Where is the Team Going?

Southwestern REACT is at a crossroads. We are in the unfortunate position of having to determine whether we will continue to exist as a Team, evolve into something else or close up shop completely.

The first indication of this crisis came in the form of declining participation in events we have worked for years. Team involvement has dropped off to the point where even simple events such as the Fiesta Island Time Trials are understaffed.

This has been followed by a decline in membership. When I joined the team last year, there were 31 members on the roster. Now there are 25 with about 15 being active members. We even saw the resignation of a board member and REACTER editor in recent months.

We have some questions we must ask ourselves, the most important being "What are we going to do about this?" Are we going to let the Team drift into obscurity or endeavor to continue as a viable entity in Emergency Communications in San Diego County?

First and foremost (and perhaps most importantly), we need to grow our membership. How do we do this? I will be the first to admit that there are many aspects of amateur radio and emergency/event communications isn't always the primary interest of hams. Some like Dxing, others work satellites or are into high speed data networking. The possibilities are endless.

The only way we are going to grow our membership is to actively recruit other hams, both those who are brand new and those that have been licensed for a while. When you talk to other amateur radio operators that are not members of REACT, you can get several reactions, from "Who are they?" to "Aren't those the CB guys?" REACT is not well known among a lot of hams and in some cases, highly disliked.

We need to dispel those notions as best we can. How do we go about doing that? The best way is to get out among other amateurs and show them we are not what they perceive us to be. To that end, here are some questions for you:

1. How many of you have attended a meeting of another ham radio group in San Diego County? Have you ever checked into one of their nets? Have you ever checked into our own twice-monthly REACT net?

There are fifteen amateur radio clubs or groups, including REACT, listed on the SANDARC website. These cover all parts of the county from Carlsbad to Chula Vista and east to Campo. There is also ACS and ARES. Each club has one or more repeaters on the air and they conduct periodic nets on these repeaters. Checking into one of these nets, even as a guest is a good way to get known among the amateur radio community in San Diego.

And the REACT net, conducted twice a month, is conducted on the 449.44 community repeater that has a very wide coverage. Almost anyone on the team should be able to check into it.

2. How many of you have thought about upgrading your license above your current level?

The amateur radio license examination question pools are published in full and there are many on-line resources to help one study for the exams. There are also license classes conducted in the county on a regular basis. In addition, SANDARC conducts testing in all parts of the county on almost all weekends.

3. How many of you that do hold higher licenses engage in other amateur communications, such as HF?

Can't afford a new HF radio? There are a lot of perfectly good used radios out there and if this is still out of reach, it's a simple matter to find someone who might be will to give you an opportunity to operate their radio.

4. How many of you have ever attended Field Day?

The annual ARRL Field Day event is an excellent opportunity to get out and see how other amateurs work HF and perhaps even be able to operate under the guidance of a control operator. Remember those from your license exam?

5. Have you ever participated in a non-REACT event?

Here is the perfect opportunity to get out and see how other facets of amateur radio function and show others how excellent REACT members can be at event communications.

To that end, I would encourage all REACT members to consider volunteering to assist ARES with communications at this year's Miramar Air Show, September 23-25. ARES (and amateur radio) is going to have a larger role in the air show this year, beyond the previous "lost child/parent" function. The details have not been disseminated but what is known is that many more volunteers will be needed this year. I have worked this event in the past and it's a lot of fun. You get to walk around, mix with the people and look at all the exhibits while performing your duties.

6. Have you ever "Elmered" a new ham?

Elmering (mentoring) new hams is a traditional part of amateur radio; one of the foundations on which it was founded. There are any number of way to help mentor new hams. One of the best is by becoming an instructor at the Gateway Communicator Workshops conducted at Scripps La Jolla immediately following the monthly ARES meeting. This could be a good way to encourage new hams to become REACT members.

These are just a few of the ways we could attract new members to REACT and also help to dispel the misconception that we are a bunch of "CB jerks" and that we are actually competent, skillful and experienced emergency communications operators.

Give it a try. You have nothing to lose.
