella Ingram.

May & June 1915

Those from Gardena taking the state examination were: Zola Hancock, Guy Holly, Alvin Inman, Edith McDonald, Ruth Maxfield, Pearl Maxfield and Jessie Ringel.

July 28, 1920

The Touchet column for July 28th had Gardena in the news. It reported "The teachers for the Gardena School have been secured for the coming term. They are: Sam Hunt, principal, who will have charge of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades. Miss Aleta Lundy of Freewater, will have charge of first, second, third and forth grades.

August 1920

The paper mentioned the Gardena School Board was planning to paper and clean the McDonald bungalow to be used by the principal that fall.

October 31, 1920

The foundation is being laid for the teacher's cottage at Gardena. The lumber has been here for some time.

November 17, 1920

The bungalow for the Gardena teachers is progressing very fast. The outer walls are up and the roof on.

June 1921

Taking the state exam from Gardena were: Charlotte Cheesman, Juanita Montgomery, Florence Sonnenburg, Osgood Sonneburg and Eva Priddy.

May 1923

The teachers of the Gardena School this year are Mrs. Jennie Fisher who will teach the first, second, third and forth grades and Mr. Chester Day who teaches the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades and who is also the principal.


In our spring newsletter we asked for information regarding the Gardena School House. Compiled below is some of the information obtained since then. We hope this is just the beginning of the history of the Gardena School. Please send any memoriabilia, photos or information your may have the TEF, PO Box 272, Touchet, WA 99360.

The Gardena School was closed in 1948 and the children were sent to Touchet. The building sat vacant for about ten years when a group of five Gardena residents got together and approached the Touchet School Board about using the building for community functions. In 1962, the building was leased to the newly formed Touchet Gardena Lions Club. The Lions Club still leases the building from the Touchet School District for \$1/year, and is responsible for maintaining it as a community center.

The major funding source for the Lions Club is the May Day Barbecue. They serve baby back ribs and chicken, slow cooked on a large barbecue that sits outside the building. There is also a raffle and live auction. This has become a much anticipated event to cap off May Day festivities.

Besides the Lions Club barbecue and regular meetings, the Gardena School is the venue for the Oktoberfest, family and school reunions, wedding receptions, birthday parties, large family gatherings and even Thanksgiving dinners.

The number of active members of the Lions Club averages 12-15 community minded men. The president this year is Ron Dunning. Stuart Durfee is the secretary and Darrell Loney is the treasurer. Mark Wagoner's field surrounds the building, so he supplies the water, mows and maintains the lawn. For the past 20 years Henry Garbe has been doing much of the maintenance work on the building and has the calendar to schedule functions. Right now he is replacing and painting the worn boards on the front of the building.



Last year Henry noticed the belfry on the old school was in need of repair. Using equipment from Ron Dunning, they took the belfry off the front entry of the school. Henry asked Don Merrill to do the repairs, because Don had done several other projects for the school, including making the cabinets in the kitchen at the Gardena School and making the trophy cases at the main campus.

Don said the project was an interesting one. There were well over 50 pieces of wood, all cut on the same angle and fitted together. "It was just like a house of cards", he said, "take one piece out and the whole thing falls apart." Don remade the belfry, and when it was finished, the original metal cap was put back on the top before it was reattached to the front of the building.

But what is a belfry with out a bell? It is generally thought that the original bell that hung in the belfry was stolen many years ago. But no one seems to know exactly when, and certainly not who, would steal a bell from its location 30 feet up on top of the pitched roof of the school entry.



It is well known that Bob Kentch can fix anything. So when other replacement bells were thought to be too expensive or not to have the right look, Bob decided to **make** a bell. He used irrigation weld cones for the bell, and a brass ball out of a sprinkler ball valve for the dong. It is nice to see a bell in the refurbished belfry once again.

The Gardena School has changed a lot since it was first built in 1910. It takes a committed community organization to keep up the building grounds, and certainly fulfils it purpose as a "community center".



PROJECT CITIZEN

Project Citizen is a national program for middle school students sponsored by the National Conference of State Legislatures and the Center for Civic Education. The purpose of Project Citizen is to motivate and enable young people to enjoy the rights and accept the responsibilities of citizenship. Project Citizen helps middle school students learn how to express their opinions, how to decide which level of government and which agency is most appropriate for dealing with problems they identify, and how to influence policy decisions at that level. The results of the class's work are displayed in a portfolio which may be presented to other classes or community groups. The portfolio may also be entered in a competition. Touchet's Project Citizen

In the spring of 2005, Touchet 7th graders were involved in the civics project called *Project Citizen*, under the leadership of Donnetta Elsasser and Lisa Richards. Their goal was to find a way to make the Touchet Community Park more attractive and user friendly. *Project Citizen* teaches students, such as the Touchet 7th graders, to find solutions to a problem in their community. We chose our problem by making a list of several problems in our area. Then we personally interviewed people in our town about the problems we came up with. We found that 55% said the Touchet Community Park was not attractive and not user friendly. The park does not have much to offer. There is not any playground equipment for the kids to play on, there are no garbage cans, the BBQ pits are not in good shape, the volleyball net we have in the park is torn on one side, there is only one picnic table to offer to the whole neighborhood, and there is no access to nearby bathrooms. Also, we only have one drinking fountain available and it does not work.

The plan the 7th graders proposed for our park was to make a community/school Park Board. We thought this was a good idea because the board could meet regularly to plan out long-term improvements for the park. The 7th graders plan to serve on the park board, and already have some great ideas. In order to get things started, we secured a grant for matching funds from Thrivent Financial for Lutherans. With donations from the Touchet Community, we raised over \$800.00. Then, with the match from our grant source, we have a total of \$1600.00. Our research shows that these initial funds will be enough to purchase shrubs to plant along the sides of the park that face the street, and to install two small climbing toys for kids.

Throughout the spring and into the summer we have been working with the Touchet Educational Foundation. The Foundation has agreed to be the money holder for the park funds. As the new School/Community Park Board gets underway with long-term improvements, the Touchet Educational Foundation will allow us to continue to conduct our business through this non-profit organization. 
BRANDON ZARO
