MEMBER PROJECTS AND PROBLEM SOLVING






The Emergency brake carrier is usually overhauled when preforming brake service work. Sometime the removal of the emergency toggle lever is a stubborn item to remove. Backing plates found at swap meets that are rusted may have been sitting dormant for many years. Many have been a neglected item on a car over the years leading to disassembly problems. You have two brass bushings that need to be replaced and usually the toggle levers many be rusted or worn greatly. If you cannot easily remove them using penetrating oil (Kroil is my favorite) and a hammer and punch you need to step up your game. Your choice could be a hydraulic press and press them out. Many won't have access to one and you need to carefully support the work so you don't bend the carrier assembly plate. Here is the method I found works well and you can apply the principle to other stubborn items. Using a cutting torch is a good solution, a small hand held torch typically used for copper plumbing work just won't give you the quick and forceful heat to do the job. You need to go oxy acetylene or oxy propane. Heat the toggle lever ends keeping the flame moving so you don't melt the lever shaft, heat one end then move to the other end, you should see them slightly glow red. Quickly throw the work in a bucket filled with water and let it cool to a cold touch. Repeat the heating and the guench one more time. Use a little penetrating oil on both ends of the shaft and let sit for 15 minutes or more. Take the assembly and hold it in both hands like a dinner plate with the end of the shaft minus the camshaft lever down. Find a steel plate or substantial flat work bench or anvil and slam the shaft end down squarely on the flat service. It may take a few slams but you should see movement. I may take one more heating or a little more penetrating oil and a hammer and punch to drive it out now. Many toggle shafts will be to far gone due to rust to reuse. The heating works because you make the shaft swell pushing the rust and crud opening up the interfering fit. Heating around the collar is not as effective in opening up the interference and breaking the rust bond. You want it to swell from the inside moving outward. This principle you can apply to other projects.

Extreme wear , this is where the rust bonds making removal difficult

This end is held downward and squarely slammed on a substantial steel surface after the heat/ quench

IRONMAN TOUR 2016

Lynne and Rog give us another great tour.

Welcome to the Ironman event which only falls on the Leap Year. This event was first just a fantasy event bouncing around in a few of the member's minds. It was an inside joke of bravado and daring amongst a few members who enjoyed outrageous tales and story telling. The stories of winter riding and throwing care to the wind finally caught up with reality in 1992 when the Rog Anderson and Lynne Groven put together the first event. Rog and Lynne in previous years contributed cartoons to the Ahooga Newsletter titled "A" Rumblings. The pictured reprint of the cartoon was the first event that was a culmination of the fantasy of the Ironman.

You must note that in 1986 it was not a Leap Year so the joke was on a number of people. The lore of the event was thought to be true by some and a few members felt shortchanged that they had missed the event. Pressure was put on Rog and Lynne to follow thru and create an event for the a real Leap Year. !992 was the first event, since then Rog and Lynne have created a tour for each of the Leap Years and number seven is now in the record book.

We started our day with early morning wind gusts in the metro from 30-40 MPH., morning temperature at the start was about 19 degrees and a wind chill around 4 degrees. We met at the Nokomis Community Center on the shore of lake Nokomis including 62 members and 30 Model A's we had coffee, sweets and a presentation of past Ironman events. Rog and Lynne explained how the tour came to be and had memorabilia from previous tours on hand showcasing those past fun tours. Nostalgic photos and automobile information from the Model A era were on display boards set up in our meeting room. A commemorative radiator badge was created in honor of the event and presented to those in attendance.



We left around 11:00 in sunny but defiantly winter weather rounding Lake Nokomis and heading West following the Minnehaha creek through South Minneapolis which took us to the shores of Lake Harriet and a group photo in front of the band stand. It was a bit cold in the group photo, we hopped back into the A's and continued around the adjoining Lake Calhoun connecting to Lake of the Isles with its large and stately homes. We stopped briefly at the television home of the Mary Tyler Moore show and took in a bit more of the Minneapolis Parkway system. We ventured to the Park Tavern in St. Louis Park for a nice hot lunch and some warm up time. The group got to spend an enjoyable day using our cars and not letting winter get in our way. It was a true winter day, one in which a real Minnesotan can brag about not letting winter cold slow them down. 
