What is happening now and what are the next steps?

The Minnesota Office of Early Learning held a summit in December 2013 with the purpose of learning more about the NHMG system. Over 100 early childhood stakeholders and community partners from across the state attended the summit and provided thoughtful feedback about implementing the NHMG system in Minnesota and how it might meet the needs of young children, families, and service providers in our state.

The Office of Early Learning has decided to formally explore the National Help Me Grow system here in Minnesota through a year of technical assistance and planning with the Help Me Grow National Center. During the year-long planning process, the Office of Early Learning will ask for continued engagement from early childhood providers and partners, to help decide how to best structure the system to fit our state's needs.

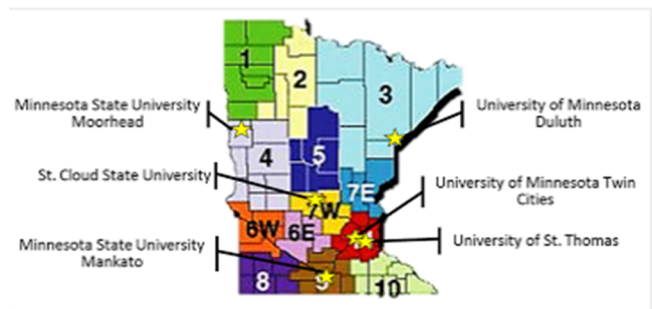

Connected Educator Month

In the world of education, October has gained a new title that is indicative of the times. October is Connected Educator Month (CEM). CEM was developed by the US Department of Education with the goal of getting more educators using social media to improve their practice. Educators have always been encouraged to network and collaborate; Twitter and other social media tools have removed the geographical limitations of networking and allows educators to learn with and from others across the globe. There are many benefits of being a connected educator and there are many tools available to make it easy to connect with others. Twitter is a powerful networking tool. The conversations taking place on Twitter have caused me to reflect on my practice and adjust my practice. Twitter is my go to source for finding relevant research and information related to evidence based practices. It is also a source of support and collaboration.

Not only are there advantages of being connected for the educator, but there are also advantages for our field. Twitter provides a unique opportunity for our field to display our professionalism and knowledge. We can increase the understanding and value of our profession by contributing to conversations about recommended practices, policies and practice. Twitter is also a powerful advocacy tool. Currently, early childhood education is getting more attention than ever. Twitter is a platform for discussions about policies that will impact the outcomes of young children. Researchers and advocacy groups are using Twitter to take advantage of this attention to be a voice for early childhood. It is critical that our profession is part of this discussion.

Twitter is a conversation that is taking place with or without our input. There are some practices that make it easier to be part of this conversation. Twitter is powerful, but the amount of information on Twitter can be overwhelming. The following practices can help users manage the information available on Twitter.

Hashtags: Twitter serves the purpose of a search engine through the use of hashtags. A hashtag is the # followed by a word, phrase or acronym. Hashtags are added to tweets so the tweets can be searched by topic. People who share common interests agree upon a hashtag and monitor their Twitter feeds for that hashtag. Hashtags are virtual versions of communities of practice. For example, #atchat, is the agreed upon hashtag of the assistive technology community. Professionals mark their tweets with this tag so that others in the community can find the information. When marking a tweet with more than one hashtag, a space between the tags is needed. Sometimes a chat is developed around a hashtag. A chat is a scheduled conversation led by a moderator using the agreed upon hashtag. The moderator poses questions and the community discusses the topic. Hashtags are used at conferences as a way to network, share resources, and spark conversations about the conference topic. Conference hashtags are promoted as a way for non-attendees to access the information and benefit from the conference sessions.

Information relevant to our field can be found by searching the following hashtags; #ecse, #earlyintervention, #earlyedsped, #b25, #earlyed, #prek, #ece, #spedchat, #atchat, #assitivetech, #slpeeps, #otpeeps, #preemies, #autism, #inclusion, and #earlyliteracy.

Twitter lists: Twitter lists can be created by Twitter users. The lists are a way to organize the people the user follows into categories. These lists can then be used to filter searches. I have created the following lists; [research/policy](#), [assistive technology](#), [related services](#), and [ECSE on Twitter](#). When I apply these lists as a filter, I see tweets posted by members of the list, making it much easier for me to find relevant information based on my needs at that time. Twitter lists are also sources of people to follow. As I look at lists created by other members of my personal learning network, I find people I want to follow.

Third party tools: The third party tools [Tweetdeck](#) and [Hootsuite](#) are used to organize tweets into columns by filters determined by the user. Using Tweetdeck, I have created columns based on hashtags and my Twitter lists. All tweets marked by the hashtag will appear in the column assigned to that hashtag or list. These columns are real time search engines and make reading tweets much more efficient. When reading tweets, I prefer using one of these tools over using the Twitter website.

I hope that the use of these tips will enhance the time you spend on Twitter. I look forward to connecting with you on Twitter. Journal review: Teaching Exceptional Children September/October 2014 Vol. 47 No. 1

Check out the September/October 2014 edition of Teaching Exceptional Children's technology articles. You'll find insight into applications and uses of universal design in order to assist students with special needs in their daily lives. The article Smooth Transitions: Helping Students with Autism Navigate the School day by Kara Hume, Melissa Sreckovic, Kate Snyder, and Christina R Carnahan, which begins on page 35, outlines how to identify the need for and then use supports to help students with transitions through the day. The strategies could be applied to students of many ages.

Do you have a student using a form of augmentative or alternative communication? On page 56 in this same journal, the article by Yun-Ching Chung and Karen H. Douglas, Communicative Competence Inventory for Students who use Augmentative and Alternative Communication – A Team Approach provides a questionnaire for evaluating communication competence, an example of implementation and a method of progress monitoring of the use of augmentative or alternative communication. Again, you may find useful information to apply to the challenges of young students who experience fewer communication opportunities.
