
The 2016 Awakenings & Beginnings Dance Festival takes place on January 23rd at the Diavolo Performance Space in LA, and represents a powerful anniversary for its founder and producer Noelle Rose Andressen. This is the 4th year of the festival, which in itself is a great accomplishment, but more significantly, the same week of the festival marks ten years for Andressen as a survivor of breast cancer. Noelle Rose Andressen is a professional dancer, choreographer, dance educator, special events producer/presenter, show curator, actress (SAG-AFTRA), musician, composer and human rights advocate. In 2009 she "merged dance and her Emmy nominated film-making to form professional, multi-media company: Rubans Rouges Dance. In French, Rubans Rouges means Red Ribbons, and the company received its title from her breakthrough piece Shattered Innocence (Red Ribbons)." According to her website, Andressen's choreography focuses on "exploring the human condition through narrative story lines".


Andressen credits mentor Jamie Nichols for connecting her with the Glendale Arts and for guiding her through the process of creating and producing a dance festival. For ten years Jamie Nichols has produced the highly successful Celebrate Dance at the Alex Theatre in Glendale, CA; a festival that has helped launch several emerging Los Angeles dance companies. Andressen's vision is similar for her Awakenings & Beginnings Dance Festival. It includes experienced professional choreographers, emerging

artists who seek a venue to showcase their choreography as well as all those artists inbetween. This is one of the strengths and unique qualities of the Awakenings & Beginnings Dance Festival. It is clear that Andressen is dedicated to giving these artists a venue, to strengthening the art of Dance in Los Angeles and to helping unite the Los Angeles dance community. She noted that sometimes once younger and less experienced artists see and work alongside more seasoned ones, a mentorship will develop. This is one of the outcomes of the festival that helps make all the hard work worth while.

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




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


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Jeff Slayton has had a long and influential career as a dancer, choreographer, and





He became a full time faculty member in 1986 and continued to teach at CSULB until 1999. Jeff Slayton was one of the faculty members that helped design the Dance Center at CSULB as well as develop and implement the BFA, MFA and MA degree programs. While in Long Beach, he formed his own company, Jeff Slayton & Dancers, that operated from 1978 to 1983. He continues to stage works in the Southern California area. He is also the author of two books, "The Prickly Rose: A Biography of Viola Farber" and "Dancing Toward Sanity".
