Recipe from Dianna Zimmerman:

When I went to the Mary Fons workshop I made chicken salad for lunch. I had requests for the recipe so I said I would put it in the newsletter.

Alterra's Curried Chicken Salad

- 2 lbs. poached, diced chicken breast
- 2 ribs celery, diced
- 1/4 - 1/2 cup red onion, diced.
- 1/2 cup dried cranberries
- 1/2 cup golden raisins
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Mix dressing:

- 1 cup mayo
- 1 Tablespoon fresh lime juice
- 1 Tablespoon rice wine vinegar.
- 1 Tablespoon honey
- 1/2 - 1 Tablespoon curry powder
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- Pinch of cayenne pepper
- Salt to taste

Mix all ingredients together and enjoy. I usually add more curry and cayenne pepper.

Combine all the ingredients





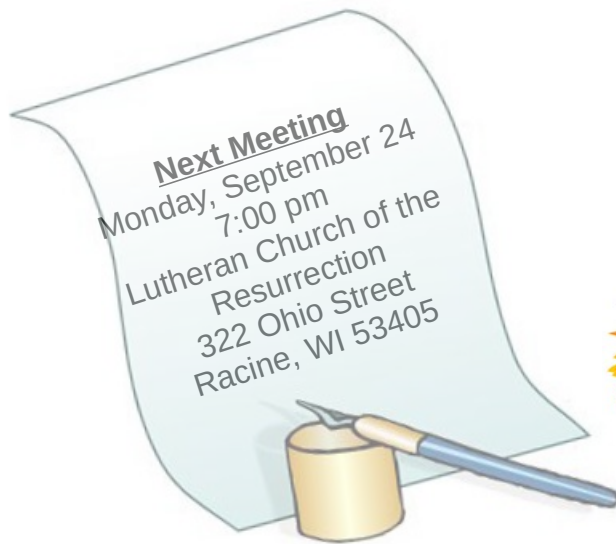
